## ONE FREE, OTHER GETS 21 YEARS IN FATAL SHOOTING

### Martin County Man Claims Self-Defense in Harlowe McCoy Shooting

#### THREATS CLAIMED

Hubert Garland, youthful farmer of Maryland fork of Wolf creek, Martin county, must serve 21 years in the state reformatory at Frankfort for the fatal shooting of Harlowe McCoy, merchant of Thomas, this county, last November, a jury in the Pike circuit court decided late Tuesday afternoon. J. R. Taylor, a jurist, presided over the murder indictment, was read on peremptory instructions when the court ruled that evidence was insufficient to warrant conviction.

McCoy was shot November 5, last, in the driveway of a house over the ownership of a plot of land on Maryland fork. According to the evidence brought out at the trial, the land was claimed by both McCoy and Garland's wife, Riley, a daughter of Prestonburg, who moved into the house and had returned into an agreement with Garland to vacate at any time Garland wanted the property. The defense contended that the defendant, making an agreement, had said he did so because with a pistol and told him that he was also testified that the first time he saw Mrs. Garland she came to him and his family in the road with a pistol and told him he would never get out of the section unless he entered into an agreement. On cross-examination, however, he testified that he did not see the pistol nor saw a "bullet" in her overcoat, which he thought was a pistol. McCoy's wife's testimony differed and she claimed that Mrs. Garland drew a weapon.

The shooting occurred when the Garlands were attempting to oust the McCoy, and move into the property. McCoy, it was said, was attempting to keep the Garlands out of the place. The defendant stated he thought McCoy was going to draw a pistol and fired with his shotgun. He also stated that W. R. Prater had fired at him. Prater, a friend of McCoy's, admitted shooting at Garland, but said he did so after Garland had shot McCoy.

Mrs. Garland and her father, Isaac Roberts, were also indicted with Garland and Taylor, were not on trial.

Harvey Prater, Williamson attorney who defended Garland and Taylor, sought to have the cases transferred from Pike county to Martin county.

The shooting occurred in Martin county, but the shooting occurred in the same day the shooting occurred a warrant, charging abduction, shooting and wounding was issued for Garland in Martin county, but an indictment was pending in the Pike circuit court when he was apprehended. For this reason Judge R. Monroe Fields refused to dismiss the case there. He did sustain the demand as to Mrs. Garland because she was arrested before the indictment was returned here.

One daughter, Mrs. John Morgan Goodman, resides in Pittsburg county.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock and burial was made in the cemetery at the forks of Bull Creek.

## TO LET CONTRACT ON NEW HIGHWAY

### Bids Sought on Part of Salversville-Hiadsman Route by Commission

This county, a highway will be constructed connecting the Garrett highway with the Allen-Hiadsman road, running from Salversville to Boss, this county, is seen in the order of the state highway commission recently asking for bids for construction of a part of this road in Magoffin county from Salversville to the mouth of the Trace fork of Licking river. Contract on this part of the route will be let at the July meeting of the commission.

The route, passing up Licking river, will pass down Salt Lick creek this county, to Boss, and will afford a short cut from the Garrett highway and central Kentucky. The Beaver road, with which it connects, is a part of Route 50, a highway which, when completed, will provide one of the state's most important highways, running across the southern part of Kentucky from this section to Fulton in the extreme western end of the state.

County Attorney Joe P. Tackett said this week that he was not in good authority that the Beaver road contract would be let at the July meeting of the highway commission. An active interest in the Salversville-Beaver Creek road will hasten work on that project in this county, it is held, since Zack Justice, state highway commissioner from this district, achieves practically whatever he sets out to do in the matter of road building in his district.

## MANDAMUS SOUGHT TO HASTEN TRIALS

### Frankfort, Ky., June 15—A mandamus was sought today in the court of appeals by James R. Dorman, banking commissioner, to compel Circuit Judge C. B. Wheeler, Prestonburg, to try five cases pending in the Floyd circuit court.

The mandamus was sought in the name of Mr. Dorman, as banking commissioner, and Henry C. Stephens, a special deputy banking commissioner in charge of the liquidation of the Bank of Warland, which closed its doors last August. B. F. Combs, Prestonburg attorney, filed the suit. The petition sets out that the bank has had pending for some time suits against five individuals to recover the amount of their deposits in the Bank of Warland, and that the defendant individuals having failed to answer within the specified time, the banking commissioner is entitled to a judgment.

