114 INDICTMENTS MADE BY GRAND JURY IN 9 DAYS

Nine Murder Counts Returned Primary Election Probe Futile

ADJOURNS WEDNESDAY

Reporting 114 indictments from the examination of 196 witnesses during its nine-day session, the grand jury concluded its work Wednesday afternoon.

Investigation of the recent primary election consumed much of the grand jury's time but no indictments were made.

Undoubtedly reported Wednesday include the following charging serious crimes:

- Grand Juror Marion Akers, sporting with intent to kill James Yates; Jehnuel Scott, murder of Burnett near Garrett; J. T. Thomas, cutting and wounding; Max Bentley; Kelly Prater, forgery; Corbett, Ansurgo, grand larceny; Lewis Robinson, striking and wounding; Walter Clark, grand larceny; W. M. Blackett, Matt Miles and Mildred Ouseford, jarracking at Westbury.

Report of the grand jury follows: To the Honorable C. B. Wheeler, Judge of the Grand Circuit Court.

We, the grand jury, sitting in session at the regular September term of the Grand Circuit Court, 1932, would most respectfully submit this as our final report to this court.

We have been in session nine consecutive days and have examined 196 witnesses and returned 114 indictments, a large number of which have been indictments for felonies. We have found from our investigations that since the close of the last term of this court there seems to have been a wave of recklessness among the people of our county that has resulted in the loss of the lives of approximately a dozen men and the shooting, maiming, and cutting and wounding of several others. We have endeavored to uncover, as we believe, the cause of these serious crimes and have returned indictments against all parties towards whom the evidence of guilt points.

We heartily endorse and commend the Honorable C. B. Wheeler, circuit judge, and the Honorable G. P. Stephens, commonwealth's attorney, for their untiring and continued efforts to bring about such punishment of these criminals that it will deter others who might have been inclined to pursue the same course. While we are writing this report these two officials are engaged in the trial of a murder case and we have returned within the last few days and we are especially gratified at the promptness of the trial of these criminals and we believe that just and appropriate punishment will be meted out to the guilty.

Hints for the Household.

FOR SEPTEMBER HOUSEHOLD HINTS

In September—our thoughts turn back to entertaining. The simple afternoon teas are now in order. Sandwiches are a natural refreshment. Not the filling ones of the good old summer time, but pretty and dainty ones. The "open" sandwiches especially.

Fruit Sandwiches

Fresh currants—washed and mixed with cream cheese.

Brushed pineapple — and cream cheese.

Fresh strawberry, — sliced thin and sprinkled with powdered sugar. When placed between buttered home-made bread. These are very delicious.

An unusual filling—Take cucumber, celery, pineapple and black walnuts. Chop together and mix with French dressing.

COOKING RECIPES

New Salad

2 cups of crushed pineapple (drained)

1 cup of diced celery

2 red pimentos

Method: Drain pineapple. Cut up celery. Chop pimentos. Mix with mayonnaise and serve on crisp lettuce.

Orange Jelly

8 pounds of grapes

3 cups of water

1 pound of sugar to each cup of juice

Method: Crush grapes from the water over them. Boil for 15 minutes. Strain juice through a cloth. Add 1 pound of sugar to each cup of juice. Mix well. This comes to a boil. Boil for 10 minutes. Take from fire and pour into jelly glasses.

Being Hum with Stuffed Potatoes

1 1/2 pound slice of ham

Flour—sifted

Method: Pare and slice the potatoes. Place a layer of sliced potatoes in bottom of greased baking pan. Sprinkle with butter, sugar and a little onion. Repeat until you have filled all potatoes. Cover with salt. Lay ham on very top. Keep in hot oven until time to cook. Allow at least an hour for this to bake.
