INJUNCTION SUIT THWARTS FISCAL COURT'S SESSION

Temporary Restraining Order Granted County Treasurer Meeting Slated April 11

COURT ORGANIZED

Proposed meeting of the Floyd fiscal court, set for Tuesday morning this week, at 10 o'clock for the purpose of raising a county treasurer was blocked shortly before the hour for the meeting by a temporary restraining order granted by the Floyd circuit court to County Treasurer W. J. Reynolds, who seeks to enjoin the magistrates from effecting his removal from office.

Hearing on the injunction proceeding will be held Tuesday, April 10. In his petition Mr. Reynolds alleges that election of the magistrates seeking to effect his removal was illegal and that they, therefore, have no authority to act as justices; that the special session attempted on March 30 was illegal for the reason that the county judge was in the county and able to attend such meeting, and that the county judge did not call the meeting in accordance with the written request of the magistrates.

The plaintiff further claims that no term of the fiscal court is to be held, as provided by law, except on the first Tuesday in October and the fourth Tuesday in December of each year.

Claiming that he was legally appointed county treasurer by the fiscal court, first in October, 1933 and again in April, 1934, Mr. Reynolds asked that his title to the office be quieted for four years from the first Tuesday in April, 1933, and that the magistrates be enjoined from meeting or attempting to meet on the fiscal court on April 3 or any date other than the first Tuesday in October or the fourth Tuesday in December, or at any special meeting.

The restraining order granted Judge Cassell was later modified upon petition of County Attorney Forest D. Short so as to permit the magistrates to meet and organize Tuesday morning and cause to be entered upon the court's minute book the reason for its failure to carry out the purpose of the meeting. Magistrate Willie Hall, was named to preside in the absence of County Judge W. L. Stumbo, and the meeting was adjourned until April 11 at 10 o'clock.

MINE WORKERS IN MEETING MONDAY

Mine workers from all parts of Floyd county, numbering, it is estimated, more than 500, gathered at the high school gymnasium here Monday afternoon in a meeting, the main purpose of which was merely that of a pep rally.

Spokesmen for the United Mine Workers of America, addressing the miners, outlined the growth of the organization and cited the recent cut in hours and wage increase as proof of the material good accruing to workers from their affiliation with the union.

Hours for mine workers, effective Tuesday, are seven hours a day instead of eight as heretofore, and the wage boost is approximately 25 per cent.

Prater Creek Youth Accidentally Wounded

A son of Pearl Akers, of Prater Creek, is believed to have been fatally wounded last week when an automobile pistol dropped from a shoulder holster he was wearing and was accidentally discharged, the bullet penetrating his side and emerging near his spine.

Dr. Orvis Gearheart, of Martin, was called soon after young Akers was shot. The bullet which struck the boy, who is 17 years old, was of .38-caliber. Development of pneumonia is feared.

COUNTY AND FEDERAL OFFICERS IN RAID ON MUD CREEK MARCH 31

Floyd county and federal officers in a raid on Mud Creek captured one still, several gallons of whiskey and approximately 700 gallons of beer Saturday, March 31. In the raid were Federal Agents A. J. May, Jr., and Vince Trimble, Sheriff M. T. Stumbo, Deputies Will Willis, Elson Kendrick, J. D. Fitzpatrick, Walker Hall and Matthews Dewey Roberts. A still said to be the property of Homer Clark was destroyed. On the branch at the home of Charles Tackel nine gallons of whiskey were found. Homes of Lewis Adkins and Brock Adkins were searched, but only evidence of liquor found at each place were in the drunken condition of the two men. Both were arrested. Oscar Mills also was arrested on a drunkness charge.

Retreating toward Prestonsburg, the officers raided a still operated by Saffie Hatfield and Adam Crisp. In the former place two pots of whiskey were found and in Crisp's place about two gallons of whiskey was found, it was said. Those captured executed bond.

CONVICT POISONER OF KNOTT DEPUTY

Woman Draws Life Term Halt Gets 21 Years in Election Slandering Trial

Lola Barton, Sassafras restaurant owner, was given a life term in the penitentiary, Wednesday last week, by a jury of the Knott circuit court for the fatal poisoning of Deputy Sheriff Troy Adams. The woman, it was alleged, poured cyanide into a glass of beer the deputy was drinking at the Sassafras restaurant.

Alton Mullins, chief wiper with the motor of Alton Mullins by the election Day shooting at Upper Beaver precinct in Knott county, in which three men were shot to death ended Friday with Hall receiving a 21-year term.

