- Veal Pot Pie with Dumplings

Veal Pot Pie with Dumplings: In a kettle containing 1 1/2 quarts boiling water, place 2 lbs. shoulder veal and 1 onion, and simmer for 1 hour season and 1/2 teaspoon Worcester-shire Sauce. Add 2 cups diced potatoes and cook until they are nearly done. Add 1/2 cup Tomato Ketchup. Thicken, using 3 table-spoons flour, softened in 1/2 cup cold water. Place dumplings on top of meat, cover closely and steam for 12 minutes. Be sure the dumplings rest on the meat, and cannot sink into the liquid, as this is what causes dumplings to be heavy. If one wished to have a sauce to serve, part of the liquid may be removed before putting the dumplings into the kettle.

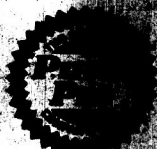

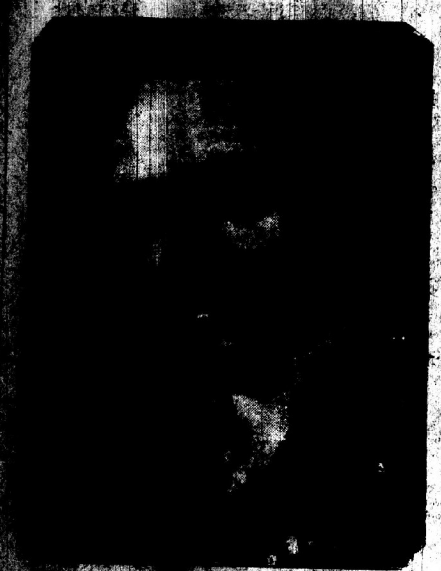

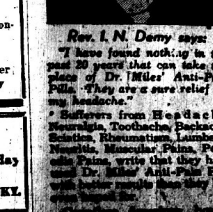
