Legend Of Swift's Lost Mine Revived By Finding Skeleton

The legend of Swift's silver mine is revived by the discovery that upon the skeletal remains of a man, found in a cave near the mouth of the Big Sandy river, was a silver mine. The skeleton was found in a cave just under the top of a cliff, and was found on the farm of Mrs. John Ward by Willie Clay, 12, a boy of that place.

ON THE FARM

COWS IMPORTANT IN THE FAMILY LIVING

Cows contribute much to the family living. Milk is no satisfactory substitute as a food and is considered essential to the proper growth of children. Cream, butterfat and cottage cheese are nutritious and wholesome foods that can be obtained from the home supply of milk with a moderate amount of labor and without the purchase of expensive equipment.

The supply of milk sufficient for a well-fed family would furnish a quart of whole milk daily for each child, a pint for each adult and such additional amount as may be necessary to obtain butter and other products desired.

The "raise your own food" program being sponsored by the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky, includes a recommendation that each farm family have one or more cows. Two cows freshening several months apart will supply milk and other dairy products to care for the needs of six to nine people.

SAVS SANITATION CUT CHICK LOSSES

The clean-check program followed in the farm of Edward Clark in Garrard county has almost completely eliminated losses, according to his report to the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky.

Mr. Clark lost 100 of 405 chicks, or 25 per cent, in 1929, before he blood-tested his flock. He began blood-testing that year, and his losses in 1930 were only a little more than 4 per cent. This year his losses have been less than 1 per cent.

Mr. Clark not only uses hatching eggs from blood-tested hens, but also practices sanitation in brooding, and raises the chicks on clean ground.

DAIRY FARMERS NEED MORE HAY

The dairy department of the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky, is urging farmers to grow more hay for their cows this year. Reserves supplies have been exhausted. The drought-damaged clover and alfalfa sowed last year. Farmers, therefore, are urged to sow larger acreages of soybeans and cowpeas, in order to provide hay for next winter.

Figures given by the department indicate that three-fourths of a ton is a ton and a quarter of hay per cow is required whereilage is fed, and a ton to a ton and a half of hay where noilage is available.

Since the average yield of soybeans in Kentucky is about a ton and a half to the acre, approximately an acre of soybeans or cowpeas should be planted for each cow to be wintered. If no other hay or silage is available, ifilage is available best as two-thirds of an acre per cow will provide enough hay in an ordinary year.

WELL AND WINDMILL SUPPLY FARM WATER

Using two second-hand boilers as a storage tank, and a windmill to pump water from a well, E. M. Wilson, a Warren county farmer, has installed a complete farmstead water system at a cost of less than \$200. He now has water pressure not only in the house but piped to every hold on the farm.

The trouble occurred last Saturday evening on the head of Green Hook Fork of Kenner Creek near Whitesburg. The two rollers were welded together to make a storage tank 20 feet high, which is located on an elevation near the house. The windmill, about 1900 feet away, which has been operating for about 35 years, keeps the cove full. A room in the house was made into a bathroom, and water piped to the kitchen sink. The also was laid to all beds, and the stock always has a supply of good water. Mr. Wilson and his son did most of the work in installing the system.

Earl G. Welch, of the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky, and County Agent John Brown, who recently inspected the system on the Wilson farm, believe that it represents a method that might be used to solve the water problem on many Kentucky farms.

ANNOUNCE SHORT POULTRY COURSE

The seventh annual poultry short course will be given at the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky, June 29 to July 3. This is a practical course designed especially for farmers and women and others engaged in the raising of poultry. It consists of the normal handling of chickens in feeding, culling and other operations, the study of incubators, brooders, and other equipment, and talks by farmers and county agents, and members of the poultry department at the college, and other colleges and experiment stations. The course will be free to all men and women. Approximately 200 persons usually attend.

MOREHEAD HAS BIG FIRE LOSS

Morehead, Ky., May 8. - Fire, which authorities say was of incendiary origin, almost completely destroyed the building occupied by the North Hat Flour, Meal and Feed Mill and the feed and packing establishment of J. A. Hayes and C. L. Bruce here early this morning, scattering an estimated amount of \$12,000 which was partially covered by insurance.

The fire which destroyed the building was the second which broke out

here, during the night storm which began in time to extinguish the first. The initial call came about 11 o'clock at night, firemen finding a blaze inside a mill which they put out before it had done much damage.

At 2:30 o'clock this morning another fire started from the rear of the ice plant, gutting the building before the apparatus and the firemen arrived on the scene.

Discovery of kerosene soaked rags and newspapers led to the theory of incendiary origin.

The only part of the building left after the fire was the ice house where the sawmill passed ice kept in from burning like the remainder. In addition to the feed store and ice plant the building was also used for storage purposes by Cross's Ashland Transfer Company and the Seaton Hall Transfer Company of Lexington.
