He was released under \$2,000 bond. Walker died as the result of injuries sustained a few weeks ago on the Mayo Trail near Harold when the automobile in which he was a passenger was struck by Salisbury's auto and then by a car. Walker was riding on the back of the car.

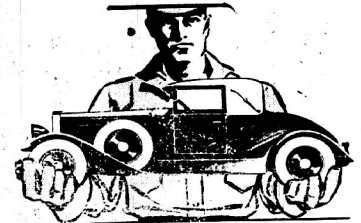

WHEN VICTORY SLEPPED FROM WASHINGTON'S GRASP

In the early morning fog of October 4, 1777, George Washington, with characteristic vigor and decision, attacking the British troops at Germantown, Pennsylvania, The Americans, supposedly dispersed by their recent defeat at Brandywine, Howe considered incapable of so bold a stroke. But General Washington made a night march in order to surprise the enemy. He believed he had succeeded and wrote Congress to that effect, but evidence later obtained from British records makes the complete surprise somewhat doubtful.

At any rate, the Americans at first seemed headed toward complete victory. Washington and his officers believed the day won when suddenly the Continentals, and accompanying militia were taken completely by surprise. Instead of following up the advantage gained at first, Washington saw his men hastily retreat.

This battle, says the United States George Washington Bicentennial Commission, was one of the half dozen, or so, of the Revolutionary campaigns in which General Washington commanded in person. Unfortunately he was denied victory by circumstances over which he had no control.

The delay occasioned by the attempt to take this garrison operated, together with the foggy darkness, to confuse the Americans. The firing at this place led the troops who had passed it to believe that a change in situation had occurred, and the retreat began.

The administration of this award was undertaken by the University in January when announcements were sent to every newspaper and school of journalism in the south. Editorials and inquiries have been received since this time.

Judges are now being selected with the aid of the Carnegie Peace Foundation, and the names of several nationally known specialists in peace work will shortly be announced. Each editorial is placed in a sealed envelope when it is received at the University, and kept for inspection by the judges at the end of the year.

No restrictions are placed on the length of the editorial. All requirements for submitting the entries are stated in a bulletin published by the Division of University Extension, 428

LACK OF FUNDS IS BAR TO GYM

Hope Held, However, That Needed Finances Can Be Raised

Red Cross Roll Call, October 1 to 15. Though plans to go ahead with the construction of a gymnasium at Prestonsburg high school have met a considerable obstacle this week in the opinion of the attorney general that the city board of education cannot legally issue a warrant in payment for this work, how it still held that, over the basketball season open, work on the project will have been completed.

Members of the city board of education who have been working on the matter and who were successful in getting the promise of help from the county board of education are still hopeful of effecting some means of realizing the dream of a modern gym for the school.

One remedial method of raising needed funds for this project and that of the construction of a high-angled classroom building, school building in West Virginia, was recently outlined this week by Mrs. O. T. Stephens, member of the city board of education, who has been instrumental in the work toward a gym. That is to build a bond issue, which would be voted upon by the people of both Prestonsburg and West Prestonsburg.

A bond issue of \$15,000, Dr. Stephens pointed out, would not only build the gym and the West Prestonsburg building, but would also be sufficient to retire outstanding indebtedness against the district. This done, he said, a 5 per cent sinking fund could be set aside to retire the bonds in 20 years without any taxation increase whatsoever and, in fact, with a possible 15 per cent tax reduction the first year.

It is held that both Prestonsburg and West Prestonsburg are so vitally interested in both of these building projects that, put to a vote, the bond issue would be approved.

CLINIC FOR AID OF CRIPPLED CHILDREN

The clinic for crippled children to be conducted by the Kentucky Crippled Children Commission at the Methodist Church, Prestonsburg, on October 14, is planned as an effort to locate every crippled child in Floyd and Johnson counties and give them the benefit of free examination and treatment offered by the state to all indigent cripples under 18 years of age.

Intensive work is being done among crippled children in the Big Sandy valley and children whose deformities can be corrected are taken to the Stephen and King's Daughters' hospital in Ashland, where the expense of treatment is borne by the Crippled Children Commission. Between 30 and 50 crippled children are cared for in Ashland each month.

Free examinations are helpful in locating new cases and providing examination for those who have been treated and may need further attention or some slight change in treatment. All cases in Floyd and Johnson counties that have been treated by the Kentucky Crippled Children Commission are urged to attend the Prestonsburg clinic for re-examination and check-up on their present physical condition.

A large attendance at the clinic is expected. Arrangements for transportation for children and parents are being made by the local committees under the chairmanship of J. B. Clark, of Prestonsburg, and Chas. A. Kirk, of Paintsville. Any person who knows of a crippled child in his community is requested to send the name, age, parents' name and address to either Mr. Clarke and Mr. Kirk, and the family will be visited by a member of the local committee or by Mrs. Bowling, field worker of the Kentucky Crippled Children Commission, who will remain in this district until after the clinic on October 14.

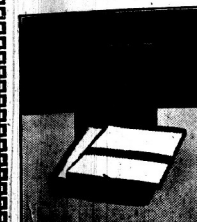

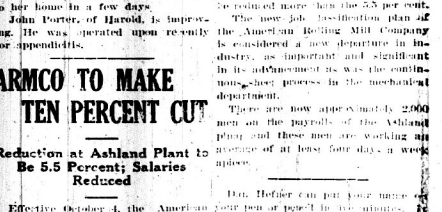
