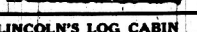

### LINCOLN'S LOG CABIN TO APPEAR AT '33 FAIR

Chicago, March 31.—The log cabin which Abraham Lincoln was born in the Wigwam in which he was nominated for the presidency and other buildings intimately associated with the life of the martyred president will appear in replica on Chicago's lakeshore as part of the Century of Progress exposition.

Application to erect, equip and operate the Lincoln Group on a site adjacent to the replica of Fort Dearborn has been accepted by the exposition from the Congress Construction Company, of Chicago.

According to the concessionaire, the group will be ready to open by June 1, a full year before the exposition's official opening on June 1, 1933.

For Lincoln's birthplace, the concessionaire proposes to erect a reproduction of the rude cabin at Hodgenville, Ky., which has stood as a shrine for Lincoln admirers for a century and a quarter. Nearby would stand a replica of Lincoln's boyhood home in what is now Lincoln, Ill., where the youthful rail-splitter clerked, studied Blackstone, wrestled with backwood opponents, demonstrated his ability to raise a barrel of whiskey to his lips and did the hundred-odd things that are part of the Lincoln tradition.

One of the most interesting buildings of the Lincoln group would be a replica of the Wigwam—the large frame building in which Lincoln was nominated for the presidency in 1830 and which stood at the corner of Lake and Market streets, in Chicago. In the Wigwam replica would be reproduction of rooms in the Springfield, Ill., home, which Lincoln left for Washington, and one or two rooms of the White House of Civil War days.

### Bicentennial Flower Gardens

This is the time of year to think about planting flower gardens. Every back yard, every strip of fertile soil, a potential flower garden and may be made to bloom in honor of the Father of His Country in this bicentennial year. Even as little as fifty cents worth of seeds will plant a garden which will give joy to hundreds, of passersby.

In a nation-wide broadcast at 4:30 p. m. Thursday, March 17, the secretary of agriculture, Arthur M. Hyde, officially opened the bicentennial flower garden campaign which is sponsored by the George Washington Bicentennial Commission, The United States Marine Band orchestra played a program of appropriate music and Congressman H. H. Hunt, associate director of the Commission, explained the proposed plan which is to have every vacant space all over the country bloom with flowers this summer in honor of the bicentennial year.

The Garden Club of America are cooperating in this plan, as well as school garden clubs and other local organizations. The bicentennial committee in each state is promoting interest in planting flowers in honor of the great celebration. The United States Department of Agriculture is co-operating also and horticultural experts attached to agricultural colleges in each state are doing effective work in promoting this activity, first in the schools of each state.

In consequence, hundreds of amateur gardeners will plant colonial flowers, annuals and perennials, which were familiar in the time of George Washington and which will bloom each year as a permanent memorial to his memory.

The United States, George Washington Bicentennial Commission has secured from the department of agriculture a list of flowers which will be familiar in colonial days, which will be particularly adaptable to this kind of celebration.

For bright sunshine with plenty of fertilizer and moisture: Over four feet high — common castor-bean, sunflower, sorghum, sorbita, milo, and Illinois corn, blue-aster, blue-summer chrysanthemum, cockscomb, four o'clock, gallardia, Arce marigold, platyodon, poppy, salviglossia, snapdragon and snow-on-the-mountain; 18 inches—Joh's-tears, nigunotto, and stock; 12 inches—calendula, California poppy, callunula, Canterbury French marigold, petunia, pink, Drummond phlox, and Iceland poppy; under 12 inches—ageratum, cockscomb, lobelia, portulaca, sweet alyssum and verben.

Of easier culture under ordinary garden conditions: Over 4 feet—sunflower; about 3 feet—Joseph's coat, love-lies-bleeding, heliopsis, coneflower, summer chrysanthemum, gallardia, marigold, poppy, and snow-on-the-mountain; about 18 inches—mignonette; about 12 inches—Cape-marigold, calandula, California poppy, balsam, sandcherry, petunia, Drummond phlox, pink, dwarf nasturtium, portulaca and sweet alyssum.

On light fertile soil—Gallardia, marigold, Drummond phlox and portulaca.  
On poor soil—Love-lies-bleeding, prince's-feather, Joseph's coat, Cape-marigold, portulaca, dwarf nasturtium, portulaca, grass-pink, sweet alyssum, garden balsam and calliopsis.

