WHITE AND BLACK

Two white men were brought into Prestonsburg Tuesday as suspects in the murder of an aged negro near Weeksbury. They were brought in quietly; only a small percentage of Floyd county's population knows of this murder; the men will be given legal justice, doubtless, without a hint of violence to mar the proceedings.

They may be innocent—that is not for The Times to say. It merely has occurred to us to draw a parallel.

Suppose the two suspects in the case were negroes, both young, and the victim an aged white man, a quiet, peaceable citizen who had been murdered while at the homely task of picking greens for the family table. Suppose the finger of suspicion pointed at either or both of these negroes as the men who fired a bullet through the old man's brain and left his lifeless body in the woods, to be found, happen-chance.

Would the negroes be given an impartial trial? No—at least one negro paid a mob in this county with his life in expiation of a crime no more dastardly. Elsewhere, the same penalty has been exacted with as little formality.

This is not to accuse any person of murder. It is written with the sole purpose of causing Floyd county citizens to consider the injustice of the insane mob spirit and, in the name of humanity, to insure to the oppressed, whatever their color or circumstances may be, justice by legal trial.

HEALTH NEWS

MILK IS BOTH FOOD AND DRINK Milk is not only a palatable drink but our most important food. Not all kinds of food can make new tissue—some reach brain or muscle. Milk is a unique food since it furnishes some of all the material necessary for building tissue, and it also supplies energy for work and play and warmth. The need for all these building material is greatest during early life, the period of most rapid growth.

MILK PRODUCTS ARE AVAILABLE FOODS Milk is an easily digested form of fat and contains large amounts of the growth-stimulating vitamin A. Children who are receiving whole milk and plenty of green vegetables are growing without it or if necessary, but some babies in addition to whole milk is well taken to be the average child.

HOW TO USE MILK Whole milk is the best form of milk for the child. For all its fats, fat, sugar, protein, minerals and vitamins are necessary for growth. Children properly trained from infancy will drink milk at every meal. Most babies for milk to be given suggested to children by the parents' distrust. For it. Parents also should drink milk as an example to their children.

Milk should be kept in a cool place until used. In cities and towns pasteurized milk should be bought—never raw milk unless it is certified, and it should be used within 36 hours of pasteurization. In rural districts where pasteurized milk cannot be had only milk from tuberculin-tested cows, produced and handled under good conditions, should be used. As much care should be taken with milk for use at the homes as for distribution to neighbors as is taken in the larger dairies.

A WELL-ROUNDED DIET Milk is an indispensable food for the child, but it should not be used as the only food after the early months of infancy. Milk needs supplementing to supply the child with minerals and vitamins after the early months of life for...

raw foods should be given daily to every child. In infancy, fruit juices should be given, and later fresh and such vegetables as shredded lettuce, celery, carrots or cabbage. Meat, fish and eggs make the diet more palatable, and enrich the food with protein as well as minerals and vitamins. Fresh green vegetables are necessary for acids and roughage.

WHAT MILK TO BUY The cleanest and best milk available should be bought. Whole milk, either fresh or canned, should be bought for children, unless the doctor advises otherwise. When good liquid milk is not obtainable, either dried or evaporated milk may be used. Milk is portable and is easily combined with disease germs from such unclean sources as milk cans, and should be boiled at once, kept clean, and covered, and handled carefully throughout by healthy persons.

Proper pasteurization, which is heating for at least 30 minutes at a temperature that kills disease germs (143 deg. F.) is the final process necessary to make milk safe. It does not make poor milk a good food, but it adds an important factor of safety. The quality and the conditions of production should be as good for milk that is to be pasteurized as for milk that is to be sold raw.

In cities and towns pasteurized milk should be bought—never raw milk unless it is certified, and it should be used within 36 hours of pasteurization. In rural districts where pasteurized milk cannot be had only milk from tuberculin-tested cows, produced and handled under good conditions, should be used. 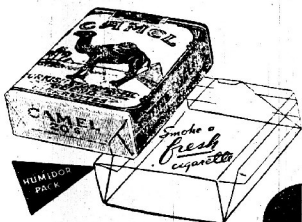