The petition further charges that Judge Wheeler has refused to hear the cases, or to determine whether the banking commissioner is entitled to default judgment on his claims.

## FLOYD OFFICER IS FATALLY WOUNDED

### Willard Johnson Jailed Following Shooting of Hamilton Last Week

Deputy Constable William Hamilton, 48 years old, was shot and fatally wounded Thursday night at 7:30 o'clock by Willard Johnson, 46, when the officer essayed to investigate into the cause of pistol shots being fired at Johnson's home.

Johnson was arrested, shortly after the shooting took place, by Deputy Sheriff T. A. Bates, and was lodged in the county jail here Friday morning. Deputy Sheriff Bates, also "arrested" John Harris, son-in-law of Johnson, when he found a wash under the Johnson home and a still near the house.

Hamilton died in the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, a few hours after the shooting. He was shot twice, one bullet penetrating his head and the other his chest. Wounded, the officer is said to have returned Johnson's fire with one shot which failed to find its mark.

When the deputy constable stopped at the Johnson home upon hearing revolver shots, Johnson claimed that he had been shooting at a rat, it is said. Hamilton, it is claimed, stopped to take Johnson's pistol and when ordered to get continued walking through the yard toward the house. Johnson fired as the officer neared the steps leading into the house.

Five shots were fired by Johnson, it is alleged, but only two took effect in Hamilton's body. Deputy Sheriff Bates, said that when he arrested Johnson the latter's automatic pistol was empty. At the same time Hamilton's revolver was fully loaded, except for one empty shell.

The slain officer was a native of the Mill Creek, and was the son of Ed Hamilton. He is survived by his widow and seven children. He was paroled after having been sentenced to the state reformatory for one year for shooting and wounding Johnny McCown on Left Beaver Creek about three years ago. Johnson is the son of Will Johnson, and came to this county from Pike county a few years ago.

## NAB WOULD-BE SLAYER SUNDAY

### Harry Conley Lodged in Jail Here for Safekeeping; Shot Clarence Sherman

Harry Conley was lodged in the Floyd county jail Sunday by Sheriff W. M. Preston, of Johnson county, for safekeeping after having been arrested at the home of his mother at Haizer Hill on a charge of shooting and wounding with intent to kill Clarence Sherman, of Paintsville, three weeks ago, near East Point.

Though Conley had been reported as having declared that he would not be arrested, he was taken without difficulty when Sheriff Preston and sons, William and John H. Preston, found him in hiding in a clothes-dress of the Conley home. He will be given trial at the present term of the Johnson circuit court, it is expected.

Young Sherman is recovering, though it was believed at first that his wound would prove fatal. The youth was shot in the back as he was returning to his car after a slight collision with an automobile driven by Conley.

## SECOND HELD IN ROBBERY OF BANK

### Huntington Man, Attending Fiery Trial, Held as Fugitive

When he appeared in Paintsville Tuesday to attend the trial of Lawrence Powers, alleged member of the National Bank on March 9, a man giving his name as Wilson Jennings, Huntington, W. Va., was identified as one of the robber gang, was arrested and booked on a charge of robbery.

As Robert Meade, assistant cashier of the bank, entered the courthouse he recognized Jennings, he said, as one of the three men who entered the bank. He stopped into the sheriff's office summoned a deputy, and Jennings was arrested and charged with bank robbery.

Ross Lyons, cashier, who was abducted and given a brief ride in the robbers' automobile, also identified Jennings as one of the robbers, as did Mrs. Olive Shannon, another employee of the bank, denying the charge. He gave his occupation as a golf professional.

He was arraigned before Circuit Judge Frank Butler, his examining trial set for Tuesday, and his bond set at \$10,000. In default of bond he was taken to jail. Jennings said he met Powers when the latter was a member of the Lexington police department several years ago.

Officers said a companion of Jennings, seen with him earlier in the day, could not be found after Jennings' arrest. Descriptions of him, the authorities said, tallied with that of another of the bank robbers.

Powers was brought to the Floyd county jail for safekeeping following his arrest in an Ashland hospital a few days after the robbery.

## SEARCH MADE FOR CAUSE OF NOISE RADIO RECEPTION

### Tests were made here Thursday last week by Mr. Baker, electrical engineer of the Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company, to determine if power line leaks are responsible for radio interference which has been annoying radio fans here for some time.

