## BALLARD HUNTER CHOSEN HEAD OF COUNTY SCHOOLS

To Enter Office July 1, Succeeding John Stephens As Superintendent

### THREE MEMBERS VOTE

Ballard Hunter, a member of the Martin high school faculty, Saturday was elected superintendent of Floyd county schools, to succeed Superintendent John Stephens July 1. Election of Mr. Hunter came after a hot campaign during the weeks preceding the November election, at which members of the county board of education were elected. Three came the disqualification of Bert W. E. Horn—who, by the way, has twice won race for membership to the county board of education but who just as often has lost through contest and legal technicality—and the matter of the election of a superintendent was thrown 1925 the deepest recesses. Appointment of D. B. Arnett to succeed Mr. Horn was made, and Mr. Hunter's election was assured.

Four for the board meeting was set at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, and when Chairman Leathers, board member, arrived, he was asked to preside as chairman. Mr. Ombas asked the other members to await the arrival of Dr. Dewey Osborne, sixth member, from Byrro, and when the others proceeded with the business of the meeting, he withdrew. Within a few minutes, Mr. Hunter was elected, his salary set at \$3,000 a year and a term of two years.

Frazier was taken to Winchester Monday by Sheriff M. T. Stumbo and Deputy Sheriff J. D. Fitzpatrick. He will remain there until returned here for trial April 30. With him went Travis Collier to the reform school at Greendale, where he was sentenced to remain until he is 21 for stealing two railroad locomotives from the Martin railroad yards a few weeks ago. Before returning here, the officers went to Hillsboro, O., to return Keener Conley to jail here to await trial for the slaying of Frank Ratliff near Huysville a few months ago.

## COUNTY TREASURER BULL CREEK FARMER VICTIM OF APOPLEXY

Unaid April 23; Fiscal Court Permitted to Meet Wednesday

Members of the Floyd fiscal court were restrained Tuesday by Circuit Judge John W. Candill from meeting to remove or to attempt to remove W. J. Reynolds from office as county treasurer until the treasurer is furnished and served with a copy of the charges against him and is given a reasonable opportunity to reply to such charges and until these charges are adjudged by the fiscal court to be sustained by competent proof.

To that point the injunction sought by County Treasurer Reynolds was granted, but on other points it was dismissed. The magistrates were granted permission to meet Wednesday of this week for the purpose of transacting any business other than that pertaining to the county treasurer. The court set April 23 as any later date as the time for the fiscal court's hearing of charges preferred against Mr. Reynolds.

Mr. Reynolds claimed that he had not been legally furnished a copy of the charges against him, and for this reason Judge Candill granted the fiscal court from setting until April 23 on the treasurer'ship. Notice was officially served on him while he was in Prestonsburg Tuesday.

A conference attended by the magistrates, County Judge Stumbo and Circuit Judge Candill was held Tuesday afternoon, and at this conference Judge Stumbo was quoted as saying that he himself will call the fiscal court meeting of April 23.

Lesson for April 15

JESUS TEACHING FORGIVENESS LESSON TEXT—Matthew 18:15-20. GOLDEN TEXT—And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. PRIMARY TOPIC—Jesus Helps Peter With a Hard Situation. JUNIOR TOPIC—A Lesson in Kindly Conscience. WEEK-ENDARY AND SENIOR TOPIC—Why Practice Forgiveness. DODGING PEOPLE AND TRULY FORGIVING—What is True Forgiveness?

