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### MID-WINTER CONFERENCE HEARS LEGION'S 1933 PROGRAM OUTLINED

#### STATE COMMITTEES REPORT

Louisville, Ky. — All phases of Legion activities were discussed at the 2nd Annual Mid-Winter Conference of Post officers and state committee members which closed at the Kentucky Hotel, Louisville, Sunday, December 11. Recommending policies of hard work, education of more war orphans, more community relief work, higher civic improvement, more cooperation with the American Legion Auxiliary, and a larger membership was the gist of the committee's reports.

Back of all the reports was the theme of the entire meeting that the Legion in Kentucky could best answer its critics by a more ambitious community service program, and one that will put each of the thousands of Legionnaires in Kentucky to work for the betterment of Kentucky.

### HIGH LIGHTS IN THE 1933 PROGRAM OF THE AMERICAN LEGION OF KENTUCKY

Louisville, Ky.—The most ambitious membership program ever adopted was outlined by the State Membership Chairman, J. Q. Lacker. Plans call for every old member to be enrolled before Jan. 20, 1933, and for every post to be over the top by their 1933 quota ...

Each post is urged to contact all war veterans of college age and use their take advantage of the state scholarship available, and not then in one of the five state colleges.

An Auxiliary unit in every post of the American Legion is urged for the 1933 program.

The Americanism committee urged the Legion membership to exert its influence to see that state honor awards are passed after the 1933 Anniversary; is repealed; advised against recognition of Soviet Russia; and against cancellation of war debts.

The National Defense committee recommended that the Legionnaire use every available means of combatting any cuts in military appropriations.

The Rehabilitation committee endorsed and urged the Legion in Kentucky to carry out the mandate of the Portland National Convention and oppose any plan to retract benefits.

The Community Service committee urges every post of the Legion in Kentucky to adopt some kind of a community service project for the coming year.

The Child Welfare committee urged that every post see that every orphan in the state is made available to an orphan department, president with the World War Veterans of America.
