HEALTH NEWS HEIGHT AND WEIGHT STANDARDS

The Department of Health in the United States has issued a series of standards for height and weight. These standards are based on the findings of a large study conducted by the National Health Survey. The study found that the average height of American men is 5 feet 7 inches, and the average weight is 150 pounds. For women, the average height is 5 feet 2 inches, and the average weight is 125 pounds. These standards are useful for determining whether a person is underweight, overweight, or of normal weight. Seven per cent below the amount a child should weigh for his height and age, is called normal underweight, and 20 per cent above, this weight is allowed as a normal overweight. With this wide range of 7 per cent below and 20 per cent above, children of all the slender and stocky types are included.

The value of estimating percentages when computing underweight when too strongly stressed, the say a child is 5 1/2 pounds underweight has a different meaning when the age and height of a child is considered. For instance, Mary Jones is 14 years old; she is 62 inches tall and weighs one hundred four and one-half pounds, but she should weigh one hundred and eight. This makes her five and one-half pounds underweight, and therefore falls within the 7 per cent limit and is eligible for a Blue Ribbon. Sally Smith is 11 years old, she is 52 inches tall and weighs fifty-nine and one-half pounds. She should weigh sixty-five, which makes her 5 1/2 pounds underweight, but she is 8 1/2 pounds underweight, and hence is just the 7 per cent limit, and is classed as an underweight child.

Children who are as much as 15 per cent underweight should have a check-up on their diet, and how much they eat. Children who are more than 10 per cent underweight should be put to bed for a week's rest. If after having rested and eaten a healthful diet, followed, they still do not gain, the diet should be changed up. The Moonlight Lady Of Bloody Rowan

(Continued from page one)

In Rowan county, Kentucky, by the "moonlight lady" Cora Wilson Stewart.

Mrs. Stewart was a daughter of the county, son and head in "Bloody Rowan" so called in the old days because of the feuds which set neighbor against neighbor and family against family. It bears, therefore, well known the value of an education. At sixteen Cora Wilson was a teacher, and in charge of the family campaign which had as its object professional training for a large flock of young brothers and sisters.

Mrs. Wilson was a good teacher. Moreover, she knew what hard-ship lay in the path of every child who attended her school and the school of her own mind in the county.

There were the long and difficult trails, the swollen streams, and the weary miles that had to be traversed foot or horseback before the school could be reached. In a few years she was Rowan county's first woman superintendent of schools.

The girls in the county teachers under her jurisdiction, and with every possible amount of help in school, Cora Wilson then Mrs. Stewart began to realize the crying need of the parents, especially mothers, who could not write to their own children and bring in their own mothers, who could not read the letters, they received, and who waited miles to bring these letters to "Miss Cora" to open and answer for them.

"There were, middle-aged men, who would write anything" to be able to read a newspaper.

"There were young men loitering on the mountain farms or trapping animals for distant markets who came to her to write the letters necessary to carry on business transactions. Many of Rowan county's common schools were of recent origin, and numbers of persons from eighteen to twenty years old had had no opportunity to attend one during their years."

Mrs. Stewart conceived an idea. She laid it before the county teachers. They countered in a body, and we read:

"On Labor Day of 1911, they dismissed their districts. It was thought that perhaps about three hundred adults might be crowded for a short session of classes in reading and writing, to be held during the moonlight nights of the fall and winter months. The roads would be too difficult to travel in the dark of the moon."

"Folks who could already read and write were invited to come, too. They could help the beginning pupils."

"Three hundred?"

"More than four times that number turned out on the night the first class opened. Presently the complete roll of the literate in Rowan county!"

"The enthusiasm on-hand. The pupils worked hard, as, of course, did the teachers."

"Children helped their fathers and mothers of family antagonisms of long standing faded away as neighbors shared the same bench and read from the same book."

"How they all hungered and thirsted to learn! How they worked to make their writing more perfect, leaning to the back over desks built for their children. What happiness they knew when they wrote their first letters—to the

teacher, to far-away relatives of reason or daughter, whose surprise and joy a letter from mother or father was longly imagined.

The second year the moonlight schools grew. More than sixteen hundred attended the classes in Rowan county, and the contagion began to creep over the borders into surrounding counties.

"By the third year classes were established all over Kentucky, and in many Southern and other States, such as South Carolina and other States."

"The new followers, on the part of governors and legislative National organizations originally formed for other projects, turned their attention to advancing the work begun in Rowan county. There had been health crusades and educational campaigns but somehow no one had ever thought of just teaching people to read and write."

Those who have learned to read and write in the natural course of events may find it hard to imagine the thrill that came to these people when they could form strange characters, into words, write letters and read those sent to them. Late in the twenties, had happened; the impossible had been achieved. By the light of their eyes, often set free for a long time, when the shadows fell early on the ridge and slipped swiftly down into the hollows, they could open the vast store of treasure that lies in papers, books, and magazines.

Ten years ago, and almost up to the immediate present, 8 per cent of our citizens were unable to read or write, as compared with only .65 per cent of German citizens in a like un-

fortunate condition. Indeed, the United States, richest nation in the world, has long stood tenth from the top of the list in illiteracy ratings. Only a little while ago there were five million illiterate Americans.