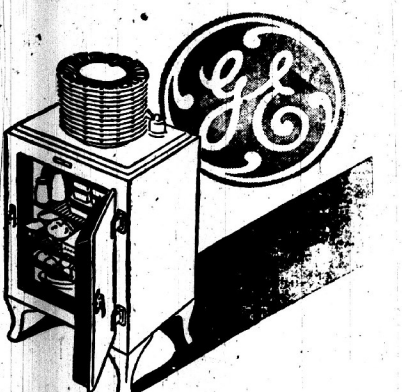

SIX IDEAS ON THE THREE-MEAL ART

The first prize in a recent radio cookery contest was won by the mother of four children, who keeps her cookie jar full of her prize winning "Jumbles." She makes, then, this way, and when you taste one you won't blame the judges: DATE JUMBLES: 2 1/2 cups flour, 3 tps. baking powder, 1 1/2 tsp. salt, 3/4 cup nut meats, 1/2 pkg. pasteurized dates, 1/2 cup shortening, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 8 eggs, grated rind of 1-2 oranges, and 1 tsp. orange juice.

AT OYSTERS THIS STYLE: Sort dirty oysters in a "K" in its name, lovers of the sea food will enjoy oysters. Everbody knows how to make oyster stew, but the blisful oyster is something else again. A well-known New York hotel chef, first on this specialty and gives his directions as follows: Heat a quart of oysters quickly to the boiling point in their own liquor; drain and strain the liquor. Then saute half a minced onion in three tablespoons butter, add a teaspoon salt, a half teaspoon paprika, and a teaspoon curry powder, if desired. Add, then, three tablespoons cornstarch to thicken the sauce and make it creamy. When frothy dilute with oyster liquor. Let simmer 10 minutes and keep hot over hot water. Pound the oysters, pass through a sieve, then reheat in the sauce. When ready to serve, dilute with hot milk or cream.

IN JACK HORNBER'S CORNER: The woman who makes homemade bread or rolls, should save one pan for a special sandwich loaf. Just knead one cup of finely cut pasteurized dates, into dough as it is being kneaded for the final rising in the pan. This makes an entirely different bread from the usual recipe, and is delicious spread with cream cheese and nuts.

MAKES CAKES KEEP LONGER: Cakes and cookies, made with syrup keep moist longer than when made with sugar, and, if flavored syrup is used, have a new and delightful flavor. In making this substitution in a recipe, remember that for each cup of corn syrup used to replace sugar,

the amount of the other liquid called for should be reduced by one-fourth cup.

CREOLE MAMMY TELLS HOW TO MAKE NEW ORLEANS PRALINES

"Way down yonder in New Orleans" they are famous for those little cream maple pasties that look so attractive and taste so good. A party of returning tourists, persuaded a praline "retrai" to tell her recipe. Here it is: New Orleans Pralines: 1 cup brown sugar, 2 cups white sugar, 3 tps. vanilla, 1/2 cup water, 2 tps. vanilla flavoring, 3/4 cup evaporated milk, and 1-2 cup. nuts. Put first five ingredients into a heavy sauce pan and cook with occasional stirring to a thick syrup. Add evaporated milk slowly so that mixture does not stop boiling. Stir continuously and cook to a soft ball stage (236 deg. F.). Cool. Add nuts. Beat until soft and creamy. When mixture is stiff, drop rapidly from a spoon onto a buttered sheet in patties about 1/4 inches in diameter. If candy becomes too stiff at the last to drop into smooth patties, add a little hot evaporated milk. Yield, 1-1 1/2 lbs.

Homemakers who like to keep everything neat on hand for picnics, candies, cookies and the score of other thing, it helps, make tasty, should take care not to remove the waxed paper which covers the package. Slip the top, to open, but leave the waxed paper on the package, and the contents will remain fresh-keeping until control used.

Evidently No Set Rule for Pursuers of Fame

Fame is not controlled, apparently, by any fixed law. She cannot be wooed successfully and she distributes her favors to the most unlikely. Lewis Dodgson was a learned, middle class Englishman with a turn for mathematics, and she bestowed her laurels at Christ Church college, Oxford, from 1855 to 1881. Notice the titles of some of his publications which he doubtless considered of importance, compared with his usual "Algebra" written for the entertainment of his small friend, Alice Lyell, and bringing to her and to her father's author something were the first priority. They are: "Euclid and His Modern Rivals," "Elements of Plane Algebraical Geometry and Analytical Treatise on Determinants." Few readers are kept from their mighty repose to peruse these formidable treatises. But "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland," 1865, and "through the Looking Glass," 1871, have become classic. Many of their strange words have found a sure place in the language. Fame must indeed, cherish as she considers this strange paradox.