This lesson touches a most vital subject, a most practical one, for our everyday lives. We are always sure to follow the Lord's instruction. We shall most surely receive, for all who will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution (1 Tim 3:12). How to Gain an Erving Brother (vv. 15-20). To bring a sinning brother to a knowledge of his sin and restore him to fellowship with the Lord and to fellowship with the saints is to gain him. Therefore the transcendent aim should be to win him. This method to be used is: 1. Personal (vv. 15). Go and tell him his fault alone. The aim in this personal effort is not to charge him with sin but to bring him to repentance. 2. The help of a comrade (v. 16). Take with thee one or two more. The presence of one or two Christian brethren helps in making known his sin. 3. Tell it to the church (v. 17). Sometimes the church can accomplish that which the individual and the one or two brethren fail to do. 4. The binding authority of the church's decision (vv. 19-20). When the church follows the instruction of the Lord, gathered in the name of Jesus Christ, it is authorized by His Spirit. Its decisions are final. 5. The Link of Forgiveness (vv. 21, 22). Peter's question (v. 21). From Christ's teaching as to the efforts to bring about reconciliation in case of offense between brethren, he knew that the spirit of forgiveness would be required. The rabbi taught that one, two, or even three offenses should be forgiven but the fourth should be punished. Peter was disposed to be gracious inquired, "Till seven times?" showing his readiness to forgive his brethren six or three times more but twice three times and a little over. 6. Jesus' answer (v. 22). This answer astonished Peter. Jesus said, "not till seven times but until seventy times seven," showing that willingness to forgive should be practically infinite. The Christian should be so filled with the love of Christ that he will forgive whenever being called upon to do so. 7. Christ's principle of forgiveness (vv. 23-25). This principle is illustrated by the story of the two creditors. a. The gracious creditor (vv. 23-25). The king in this parable represents God. The servant who is greatly in debt represents the sinner—my sinner, every sinner, you and me. We were hopelessly in debt to God. Ten million talents are equal to about \$12,000,000. To meet this obligation would be an utter impossibility. This man's plea for time, promising to pay all, resembles the man who imagines that he can pay his debt to God; that by his future good works he can atone for his past grievous sins. The law says, "I'll pay all," but Christ forgives all. By the justice of God's law we are hopelessly bound. By the grace of God we are freely pardoned. b. The cruel creditor (vv. 25-35). The man who was forgiven so much owed the man who owed him a small sum, about \$17. He shut his ears to the man's entreaty to be patient with him, flew at his throat and cruelly put him into prison. The great mercy shown him did not touch his heart, so he refused to be merciful. Every one who is unforgiving shows that the forgiveness of God in Jesus Christ has not been experienced. Being set free from so great a debt as our sins against God, we should make God's act of unlimited forgiveness toward us a standard of unlimited forgiveness toward others. In dealing with others we should always keep before us (1). That we constantly need the forgiveness of God. When we pray, "forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors," let us be sure that we have put away all thought of things held against others. (2). There is a day of judgment coming and at that day we shall be created as we treat others. No mercy will be shown to those who have not shown mercy. God's action toward us should be the standard of our action toward others. What Unites Means Union with God in Christ wraps up every blessing. You cannot go beyond this. It is the summing bonum, containing all, and more than all, that heart can desire, or imagination can fashion. The Glory of Our Christ We can never do anything to the honor or glory of Jesus' name. All the works of the holiest people of God since His birth and His death and His ascension can never add to His glory.

GREAT MEN

We are fond of reading about great men of the past. Their heroic deeds thrill us. Their example inspires us. The world is in desperate need of many, many things today but, most of all, it needs men with greatness of soul. When we look around they appear to be few and far between. If it would be appropriate to remind ourselves of the definition Jesus gave for a great man: "Whoever would be great among you shall be your servant, and whosoever would be first among you shall be your bondservant. (Matt. 20:26-27). According to this definition we have been looking in the wrong places for great men. They are not to be found where the spirit of self-glorification and place-seeking is uppermost. Neither are they to be found among those whose ambition is "getting." So it is fairly safe to say that the really great men of our time will seldom be found in the headlines of the newspaper. The present social order does not give publicity to the men whom Jesus Christ called great. A great man's reward lies not in the glamor, but in the constructive-ness of his services. I believe that this world has more great men than it is aware of. There are great numbers of men in the field of science, sociology and religion, who are willing to subscribe to the principle of service for their fellow-men at great personal sacrifice. To a person who measures greatness in a worldly standard, this seems incredible. They figure in "dollars per effort" instead of "helpfulness per effort." If you suffer me to play the role of a prophet for a moment, I would say, that hidden to the sight of the masses, the foundations of a new world are being laid, a new world built on sacrifice. The hope of our age rests upon him who has filed with the spirit of Him who sacrificed a cross.

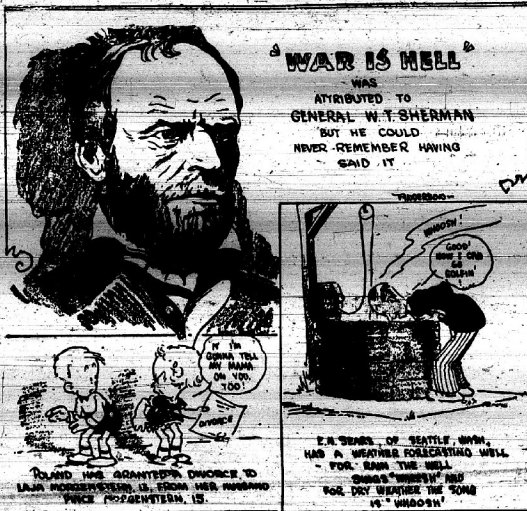

Chinese Climbing Perch

Travel but Don't Climb
The Chinese climbing perch is called because many years ago a student of fishes found one of these small trees. Since that time extensive research and experiments have been carried on in an effort to get them to climb trees or limbs in captivity without success. Although the experiments indicate that the fish will not climb, it makes good progress over flat or slightly inclined ground. In their native habitat, southeastern Asia, ranging as far north as southern China, the climbing perch travel overland between pools and ditches. In making these overland excursions the fish extends its gill covers at right angles to its head. These gill covers are equipped with spines which aid in locomotion. When on the go the fish wiggles its tail and rolls from side to side as it uses the spines for leverage. The result is a wobbling gait that doesn't result in any speed to speak of, but is sufficient to get the fish where he wants to go. They are related to the Siamese fighting fish. In addition to their gills they have an air chamber in the head over each gill. These chambers serve as storage tanks for air when the fish leaves the water. When in the water they occasionally rise to the surface to take a breath of air and it has been reported that it is possible to drown them by denying them access to the surface. They reach a length of ten inches. They are a golden olive color, darker on top and lighter below, and usually have a dark spot at the base of the tail. There are no external differences between the sexes.

