THOSE IN NEED

Each day one thousand persons in the United States are dying from hunger, according to a statement made this week in the United States senate.

A few years ago, similar conditions existed in Russia. The United States government sent to Russia thirty millions of dollars for the relief of the suffering.

Today, with the hungry at our doors, with human want and suffering not removed from us by ocean expanses, the same government fails, even refuses, to appropriate twenty-five million dollars to the relief of its own people.

To relieve hunger and suffering with federal funds as the alleviating medium would be to create a dole, opponents to this humanitarian measure claim. It is a dangerous example, it is contended. These who profess such fear predict that such relief from the federal government would promote socialism.

Socialism or bolshevism, call it what you will, is the result of rotten, selfish governmental direction. Let this government refuse to relieve conditions such as now exist, and it indeed will be presented with the danger of "Red" encroachment. Such times as these are a breeding season for unrest among the masses and a desire for a change—anything promising something better.

The American Red Cross is, and should be, recognized as the greatest of all organized institutions of mercy. Its value cannot be overestimated. But the situation calls for something else. It is not likely that, should a foreign power invade our shores, this government would depend upon the state guards or the lads who attend the citizens' military training camps to afford protection, is it? The utmost of our national resources would be thrown into the conflict.

The enemy now faced is the spectre of famine. As in war, the United States government should marshal its resources to the defense.

We know little or nothing of the multifarious economic phases to be considered in the administration of this country's affairs, yet it occurs to us that the boys who helped "save the world to Democracy" when this country as a whole, including Wall Street, was in need, are now themselves in need, and that they should receive cash for their bonuses.

Thousands of World War veterans came home from France, to find workless boys who stayed at home occupying the positions which the soldiers left when they entered military service. Their discomfitment then was keen, many suffered from unemployment, but now more are in perhaps the direst need of their lives. They should not be obliged to accept disappointment and disillusion the remainder of their lives.

If the face value of the bonus cannot be paid now, at least a part of it should. Ere the bonus matures, thousands of these ex-soldiers will be dead. Their families would then, of course, receive the bonus. But why look to the future? Not only the veterans but also their families need money NOW!

Why Your Child Must Have Good Posture to Be a Blue Ribbon Child

In good posture, the head is held straight above the shoulders, the chest is held up, the back is straight and the abdomen flat. Not one child in a hundred has this good posture. Instead, the head is stuck out in front, the chest is flat and sunken, and the abdomen protrudes. Such posture is not conducive to good health, for the sunken chest crowds the lungs, so that they do not have room to expand and take in as much fresh air as they should. The abdomen sticking out in front indicates that the organs of the body are out of place and the muscles not firm and strong as they should be. A man would not expect an automobile to do its best work if some of the machinery was crowded and other was

pushed out of place; he should not expect the "human machinery" to do its best work either under these circumstances. And he may be sure it does not! If, in school inspection of clinic, your child's posture is marked fair, poor or bad, try to help him to stand, the head is stuck out in front, the chest is flat and sunken, and the abdomen protrudes. Such posture is not conducive to good health, for the sunken chest crowds the lungs, so that they do not have room to expand and take in as much fresh air as they should. The abdomen sticking out in front indicates that the organs of the body are out of place and the muscles not firm and strong as they should be. A man would not expect an automobile to do its best work if some of the machinery was crowded and other was

to get his body in good posture, and practice will help him to keep it. Straight men and women will not grow from crooked sitting. Boys and girls, so help your child to grow straight, and thus to be a Kentucky Blue Ribbon child.

Why Your Child Must Have Good Health Habits to Be a Blue Ribbon Child

The human body is the most wonderful machine in the world. And, like all machines, it needs regular and proper care to make it work as it should and for as long a time as possible. As long as it is in good health, it will do its work as well as any other machine. If one part gets out of order, the whole machine may stop. When some part gets out of order, it can never be completely repaired, so the wise person will do all he can to keep all parts of the machine in good order from the very beginning. This can be done by training the child and little child to form the correct health habits. Habits can only be formed by doing the thing over and over each day. And when they are formed, they will be so much a part of one's life that they will never be lost. Regularity in keeping the teeth and body, both inside and out, is necessary. If a little child is trained to brush his teeth regularly, to bathe, and to eliminate the waste from his body, as he grows older he will do these things without thinking and all of this time he will be developing a strong, healthy body. This habit of strength, he may say, is not necessary for the other good health habits of rest and food. Begin now to train your child, to follow the good health habits, and this will help him to win a Blue Ribbon award, more important, to form habits that will be of value to him through out his life.

WHY NOT TELL THE TRUTH?

Much has been said and written of false advertising methods employed by privately owned concerns. But too much has not been said or written. The critics have not gone far enough. The News is in receipt of a bulletin put out by the Kentucky Sunday School Association, Inc., operating as the Kentucky Council of Religious Education, at Louisville. This bulletin is put out in an effort to influence men and women to contribute, immediately to the support of the association.

One page of the bulletin is the picture of a dilapidated, crumbling, huge estate in the well-known city of Louisville, as wide as the legs of a group of children and one man are shown about the building and beneath the picture are the words: "A TYPICAL MOUNTAIN SETTLEMENT."

The caption, "A Typical Mountain Settlement," is a false statement and carries a false impression to the outside world. In Pike county, not one building of this nature can be found in any of the mountain counties, and if any exist, it is almost a certainty that it would take a Sherlock Holmes a long time to locate a pair of them in the entire mountain section of Kentucky.

