Says Discoveries Indicate That Ancient Race Burned Bodies of Males at Death

They discovered evidence of a race that practiced a form of cannibalism, where the bodies of males were burned and the remains used for various purposes.

If Floyd county has enough native teachers qualified to teach every day's job in this county, next year's native Floyd graduates will be hired as teachers for the 1932-33 term. The Floyd county board of education in session Monday-Friday agreed. Because of depleted funds held for the board of education for the various consolidated school districts, it was ordered by the board of education that terms extending beyond seven months for grade schools should be at the expense of the districts. Archer, Dwyer, Warrick, Bessie, Drift, Mes Dowell, Harold Layshouse and Betsy Layne districts will have only months school for the grades during the present term. Martin, Wayland and Lacey will have nine months for the seventh and eighth grades and eight months for the other grades. Garrett will have a nine-month term for the seventh and eighth grades and eight for the other grades.

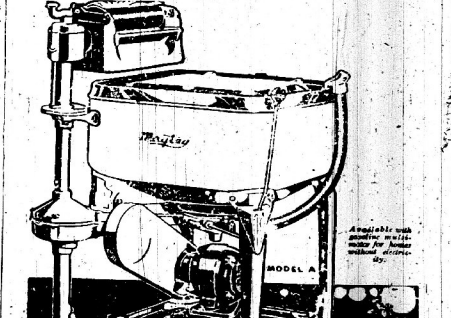

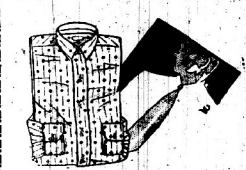

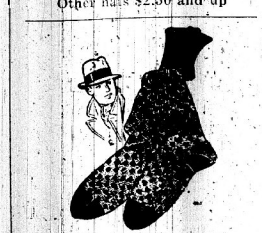

AMONG COUNTY AGENTS

More than 400 farm girls in Jefferson

county have enrolled in 431 clothing, canning, food and room improvement classes.

Members of homemakers' clubs in Henderson county are contributing to the needs of the poor families.

Assuming county farmers report a fine crop of limes which they plan to finish for an early market.

Forty-one Bath county fall clubbers are planning to grow tobacco this year.

Twenty-five Callaway county farmers will sow quite a few 2000 pounds of foreign lespezea seed.

The Trigg county agent has distributed several hundred plants of garden of sunflower size to feed a family.

Members of the Hopkins County Fruit Growers' Association will have 200 acres of bearing peach trees this year.

Garrett county farmers have sown seed corn to meet the local demand.

More than 100 Knott county farmers are planning to grow from one to six acres of tobacco each.

T. A. Walden, a Laurel county farmer, has begun a drainage system for a 32-acre field of fertile bottom land.

Johnson county farmers will grow 300 acres of tobacco, or the largest amount ever grown in that county.

Twenty Simpson county farmers will enroll in the tool-belt club.

FARM WOMEN PLAN BEAUTIFUL LAWNS

Farm women in the 26 Kentucky counties having home demonstration agents are cooperating in a program to develop and demonstrate the possibilities in beautiful farm home lawns. Twenty to 25 women in each county will this year improve their lawns according to suggestions made by the home demonstration agent and Y. M. Elliott, field agent in landscaping for the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky.

The first step in the program will be clearing the lawn of trash and rubbish. This is followed with filling in low places with soil or sand. Seed is then sown and the lawn rolled. This

may be done with a farm roller which has been to this enough to prevent mites and other insects. The seed mixture recommended consists of 1 part of Kentucky bluegrass and one part of redtop by weight. It is sown in a row in March and again in April in order to insure the first seed was not killed by late frosts.

Mr. Elliott stresses the sowing of lawn spots around back doors and porches. The slight amount of soil needed can be removed from a chesnut pasture without being missed. Cleaning the lawn of trash and leaves, filling in uneven places, sowing the seed and rolling completes the work to be done in March and April.

HOW TO AVOID 'SPRING FEVER'

The onions that appear in the spring are fat and all the other seeds that this delicately being sown in the spring are, to quote a popular song, "just around the corner waiting for you."

But before this joyous season arrives it would behoove the housewife to get ready for it by seeing that our bodies are functioning properly. It is well able to stand the onslaught of the changing season. The ancient and time-honored ailment we were warned to avoid with sulphur and molasses, is not so mythical as you think. It is really an outward evidence of the depletion of our bodily "tone," in other words, a sign of lack of stored-up vitality and energy that sometimes accompanies the inactive winter months.

The way then to avoid spring fever is to prepare the blood, furnish the body with the fuel it needs, and to supply, right now, of the minerals and vitamins necessary to health. Green vegetables and fruits should be plentiful in the diet, of course. An added source of energy for the time being is to eat some of the best foods supplied with an abundance of those foods which supply the essentials. Dried fruits, dates in particular, are extremely helpful, for they supply iron, copper, calcium, for the teeth and bones, besides other minerals and vitamins A and B.

Here are excellent spring recipes, all guaranteed good enough to dispel any anxieties of sulphur and molasses. Note that many of them contain rhubarb, a favorite spring-time delicacy.

Rhubarb Vandy

1 cup rhubarb 1 cup shredded 1 cup sugar 2 eggs 2 cups white

Wash rhubarb and cut with top piece into 1/2-inch pieces. Place rhubarb and sugar in slightly oiled pan and cook over low heat until juices begin to flow. Turn over and cook to consistency of marmalade, stirring frequently. Add sugar and egg, fold into mixture and stir again into stiffly beaten egg whites. Pipe with three-sherbet glasses; sprinkle with remaining marmalade. Chill thoroughly. Serve with cream or with meringue made from egg yolks and one cup of milk. This recipe will make six generous servings. This mix to make a loaf of fruit which has a tart flavor and deep red color.

Syrup Bran Bread

1 1/2 cups dark corn 1 1/2 cup seeded 1 cup syrup 2 cups raisins 1 tsp. soda 2 tsp. baking powder 1 1/4 cups sour milk 1 1/2 tsp. salt 1 1/2 cups bran 1/4 cup dry ingredients except bran. Mix liquids, add bran, raisins and dry ingredients. Bake in oiled loaf pan 45 minutes at 300 deg. F. for 15 minutes, increasing to 350 deg. F. and 100 deg. F. for the last 20 minutes.

Engery Salad

1 1/2 pkg. pasteurized 2 cups chopped 1 1/2 cups bran 2 cups seedless lettuce 1 cup cream cheese 2 cups raisins

Salad Dressing

Mince parsley by forcing the leaves into compact ball and cutting with scissors. Mash cheese with a fork and add parsley and raisins. Make sure necessary with cream or salad dressing. Stuff pitted dates with cheese mixture and serve on lettuce with favorite salad dressing of servings.

Rhubarb Betty

Melt butter and add rhubarb, raisins, sugar, orange rind and lemon juice. Put 1/2 of crumbs on bottom of pan, bake about 10 min. 1/2 rhubarb, sprinkle with 1/2 sugar. Salts are good. Measure of crumbs and remaining of the rhubarb and sugar mixture. Sprinkle orange juice over this and put rest of crumbs over top. Bake about 45 minutes. In long recipe, but over 400 deg. F. 1/4 of sugar and brown quickly. Serve plain or with hard or fancy sauce. Serves 8 to 10 people.