No one was more astonished at the remarkable results of the thing he had casually done than Dodgson himself. Doubtless he regarded the matter quizzically, until fame and fortune began knocking at his door. It is all a confirmation of that ancient saying: "You never can tell."

Island Group Has Long Been Diplomatic "Nuts"

The word Dodecanese means "12 islands." They are in the Aegean sea near the coast of Asia Minor, and although long an obstacle to Graeco-Italian friendship have been confirmed by the treaties of London and Lausanne in Italian sovereignty. They are Rhodes, where the Colossus of Rhodes, one of the wonders of the ancient world, stood; Cos, Kalymnos, Leros, Naxos, Telos, Syme, Khalkis, Ankyra, Karpathos, Gexos, Patmos and Zipsos. They figure in classic Greek history to the time of the Greek Republic. The islands were under rule of the Turkish Armada from 1032 to 1205, paying annual tribute. In the war between Italy and Turkey in 1912 Italy occupied the islands, obtaining the aid of the islanders through a promise to make them autonomous. An assembly on Rhodes actually proclaimed the State of the Aegean and adopted a flag, but Italy would not release her hold. Greece has made several attempts to liberate the islands to her. The population, about 100,000, is almost wholly of Greek race. The islands are unimportant economically, except where being the only industry, but they are regarded as strategically important from a naval viewpoint. Italy has 10,000 men.

Schools in History

Schools may be said to date from the Macedonian period of Greek history. There were professional teachers of three kinds who taught reading, writing and arithmetic, music and gymnastics. According to the ancient literary teaching based in Rome with Livius Andronicus, a Greek brought to Rome as a slave, in 372 B. C. The Roman school system was the modern school. Education was carried on to a certain extent among the ancient Greeks. The average citizen was the chief seats of learning. Elementary schools were common among the Hebrews from about 6 A. D.

Coin Merely Curiosity

The so-called "peace" dollar was placed in circulation in January, 1932. The coin was made in commemoration of the arm conference at Washington. It has a new and very youthful head of Liberty on one side, and on the reverse a dove upon a mountain top, clutching an olive branch, struck by the rays of the sun, with the word "peace" beneath. The coin was not a regular issue and has been gathered in by collectors and by persons who wanted it as a keepsake.

**Extinction of Gigante**

"Cat" Hard to Explain  
 A giant lion—considerably larger than the African animal of today and representing one of the highest developments of "killing" effectiveness in the mammal world—lived in North America at about the time this continent first was invaded by human beings.  
 Bones of the "cat" which it has been found in the Latin deposits near Los Angeles by paleontologists of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, together with bones of about 1,000 other animals of the cat tribe.  
 "Fossil cats" was a true king of cats and probably of the whole animal world of his time. In the same deposits were found many bones of the almost equally ferocious "sabotodon" or saber-tooth cat. These of a form closely related to the present American species, and traces of a wild cat apparently identical with a type still living in California. All these animals were flesh eaters. They were drawn to the middle of the continent by the excesses of warm weather there, because trapped themselves, and perished.  
 The puzzle the paleontologists are trying to work out is why these huge and faithful creatures, strong and fierce enough to kill the food they wanted and to escape other animals, perished so completely at about the beginning of the historical period, while the little wildcat lived on into the present.

**All Virgin Islands Not Controlled by America**

The Virgin Islands are a group of some 10 of the northern end of the Leeward chain of the Lesser Antilles. They lie about 100 miles east of Porto Rico. About 30 of the eastern islands of the group are British and constitute one of the "protectorates" of governmental districts of the Leeward Islands colonial government. Also these three British Virgin Islands form an area of 58 square miles and a population of a little more than 5000.  
 Larger and more important are the western islands, formerly constituting the colony of the Danish West Indies. The chief of these are St. Croix (81 square miles), St. Thomas (28 square miles) and St. John (149 square miles), having a total population of about 20,000.  
 This western group was purchased by the United States in 1917 for \$25,000,000. They were given as an official name the "Virgin Islands of the United States." The Americans often refer to the latter half of the official name and forget all about the Virgin Islands which do not belong to the United States.