Religious and school workers, busy to this in discussing the "pure" advertisements of the magazines and newspapers, yet their greatest fault, and a fault that is tearing down their support among the people, is the habit of false advertising. Schools, religious as well as independent, and other charitable organizations supposedly working for the uplift of the mountains habitually resort to extreme false advertising methods in securing funds. While there may be a few exceptions, the practice has become widespread until few of them pass up the opportunity of using the plemes taken of their great grandfathers when it was necessary to carry a musket on the shoulder to protect oneself from the savage redskin.

If the advertising of a school, church or charitable institution is false there is reasonable grounds for skepticism on all sides. Just how much of the literature is to be taken for true?

Such conditions as portrayed in the bulletin may have been "typical" a half or quarter of a century ago, but no sensible man or woman would think of classing them as "typical" today. A school study of the educational situation will show that the mountain people are progressive. Progressive in education, agriculture and religion. While the opportunities of the mountaineer have not been as great as those of the downstate, it can easily be seen that the progress here has been no less.

No doubt the school and the church are the two great foundations upon which civilization and progress are constructed—there are no substitutes for them, but they should observe the same truthful advertising ethics practiced by newspapers and magazines.—Pike County News.

Production of Tung Oil

The United States Department of Agriculture has reported that tung oil production for more than 20 years, developed a new industry in this country, that produced much for the nation as a whole, and for Florida in particular. Tung oil is an essential element in the manufacture of the better grades of paints and varnishes. In the past, it was almost entirely imported from China, the only country in which tung trees have grown. Now China is, in fact, the chief source of tung oil in this country, but the Department of Agriculture has demonstrated that the tung tree can be successfully cultivated in this country, and especially in some sections of Florida. The tung tree is a common tree which started in Florida in 1824. Whole groves of tung trees were planted, and these groves are now producing to the extent of about 1,000 pounds of tung oil to the acre, a greater production than has been possible in China. The experiment has proved that the tree will mature in a profitable way in our state in less than two years. The life of the tung tree is about 20 years, with an annual production of about 1,000 pounds of tung oil. No insect or blight of any kind attacks the trees or nuts, and no other trees are killed by tung trees. The tung tree will flourish in any soil, and no artificial cultivation, less, it is said, than citrus fruits. The oil from the Florida nuts is said to be superior to that imported from China.

Idea of the Lifboat

Credited to Englishman. The first lifboat to be stationed on any coast in the world is said to have been converted to the purpose by English inventor, Lionel Lukin, in 1780. The year before he had taken a patent for an "independently acting" lifboat, which was stationed at Burnborough, on the Yorkshire coast of England, where by the aid of a small tug, the boat of the coast was set aside as a watchtower, from which they could be signalled whenever a vessel was seen to be in distress. Lukin's boat did good service and saved many lives. After an appalling shipwreck a committee of inquiry was set up at South Shields, in 1788, a committee of South Shields inhabitants offered a grant of £10,000 for the construction of Mr. Greathead built the first actual lifboat, naming it the "original." When in 1790, another ship was wrecked on the coast, the original lifboat every one to safety; whereas in the shipwreck of 1789 all hands were drowned in spite of helpless operators.

Handball Irish Pastime

Handball originated in Ireland about 1500 years ago, and is a form of tennis. It is now played by more men in America than anywhere else in the world. The first game was played in New York City about 1850, when William Biggs of Tipperary originated the game of hitting the ball with a fist and not with a racket. The first international match ever played was the Lawrence and the Duke of Devonshire, in 1887, with the prize of \$1,000 for the bulk of it. In 1890, Cork and H. in the United States. Lawler won games in New York and California. The game was introduced in two sporting zones, a small game and a four-wall game, both of which are played by amateurs in singles and doubles.

Royal Succession

According to the ancient laws, the king's line does not succeed to the throne if the king dies without issue. The succession passes through either the male or female line, but does not pass from one to the other. Likewise if a reigning queen dies her husband does not succeed to the throne. For instance, if a queen of the Netherlands should die her husband would become sovereign, not the queen's husband. Catherine the Great of Russia succeeded her husband Peter III, but the precedent was revolutionary.—Exchange.

If as successful there as she was in the county here Saturday, she will receive as a reward a trip to Washington, D. C., to compete in the national spelling trials and to take a short at the \$200 cash prize which will go to the national champion. 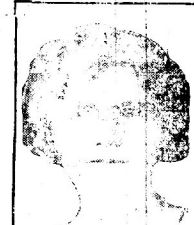

(From a Speech by C. W. Johnson, Cakland, Nebraska Merchant.)

"I have been in business 27 years, and seldom miss an issue of the local paper with an ad of some kind.

"I believe that the constant spitting of a machine gun does more execution than the occasional boom of a big Bertha. Its spit-coat shot gets results. So it is with advertising---the small ad run every week is better than the large ad run hit or miss. Consecutive advertising gets the business.

"We are told that American business now has hit the bottom, and that things will be better. Now is the time to advertise our wares and get the public to start buying.

"There are all kinds of advertising schemes, and I have dabbled in them all, but the advertising in the local newspaper is best and gives larger results from money spent.

"Put more time in writing your ads, and then talk it over with the printer. It pays in the long run to spend this extra time.

"Create a desire to possess, in your ad, and it will get the business.

"If you had a whole bushel of chain links it would not pull a load. Put them together in a continuous chain and you have a strong and powerful thing with which to pull a load.