Nash Hall is also alleged to have killed Ballard Hall in the gun battle. Harrison Mullins, brother of Alton, will be given three years for killing Olin Hall, brother to Nash Will Hall, another brother of Nash Hall, was acquitted.

Attorney J. D. Bond, of Prestonsburg, acted as Commonwealth's Attorney in the election shooting case when Commonwealth's Attorney O. C. Hall disqualified.

Governor Laffoon Tuesday Appointed D. E. Arnett member of the county board of education from Division 1.

Appointment of a fifth member to the county board of education to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. W. H. Horn was left over to Governor Laffoon Tuesday for the four members of the board in session Monday were deadlocked in their attempt to name a man for the post.

Turned Combs and Dr. Dewey Osborne stuck to their plan through the day for Jeff Moles, former board member to fill the vacancy. Equally adamant in their decision were W. H. Richardson and Harry Baisden, who voted for D. E. Arnett. Election of Mr. Arnett would have meant the selection, it is believed, of Ballard Hunter for superintendent of schools to succeed John Stephens, present superintendent. Mr. Arnett, it is believed, would support Town N. Taylor, superintendent, it is believed.

In order to thwart a possible move to have Mr. Moles resume his office as board member from District 1 until a successor legally qualifies, Attorney J. D. Bond, at 10 o'clock Monday morning filed in the clerk's office of the Floyd circuit court for Ballard Hunter an injunction to restrain Mr. Moles from serving on the board.

A special meeting of the board was held Monday night for the election of a superintendent. It is expected to be made.

Other business transacted by the board at its meeting Monday included appointment of Mrs. Myrtle Hooper as county textbook agent for the years 1934-35 and 1935-36 and an agreement to pay the home economics department of Deane Lyane high school \$80 for Smith-Huggins work done in the department.

PRICE HELD FOR AUSTIN SLAYING

Johnson Man Fatally Struck Monday Afternoon On Passenger Train

Charlie Price is held in the Johnson county jail as the slayer of Tom Austin, 35 years old, who was slashed to death Monday afternoon on Big Sandy passenger train. No charges are laid between Duskirk and Ottum stations.

Austin was stabbed twice in the region of his heart and died a few minutes after being taken from the train at Ottum.

According to the report of the killing received here, Austin made a remark to Price's cousin, a girl, which Price resented. When price asked Austin not to annoy the girl, this report continues, Austin struck him and threatened to cut his throat. Price then stabbed Austin.

Price surrendered to Constable Travis at Ottum and was taken to Philadelphia Tuesday morning. His victim is survived by his widow and three children. Austin was in Prestonsburg Monday, a few hours before his death, and while here had his hair cut by Frank Price, local barber, and a brother of the man who killed Austin.

BOY, 9, IS VICTIM OF RUPTURED APPENDIX

Gomer Dinwood Whitaker, nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Whitaker, of Esllin, died March 13 at the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, as the result of a ruptured appendix. The youthful victim was Mr. and Mrs. Whitaker's only child.

Funeral rites were conducted March 15 at Esllin under the direction of C. D. Ryan, of Martin, with burial following in the Esllin cemetery.

10 JAILED AFTER SKEANS IS SHOT

Ballot Breaks Leg, Fist or Club Breaks Nose in W. P'Burg Row

Seven men and three women were jailed here Saturday afternoon following a drunken row in West Prestonsburg in which one man's leg was broken by a ballot, another's nose was broken by a blow from a fist or a club and a third was badly beaten about the head.

The fight took place in Howard's Cash Store, Mrs. Alfred Howard, owner of the store, and Ad Stone were jailed on charges of shooting and wounding. One of the pair is believed to have shot Jay Skeans, who was taken by the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, his leg being broken between the knee and ankle. The other man was probably Ed Sturgeon, who was beaten about the head.

Shot by J. W. Stumbo and Deputies J. D. Fitzpatrick, Elson Kendrick, Frank Hatfield, and Clyde Clark arrested 10 persons shortly after the shooting. Those arrested were Ad Stone, Ed Sturgeon, Mandy Howard, Alce Stephens, Stran Nelson, Duff Crook, "Red" Miller, Ben Franklin, Edie Harman and Sport Hale. All executed bond.

Five gallons of whiskey were found at the home of Milt Nelson, husband of Mrs. Susan Nelson.

Former Floyd Officer, Victim Wednesday, Local Woman Slightly Injured

Mel Sturgill, former Floyd county deputy sheriff, was instantly killed Wednesday afternoon when the auto in which he was a passenger collided with a bottling company truck from Pikeville at a curve on the Mayo Trail near Broadbottom, Pike county. He was about 40 years old.