Mexican "Plang" Babes Citizens
Children born in Mexican alpine are Mexican citizens under that country's laws, says the San Francisco Chronicle. The same applies to children born in Mexican territory or on Mexican ships, whatever the nationality of their parents, and to children born abroad of Mexican fathers or Mexican mothers and unknown fathers. Nationality also may be acquired by naturalization or, in the case of women, by marrying Mexicans. It may be lost by accepting any office or title of nobility from a foreign government or by accepting without permission of congress any foreign decoration or title other than of nobility unless it be of literary, scientific or humanitarian nature or by assistance to any foreign government or national against Mexico before any international tribunal.

### The Road to Better Health

#### LEAD POISONING

A considerable percentage of the men who work in industries, which deal in lead are subjects of lead poisoning--some investigators claiming that in certain factories twenty-five per cent of the workers were found to be suffering.

#### Signs Affected

The most poisonous of all forms of lead is the suboxide which adheres on the surface of the molten metal and is given off in fumes. In this state and rubs off on the hands of the workers handling the metal after it has cooled. This is the salt of lead that causes poisoning in plumbers, smelters and linotypers.

Next in lethal order comes the oxide of lead with which men working in factories come into contact. There are two forms--the low oxide (litharge), and the highest oxide (red lead).

Finally we have the carbonate of lead (white lead) as a cause of poisoning and it is, from this particular salt that painters suffer.

Only one salt of lead, the sulphide, seems to be free from lethal properties.

#### How Lead Enters the Body

It is absorbed readily--and so readily that swallowers dust and fumes of lead is the most likely method of conveying the poison into the system. It is doubtful that any material amount of that inhaled into the lungs is ever absorbed. Likewise it is questionable if any quantity is absorbed through the skin.

#### Why Some Are Affected--Others, Not

In all intoxications, inorganic or chemical, the element of individual

susceptibility plays an important part. Lead poisoning is no exception to this rule and one worker can handle lead for years with impunity while another suffers a severe attack of poisoning after a few weeks.

Quite naturally a worker who laborer under the handicap of long hours, insufficient sleep, poor housing and improper food is more liable to lead poisoning than one working under more ideal conditions.

#### Alcohol and Lead

It is said that those who drink men alcohol are more liable to lead poisoning, but I have often wondered if this is not putting the cart before the horse. That is to say, is it not possible that the workman who is affected by lead has a craving for alcohol to neutralize it?

#### Prevention of Lead Poisoning

Methods of prevention can only be summarized here.

Employers should equip their plants with all devices that will carry away fumes and dust. Workers should wear masks when necessary.

An individual who has once been poisoned is made more susceptible and should seek some other form of employment.

Men who work with lead should take a hot bath every night, get plenty of rest, fresh air and sunshine and nutritious food.

Lead may be an antidote but it is more respectable to die of lead poisoning than alcoholism. Booze is a preventive but much to be recommended. What I have said about the use of alcohol by lead workers is written in justification of the man, not the act.

#### Superstitions Attached to Colorful Turquoises

Turquoises were at one time so plentiful in Mexico that the Aztec Indians used thousands of them in masks which they wore for their religious ceremonies, says the Washington Star. Big eyes and little ones were cemented together over a cedar frame to make a covering for the face. The teeth and eyes were inlays of mother of pearl.

Some say turquoise, or turkis, is named after Turkey, whence came the stones that were used in old European jewelry. Really the finest ones came from Persia, but that was before the wealth of the blue and green stones of America had been commercialized. Long ago the Aztecs and other Indians of southwestern United States used them in quantities, for turquoises, unlike most stones, do not have to be refined, but appear on the surface of the ground in bright, greenish-blue spots and veins.

The various people that have been particularly fond of turquoises have attached most curious superstitions to them. The opaque blue and green color of the stone is suggestive of the freshness of grass, the blue of water. That's why Persians and Egyptians carried them in the desert. The Persians fastened them to the tails of their horses, mules and camels.

In Europe it was once believed that the word turquoise meant victorious, or fortunate. Because the turquoise frequently changes color, turning from a sky-blue shade to a paler greenish hue, people fastened a superstition to it, saying that the stone shone when the air was pure, but became dim when ill fortune was about.