That President Hoover entrusted to Secretary W.P. Carter the task of appointing a commission to take up the drive against illiteracy, and Mrs. Cora Wilson Stewart is now designated director of the National Health Council's illiterate campaign.

While Miss Stewart visited her in her office here to see her work, she showed Miss Beardsley a pile of letters from the members of a national class in Tennessee, who had learned to read and write last summer.

"ROAD CLOSED—DETOUR"

"Road Closed. Detour U. S. 23 via Salyersville to Paintsville." So reads in effect the sign at the corner of Court street and Second avenue here, notifying motorists of pavins of the Mayo Trail between Prestonsburg and Van Lear.

The "closed" sign at Allen with direct traffic up Left Beaver Creek via Abner fork of Pikeville. Those whose risibilities are easily aroused may laugh. Those who are more thoughtful will find nothing funny about the matter.

In wet weather these signs should read simply: "ROAD CLOSED." The specified detours under such conditions are impassable, and need not be designated.

It is not for the convenience of the joy-rider or that person who wishes to drive a hundred miles or more to show that we remonstrate against this arrangement. The cause of dissatisfaction goes deeper.

In the first place, there is the isolation of the county seat and a rather thickly settled section of the county, barring ordinary communication with the outside world.

Then suppose that in rainy weather, with these alleged detours impassable, some person residing in this locality is stricken critically ill, an operation imperative to the saving of a life. Appendicitis is a disease which does not permit of procrastination; an hour may be the dividing line between life and death. Suppose a local resident is stricken at eleven o'clock forenoon, shortly after the train up-river has run. It is six hours until a train running into Paintsville and a hospital arrives. The road into Martin to the hospital there is impassable. What the result?

It is a heavy price to pay for the economy contemplated by the state highway commission.

The common principles of humanity, in such a case, leaves but two alternatives:

Either place these detours in such condition that they are traversable in any kind of weather and at all times; or—

Open one-half of the road at the time, leaving the other half open to traffic.

WILL PIKE COUNTY LAUGH?

Unless Floyd county stirs from its lethargy, Pike county is going to enjoy a hearty laugh up its sleeve.

As matters now stand, according to reliable reports, this county is not far away from losing the location of what has been planned to be the biggest gas compressor station in the world. If Floyd county loses this project, it will be to Pike county.

The reports which we have received say that Pike county has extended an attractive offer to the Columbia Gas & Electric Company, the organization which is constructing the 25-inch main line from this county to the eastern coast and which plans the mammoth compressor station and gasoline plant.

A gas pipeline of this kind will be worth thousands of dollars annually to the county in which it is located. The county in which it is built will derive this revenue, of course, from taxation.

It would be a good investment to extend any reasonable offer which might cause the plant to be located in Floyd county.

Floyd county will profit no less from such an investment than the county would. Whatever such an enterprise is worth to the county it is worth to Floyd.

A reliable informant denotes that the station can be built in any county at less cost to the owners than it can be constructed in this county. It is quite probable that our offer would not or possibly have to be as tempting as that made by our neighboring neighbors.

It is time that we awaken to the fact that every new business enterprise in Floyd county means something of vital importance to the county. To new business we can at least say, "Welcome," instead of taking it as a matter of course.

Modern Home Superior to That of the Past

Scientific investigation has proved that the modern home is superior to that of the past. Old-time houses were necessarily better built than modern ones. Just because the timbers were bigger and hand-hewn does not mean that they were more scientifically put together.

Important comparison of the work of old builders with that of their modern successors made by Donald G. Tandy for the Woman's Home Companion, gave the following interesting conclusions:

"Old houses did not have insulation in the outside walls. Plastering was not so good as it is now. Plastering was done in a way that made it porous. Chimneys did not have metal throats and frequently several flues ran together. Modern chimneys have terracotta tile lining, which is not only smooth, but which in outside thickness is equivalent to four inches of brick.

"Floors were usually only one thickness, whereas now we use two layers of board with sound-deadening felt between. The wide floor boards which were so appreciated in old houses were practical in their day because they were laid in ledges which were not thoroughly heated. But in modern homes with stona heat wide boards are more likely to swell and open up. They have to be put down by a special process—screped and sanded in addition to being sanded."

Steel Pen Quickly Put Quill Out of Business The first steel pens were not made until the late 18th century. They had silver nibs which did not wear in use.

During Victorian times the pen product of Birmingham amounted to 40,000,000 gross per year, and by 1892 it had grown to 120,000,000. The fountain pen has been the means of putting this latter figure to about one-third.

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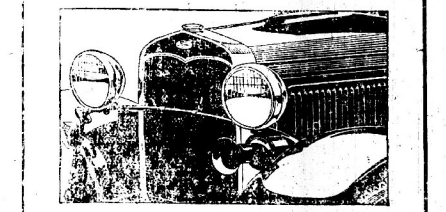

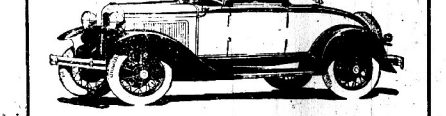