Miss Gladys Cole, of Prestonsburg, another passenger, was slightly hurt, sustaining cuts about her face and head. A man named Batts, from Beaver Creek, driver of the car, and Effie Henshell, fourth member of the party, were jailed at Pikeville Wednesday night.

Mr. Sturgill's neck was broken and his throat lacerated when the left side of the car, the side on which he was sitting in the rear seat, was torn away as it crashed with the truck. His body was taken to Toiler Creek Wednesday night to the home of the victim where burial will be made.

The victim was a well-known man and had many friends throughout the county. He was a brother of Jailer B. L. Sturgill, and leaves, besides his widow and children, several brothers and sisters.

Clerk Clerk Troy B. Sturgill reported Saturday night from Louisville, where he was called by the death of Bryan Smith.

FLAMES CHASE 30 FROM HOMES

Blaze at Martin Last Saturday Morning Destroys Three Buildings

Approximately 30 persons were routed from their lodgings early Saturday morning at Martin when fire consumed three buildings. The buildings, owned by Lee Preston, of Martin, were of frame construction and the flames spread rapidly. The blaze started from the restaurant and boarding house operated by H. E. Wilson when Mrs. Wilson started an electric washer in the wash room at the rear of the building. Mrs. Wilson was badly burned about the face.

Arrival of three locomotives, from the nearby railway yards, saved one small building which was occupied by St. John's church and family. Other structures saved were the old town hall and jail, a former restaurant building and the former Martin school headquarters. It was said here this week that none of the property was insured.

HARRISON FRAZIER RE-CAPTURED AT HOME IN COUNTY

Sheriff's posse Nabs Crisp's Slayer, Wednesday Morn- ing on Stephens Branch

ESCAPED FEB. 11

A fugitive since the night of February 11 when he and Louis Robinson escaped jail, a few hours after a spy in the Floyd circuit court had been dismissed as hopelessly dead looked in pondering the degree of his guilt in the slaying of J. E. Frank, well-known Martin man, Harrison Frazier, former Floyd county officer, was back in the county jail here Wednesday morning.

Frazier was arrested at his home in Stephens Branch, between 7 and 9 o'clock Wednesday morning by a posse led by Sheriff M. T. Stumbo. In the posse were Deputy Sheriffs Will J. D. Fitzpatrick, Vernon Cash, Elson Kendrick, Pollock Arthur, Blackburn, of Prestonsburg, and Henry Fitzpatrick, of Martin.

Capture of Frazier was effected without difficulty. When the posse arrived at his home, he was asleep but awakened to report suspicion where he was found.

Following his capture, a reward of \$500 was posted by Jailer B. L. Sturgill for his capture. Tommie Robinson, who escaped with him, was recaptured near Deale by G. W. Gray, special agent, several weeks ago and is now in the state reformatory at Frankfort serving time on his 10-year term for the slaying of Billy Nelson at West Prestonsburg.

A second trial of Frazier may be held during the present term of court.

TO DRAFT PLEA FOR SCHOOL AID

Unless Revenue Raised, Per Capita to Sink to \$2.61, Estimate

County Superintendent John Stephens said this week that a meeting of county teachers will be held at the high school gymnasium here Saturday afternoon, March 14, at 1 o'clock for the purpose of organizing the teachers and drafting resolutions calling upon the state legislature to enact revenue measures for the support of the school system and other state agencies in need of financial aid.

Unless revenue is obtained for the schools, according to information received by Mr. Stephens, the per capita rate this year will fall to \$2.61, and salaries of the county and city teachers will be going east and west.

BODY OF CHILD FOUND, SUNDAY

Body of Mary, six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Allen, who fell into the flood waters of Beaver creek Wednesday last week, was discovered Sunday morning at the mouth of creek near Lakey, almost 10 miles below where the child was drowned.

The girl fell from a stump in the creek near his parents' home while playing with his eight-year-old brother, Billy. Subsequent search, in which approximately 500 persons participated, was fruitless until Sunday.

Funeral services for the little girl were conducted at Lakey Monday, with burial following in the family cemetery. The child was a grandson of the late Rev. Allen and of Mrs. Martha Allen, who survives.

Paisley Shawl Towns

Near Glasgow, Scotland

Paisley is the name of a manufacturing town in the neighborhood of Glasgow in Scotland. While it is a very ancient town, its fame in the world rests largely upon the fact that it was during the 18th century the original and principal center of the manufacture of the famous shawls.

Paisley has been a textile town for more than 200 years and some of its old streets commemorate in quaint names the fact that the industry has been a doublet there—there are Lava, Gauze, India, Cotton, Silk, Thread and Shuttle streets.