The power company's line was cut at the sub-station here and also at May's Branch, below here. The interference continued, and thus it was proved that the power company is not responsible for radio noise.

Action of the power company was taken at the request of E. H. Koch, radio operator, of this place, who has been investigating the matter since here in connection with his radio work. Since the Kentucky and West Virginia Power company has been proved not responsible for the noise it is held that the cause of the noise is elsewhere.

## MANY FAIL TO FILE EXPENSES

### Numerous Trustees Candidates Learn of Ruling Too Late to Comply

Not more than half of the candidates for school trustee at the election to be held Saturday, June 2, were apprised of the necessity of filing an expense account 15 days before the election in time to fill this requirement, and, as a result, considerable worry exists in the minds of would-be trustees in the 126 school sub-districts of the county this week.

The law provides that any trustee, county, municipal or district candidate must file an expense account 15 days prior to the election, but County Superintendent John Stephens did not learn until Thursday of the attorney general's ruling in the event of school elections. Out in the county that this law covered sub-district candidates did not learn of the ruling until Friday, a few hours before expiration of the time limit for filing expense accounts, and the county clerk's office here was kept busy until midnight Friday, receiving candidates' statements of expenses.

Failure to file an expense account does not, however, interfere with any candidate placing his name on the poll sheet for consideration by the voters, County Superintendent Stephens said Tuesday. A trustee elected after having failed to comply with this section of the law may lose his contest, though, it is held.

As a result of the new law providing for these trustees from each school sub-district, at least 500 candidates are believed to be seeking trusteeship in this county, and the election, it is predicted, will be the hottest in years.

HEALTH NEWS

THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

According to the United States Public Health Service, the public health nurse is a constructive force for the betterment of the individual, the family, and the community health. Her work has three aspects: It is educational, preventive, and curative. It is not a simple task to uproot habits which have become deeply entrenched, especially when they are to be supplanted by other habits which are or seem to be less convenient or comfortable. Here is the public health nurse's best opportunity and responsibility to explain and demonstrate to individuals the principles of personal hygiene and to help them apply it in their everyday living in their homes and schools and their workplaces. Her special function is that of prevention of disease through early recognition of symptoms, and through persuading men and women to seek medical advice before they are ill. Preventive measures include the supervision of expectant mothers, the supervision of the health of babies and preschool children, efforts to have the physical defects of children diagnosed and corrected, to assist in improving the sanitary conditions of homes and school buildings, to find undiagnosed cases of tuberculosis, scarlet fever, and other communicable diseases, and to stimulate the acceptance of protective measures for the prevention of diphtheria, scarlet fever and typhoid. These and many other preventive activities are part of her daily routine.

The third function of the public health nurse is curative, assisting in restoring the sick to health. Actual nursing care in the homes of the poor often is part of the work of a public health nurse, and in this connection she not only cares for the indigent sick but teaches some member of the family how to care for the sick in the absence of the public health nurse. Her effect upon the health of others; and so kind in her dealing with the sick as to the teaching of health and the prevention of disease.

The influence of the public health nurse should be far-reaching because of her intimate contact with the home and because of her ability to help with her own hands when there is sickness or suffering. Perhaps no approach gives the public health nurse a better entry into the homes of the people than that of caring for the sick. We have found that demonstration to the family of the practice of cleanliness of sickroom hygiene, of skilled nursing care, does more to convert them unconditionally to a more healthful way of living than could be done by mere verbal instruction, no matter how carefully given. 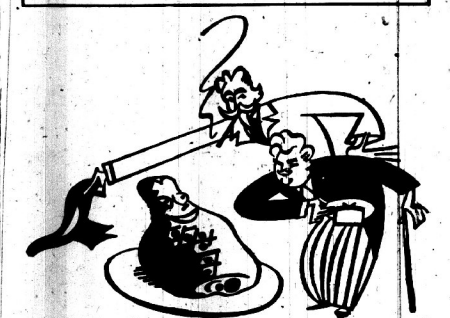

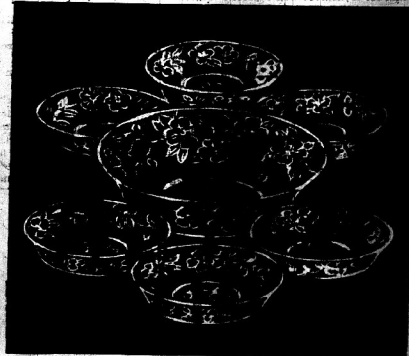
