Jilson Settlers, Lost Hope Is On Way To France in London

New York, Dec. 9.—From Lost Hope in the Kentucky mountains. During the Christmas season of 1914, Mr. Settlers, who was living until recently, has been a familiar figure at mountain fairs and entertainments near his home.

Following his "discovery" a few years ago by Miss Jean Thomas, of New York, and his introduction to the world by E. L. Hochstetler, the aged fiddler has played to a large audience. He has made frequent radio appearances.

Mr. Settlers, one of the few fiddlers who handles the bow with his left hand, possessed of a remarkable memory, both for words and music, he has built up an extensive repertoire of ballads, many of them harking back to the England and Scotland of three centuries ago.

Miss Thomas, who is accompanying the fiddler to England, in founder of the American Folk Song Society. Among other active members of the society are Irvin S. Cobb and Alice Hegan Rice, native Kentuckians, along with some of the most noted literary figures in the country.

Following his return, Mr. Settlers expects to retire to his cabin in "Lost Hope Hollow."

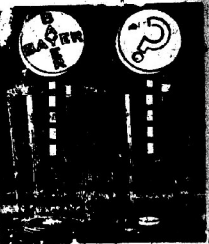

There is the fun of arranging a happy Christmas for the folks in to get very tempting and inviting. Just think! Knowing what plants they prefer, it is not very much of a feat, in perfecting an appealing menu. Allow me to suggest one which I'm sure they'll like. Here it is:
Christmas Dinner Menu
 First, cups.
 Roast turkey with dressing.
 Cranberry sauce.
 Mashed potatoes.
 Peas or creamed onions.
 Potatoes with gravy.
 Bread, butter, jelly and coffee.
 Mince pie and cheese.

How to Prepare Turkey
 Wash and clean turkey well. Fill both pockets with favorite dressing. Sew up with stout white string. Tie legs together. Season with salt and pepper. Place in roasting pan. Sprinkle a little bacon grease over top. Put in hot oven without water until a nice brown. Then pour little water in pan. Cover—baste frequently. Be sure and cook turkey a long time.

Colored Pineapple
 These are made like apple rings or blushing apples and are served hot or cold as a garnish for platters.
 Method: Make a syrup in a frying pan with ten cents' worth of cinnamon drops, one-half cup of sugar and 1 cup of water. Cook slices of pineapple in this syrup until red.

 Cover with sugar to taste. Let stand for two or three hours in ice-box.

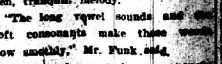
Doughnuts

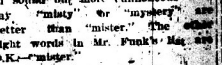