The shawl was introduced to Europe and American use from the east, a curious minor consequence of the French invasion of Egypt in 1798. Officers of the European army conducted to that country and kind to their ladies some of the fine Turkish and India shawls of the Egyptian bazaars. These got a fashion, and shawls began to be made in Europe to meet the demand.

Paisley took up their manufacture, and the article which became known as the Paisley shawl was of what was called "baraza work" and was an attempt to produce in this town effects which in the Indian cashmere shawls were produced by the needle.

Paisley workmanship was so good and their merchandising so successful that the manufacture of shawls rose rapidly to the point where, about 1833, the town was turning out shawls to the value of 1,000,000 pounds a year.

Egypt Horse Race Center

For All-Weather Africa

Egypt is the center of Arab horse racing in North Africa. Almost 1,200 Arab ponies, in addition to 40-45 Arabian stallions and a number of Arab greyhounds, are maintained on the racing circuit conducted by the Jockey Club of Egypt at the Gezira Sporting club and the Helwan Sporting club, in Cairo, and the Alexandria Sporting club, in Alexandria.

The Bedouins are great breeders and bring their horses long distances from Syria and Palestine, sometimes riding them all the way. The best of the Arab ponies that have won in native races may be worth from \$50 to \$150. If they win one of the big Egyptian races in their class, their value may mount to \$2,500 or more. It is his pony win, the Bedouin blossoms into gorgeous flowing apparel and the shaggy beard is clearly visible on his chest and curly-combed until he shines like a thoroughbred.

Racing is held throughout the year, in Alexandria in winter and at Helwan and Gezira in winter time.

Under the rules of the Jockey club, since horses in Egypt are thus divided: Class A—All horses across Arab and countrybreds. This has meant a good proportion of English, French and Australian horses of thoroughbred extraction.

Superstitions Attached to Colorful Turquoises

Turquoises were at one time so plentiful in Mexico that the Aztec Indians which they wore for their religious ceremonies, says the Washington Star. The ones and little blue were cemented together over a cedar frame to make a covering for the face. The teeth and eyes were inlays of mother of pearl.

Some say turquoise, or turkis, is named after Turkey, whence emerald stones that were used in old European jewelry. Really the first ones came from Persia, but that was before the wealth of the blue and green stones in America. Long ago the Apache and Pima Indians of southwestern United States used them in quantities for turquoise, unlike most stones, not hard to be mined, but appear on the surface of the ground in bright, greenish-blue spots and veins. The various peoples that have been particularly fond of turquoises have attached most curious superstitions to them. The opaque blue and green color of the stones is suggestive of the freshness of grass, the blue of water. That's why Persians and Egyptians carried them in the desert. The Persians fastened them to the tails of their horses, mules and camels. In Europe it was once believed that the word turquoise meant victorious, or fortunate. Because the turquoise frequently changes color, turning from a sky-blue shade to a riper greenish hue, people fastened a superstition to it, saying that the stone shone when the air was pure, but became dim when ill fortune was about.

Runs Own Cold Storage Plant. The milk is one animal which can refute the claims of vegetarians—it is America's pre-eminent exponent of an entirely carnivorous diet—and it is not particular whether it dines on chicken, duck or veal on the half shell. When none of these courses are available, fish, frogs, snails, rabbits, or a fat muskrat is relished by this meat gourmet. Tamed also, milk, vision, water, rest and love offer the milk operator its own cold storage plant. Not content with enough for one party feast, the bloodthirsty animal frequently kills far beyond its immediate desires for food and stores the surplus in pockets in its dens during the winter, according to old trappers.

Evolution of Race Horse. With reference to the origin of the Arab horse, there is an interesting Assyrian tablet in the British museum which shows that the horses of the period bore an astonishing resemblance to the present-day Arab, says a letter to the London Times. One of the most famous breeders of Arab ponies, one Ta'abben Ta'alla, had his stables at Hama, and he contrived to keep it pure or less so from the depredations of the Turks during the war. His animals were well known on the Bombay and Poona race courses. It would seem that the breed has existed in and about Mosul since the days of Nineveh, very much in the same form.

Captured Valuable Cargo. A Spanish galleon, with a galleon prize in tow, was captured in Matanzas bay, Cuba, in September, 1625, by Admiral Pietr Heyn, commander of the Dutch Atlantic fleet. Doubtless and pieces of eight for those who dream of treasure. Such was the cargo of this galleon—11,000,000 ducats and church plate of immense value. Tradition relates that all was taken by the Dutch command, but examination of authentic historical records reveals that the Spaniards, during the chase at night, dropped much of the most valuable cargo overboard into Matanzas bay.
