## TO EMULATE 'ALFALFA BILL'

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 11.—Governors of the principal bituminous coal producing states have been invited by Governor Sampson to a conference at Lexington early this month to consider the exercise of state police power in bringing relief to the coal industry. Sampson said he had received requests from coal miners and operators suggesting that methods employed in the oil fields of Oklahoma and Texas might be necessary to remedy unfavorable conditions in the coal industry.

Mother Earth's Age The earth is 2,000,000,000 years old, according to the estimate of Prof. Dr. Otto Hahn, director of the Kaiser Wilhelm Institute at Berlin. The noted physicist bases his calculations on the quantity of lead to be found on the surface of the earth.

The progress made recently in the study of radioactive substances and the disintegration of the atom enables us to fix the age of the world with fair accuracy, the professor told an audience of German scientists. Uranium and thorium, contained in certain minerals, have, in the course of millions of years, been broken up into uranium lead and thorium lead. The lead findings help us to determine the age of the earth at 2,000,000,000 years.

Old Story Disproved There is an often reported story credited to the historian, Harvey Rice, that Moses Cleveland's exploring and surveying party started up the Chagrin river, mistaking it for the Cuyahoga, and that upon discovering the error Cleveland gave it this name as representative of the state of his feelings.

It appears, however, that this story has little foundation, for on maps made before the Revolution the river was called the Chagrin. The name is no doubt from an Indian word signifying "Stagnant" or "Stagnant" and to mean "clear." One map issued in 1745 calls it the Elk river.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

His father could not bear to see a moment of daylight pass unless he knew his sons were out of the house. One day the father came to the field where the son was plowing and found his plow stuck in the ground. The son was not going to be a minister. The father said to the son, "The field was cursed by God."

**Children Enrolled in Old English Colleges**

A curious possibility of the turning of the wheel is suggested by the plea which is being made for an earlier entry into the educational path by order that distressed modern parents may be relieved a little earlier of the gear of maintenance of sons and, presumably, daughters. **Demand for Ambergis Greater Than Supply**

Treasure trove was recently thrown up on a Pacific coast beach in the form of a hoard of ambergis, at least that was what the discoverer called it. Ambergis, a heavy stone in now often used in jewelry, has been a good possession for centuries in some of the high priced ambergis. Ambergis, a mineral in history and in fiction, and from time to time it has brought a measure of wealth to those who have been fortunate enough to find a piece of it. This strange substance comes either from the stomach or the intestines of the sea worm, and is composed of the bodies of earth shells, on which the whole feeds. **Remains of Old Roman City**

Tomb is a ruined city, 23 miles southeast of Baton, in the department of Conquest, Acadia, Canada. Thamus was a Roman general after the defeat of Gnaeus, governor of Africa, by the Arabs in 647.

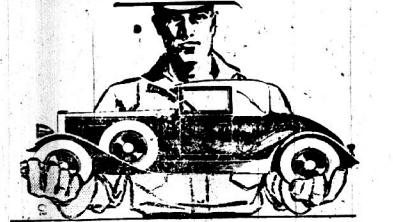
