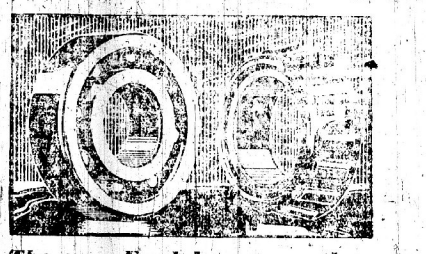

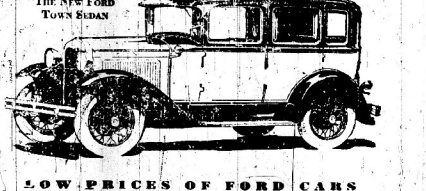

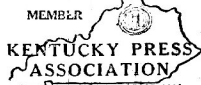

MILLIONS FOR ROADS

One hundred and fifty million dollars is now available for road construction as a result of recent federal appropriations and sums on hand in the various states.

The appropriations have given the nation an almost unprecedented opportunity to advance the road program and at the same time add to the national income.

Again in this country, Syria at once began his memorable fight to regain his citizenship. At the same time, French authorities sought to strip him of his citizenship. They sought to prove that

"My former wife still lives in Arkansas," Syria said a few months ago in an interview. "She knows now that my life, and is the most miserable woman in the world. But she loved me to move here to live for me."

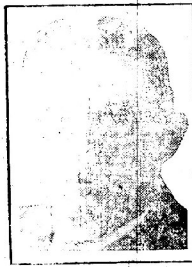
