FIGHTING CASHIER ROUTS BANK BANDITS

Scott Execution Set for March 9 by Judge Wheeler Here Saturday

Slayer of Stephens Accepts Sentence Without Emotion
Comment—To Remain in Jail Here Till March 1—
Defense Plans Appeal—Small Crowd Hears Death Sentence Pronounced

Sentence of death was pronounced upon Ismael Scott, condemned slayer of Martin Stephens, Garrett merchant, by Circuit Judge C. B. Wheeler Saturday morning as one of the judge's last official acts from the bench before adjournment of the November term of court. Scott is to die on March 9, Judge Wheeler ordered, also directing that he remain in the custody of Jailer W. A. Dingus until March 1, when he is to be taken to Middlesville.

The death decree was delivered without undue fuss or flurry, and the defendant received the mandate with little if any show of emotion. He did not speak, only blinked his eyes rapidly as sentence was passed. A below-average courtroom crowd was present. With the defendant was his attorney, O. C. Hall, whose motion for new trial was overruled Thursday by Judge Wheeler.

Mr. Hall announced, however, that he would carry the case to the court of appeals.

Leaving Allen in a white-Kellogg sedan, the would-be robbers fled in the direction of Prestonsburg, leaving the car near the home of D. H. Mry, a mile below Allen, however, the auto struck a horse ridden by Walter Walker, of Dwaie, seriously injuring both horse and rider and wrecking the auto. There the occupants of the car took to the hills.

Meanwhile, word had been flashed to officers throughout the section, requesting a look-out for the bandits and a posse of approximately 50 men were en route to begin a search of the countryside about Allen.

At the time identified as a party close being an all ticket found in the wrecked car and Mr. Allen's description of the men who entered the bank. The ticket was issued to George Hobson, a brother of Leif's-Hobson, from the Mt. Vernon, Ky. Station, Centralia, Washington. Mr. Allen's description of the two men was that both were between 20 and 35 years old, of medium build and build, fairly well dressed.

As he and the other member of his party were leaving the hill at the W. D. Martin branch, half a mile above Allen, two men sighted two men crouched back in a ledge, ordering them to surrender, young Hill was evidently seized by the pair who asked him to come up and talk. At his repeated demand of their surrender they ducked around the point, taking opposite directions in their flight. Hobson came into plain view of Hill and deputies Stumgo and Willis, and the former fired two shots at the fleeing man. At the second shot Hobson stopped and lifted his hands.

Hobson told his captors, Judge Hill said, that he was sorry Walker was struck by the car, and his companion also fired at him and his companion as they fled from the band. "It was a bad break," he was quoted as saying.

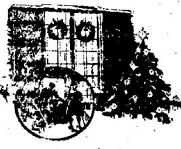

Christmas Decorations
Holly and mistletoe, pretty candles, gold and silver stars, poinsettias, cranberries make a cheap pretty and cheerful decoration. Holly wreaths hung outside of windows keep fresh much longer than when hung inside.

Cranberry Apple Sauce
1 cup of ground apples.
1 cup of sugar.
1 cup of chopped cranberries.
Method: Mix well. Serve uncooked.

BAKING MINTS
Crabapple Mint
4 pounds of lean beef.
2 pounds of hard suet.
1/2 cup of salt.
2 pounds of sugar.
2 quarts of cider.
4 pounds of seeded raisins.
2 pounds of currants.
1/2 pound of citron.
1 quart of pickle juice.
1 tablespoon of cinnamon.
1/2 tablespoon of powdered clove.
1 tablespoon of allspice.
1 1/2 cups of stock (the meat was cooked in).
1 lemon soaked in hot water.
Salt.
Method: Cover meat and suet with boiling water and cook until tender. Chop meat. Chop apples and add to meat. Then add sugar, cider, raisins, currants, citron, suet and stock. Heat gradually and cook slowly for two hours. Then add juices and spices that in large crock and cover. A small quantity can be made. A jar of mince

Ginger Cookie Mix
3 cups of flour.
3 teaspoons of baking powder.
One-third teaspoon of salt.
1/2 teaspoon of ginger.
One-third cup of shortening.
Two-thirds cup of molasses.
One-third cup of brown sugar.
1 egg.
Method: Sift flour, baking powder, salt and ginger together. Mix molasses, egg, melted shortening and sugar together. Add dry ingredients. This makes a soft dough. Shape in form of men, animals, or plain cookies. Bake in a moderate oven 10 to 15 minutes. Grease pan. Use cloves, rice or currants for eyes and buttons.
