In the general scale of human life the second is the most important of all periods of time to the individual.

The turn of a career is usually marked by decisions made on the spur of the moment. Inspiration for a life every classic and the intense desire to kill may both be born in an instant.

Take "Bink" Anderson, an escort to the immortal Keaton, for instance. A matter of less than a minute was the dividing line between hero and goat for him in the Notre Dame-Southern California game. THE ALL-CONFERENCE

The first all-conference football team to be selected this year for the Big Six by Atlanta College was composed of Mr. Jenkins, who writes sports for the Pike County News.

Now, we're not objecting to these selections; we think the boys are that good. But it strikes us as a bit funny that four Pikeville players were placed on the first team and four of the second and yet Pikeville, with these elite stars, could do no better than break even with Prestonsburg in two games and lose to Louisville. Those other three boys must have been pretty weak or else some of those stars were an inspiration at one point during and didn't work very well with their fellow-laborers.

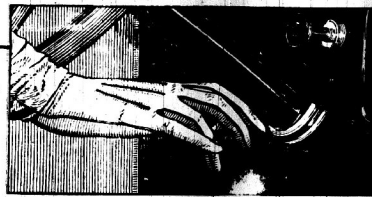

more general health considerations, nor personal medical problems. You may rightly go to your health center for information about home sanitation, the general rules of personal hygiene and the like. If you are planning a vacation, ask for advice about protecting your health when away from home, and for information about camp sanitation. Write your health officer to talk on those subjects in your community club, parent-teacher association or other organization to which

you may belong. If he cannot come himself, he will send a speaker qualified to discuss problems of personal or public health.

The point of the whole matter is that the twentieth century health official is less a sanitary policeman and more a leader in health promotion than was his predecessor. It is true, he stands ready to guard us from the dreaded communicable diseases, waiting to stalk the land once the bars of protection are let down. But in addition, all the officials of the health department—medical officers, nurses, inspectors—are equally ready to give advice about healthy living.

If you are in a community in which the health officials are not equipped to carry on all the health promotion services which have been described, probably you will find that your state health officer is prepared to furnish you with information upon health matters. The U. S. Public Health Service at Washington also has educational material which will be sent upon request.

In the Anderson circuit court Monday, Circuit Judge Charles C. Marshall ruled in favor of R. E. Garrison, editor and publisher of the Anderson News at Lawrenceburg, in his suit to compel the publication of itemized statements by the Lawrenceburg and Anderson county boards of education. Names as defendants in Mr. Garrison's petition were Charles A. Bouff, treasurer of the city board of education, and the Anderson National Bank, treasurer of the county board of education.

Mr. Garrison asked that the defendants prepare an itemized sworn statement of the public funds collected, held or disbursed by them or each of them, respectively, to be published in full in the Anderson News. Judge

Marshall upheld the law which requires publication of such statement by all officials handling public funds.

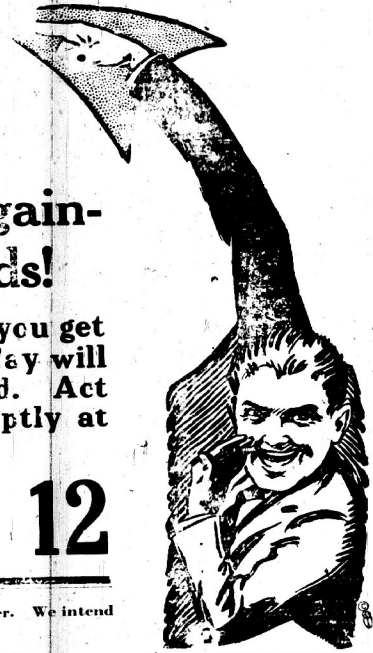

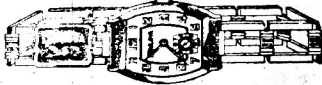
