EFFORTS MADE TO LOCATE QUARTERS FOR COURT TERM

Church Sought for Temporary Court Room While Repairs Made

PRISONERS WORK

Celling and walls stripped, only a sub-floor left, the circuit courtroom on which general repairs were started last week, is in such condition that the quarters must be sought for the September term of court which convenes Monday.

Waiting of relief work delayed the work on the courtroom temporarily, but work was resumed Tuesday with prison labor doing the work under the supervision of H. E. Stewart and Jim Smiley.

Application for use of the Baptist Church during the coming session of court has been made, and members of the church will vote on the matter this week. If the church building is unavailable, one of the new gymnasium here will be sought. The courtroom will be unavailable, it was said Wednesday, because repairs are to be made on the front stairway and the stairway at the rear of the courtroom is to be eliminated.

SCHOOLS HERE TO OPEN SEPT. 10TH

Enrollment Expected to Exceed 1,000 Students Attending Local Schools

Prestonsburg schools will open Monday, September 10, it was announced this week by Ishmael H. Tolpelt, superintendent of city schools. Date of the opening was set about a week because of repairs being made to school buildings.

Enrollment for the year is expected to be larger than ever before. During the past two years the enrollment has been approximately 1,000.

Registration of high school students will be held Thursday and Friday, September 14 and 15. All high school students are urged to report at the high school building on these days and have their schedules arranged, thus avoiding duplication of subjects and other inconveniences.

THREE NABBED LAST WEEK FOR ROBBERY; SUSPECT CONFESSES

Elyde Frände, 19 years old, of West Virginia, is held in the county jail here in connection with the robbery last week of a box car at Danwood, which contained supplies used by men working in the railroad tunnel near there.

Frände was first held by Galloway Gray, special agent C. O. S. agent, last Wednesday for the theft of a watch from harkman Claude Conley, of Ashland. Frände swapped the watch for a pistol. While on the way to jail Frände aroused Gray's suspicions by saying over and over that the box car robbery would be held in Danwood.

Two of the nine 25-pound cans of carbide stolen from the box car were recovered from officers who said they found the cans from Frände, Conroy and the other two. Thursday, Frände confessed, suspecting he had conspired. Officers Gray and Lewis Robinson, chief of Special Agent V. W. Matlock, of Catlettsburg, pressed Frände, who then named two accomplices. These are Yeggin Creek, 18, of Arkansas, Creek, and Ralph Walker.

Officers then went to Crisp's home, where he was taken into custody, and set out to search for Walk, who has not been found.

RELIEF JOBS FOR SCHOOL POSITIONS

Traded in Allegation Made in Maytown School Suit Filled Here

Bill Biggers, a relief representative, traded relief jobs to some of two members of the Floyd county board of education in return for a position for his brother-in-law, W. M. Messer, as principal of the Maytown consolidated school. It is alleged by a suit filed last week in the Floyd circuit court by trustees of the Maytown school and five unsuccessful applicants for teacher positions in the school.

The suit seeks to have annulled the board's teacher appointment, and to reassign teachers appointed from entering upon their duties Monday, September 3, opening date of the school.

It is alleged by the plaintiffs that on five separate occasions the three trustees recommended the following teachers: high school—Wiley Jones, principal; Claude May, Ouch, Jane Combs and Lasso Martin, teachers; grade school—E. E. Moore, principal; Wilma May, Amy Mae Bedford, Loretta Osborne, Elizabeth Baker, Ed Hicks. Despite these recommendations, it is stated, the board hired only Claude May and he not as a high school teacher.

The county board, the suit states, proposed to hire N. C. Boushain as principal of the school and, when the trustees refused to recommend such appointment, arbitrarily, capriciously and unreasonably rejected the trustees' nominations.

Plaintiffs are the trustees: Dr. J. H. Allen, Lee Allen and J. P. Clark, and the following unsuccessful applicants for teacher positions: Forrest E. Moore, William May, Loretta Osborne, Ed Hicks and Jane Combs. Defendants are members of the county board and the following who were hired as teachers: W. M. Messer, V. O. Pinner, Sumner Adams, Claude May, Ed Hicks, Charles Hicks, Shirley Allen and Emma Lee Haslam.

FORMER OFFICER HERE IS SUICIDE

A. C. DANIELS FOUND DEAD HERE FRIDAY WITH BULLETS THROUGH BODY

Body of A. C. "Dan" Daniels, 43 years old, former Prestonsburg ironing man, was found here Friday morning on the grounds of the Prestonsburg graded school where, it was decided after an investigation, he had ended his life by firing two bullets through his chest in the region of his heart.

Four letters found in his clothing were addressed to his brother, John, at Jenkins, to his stepson, Bill Claude Daniels, here, to Pullman Arthur Blackburn and to Russell Rott, intimate friends, both of this place. Contents of the letters were not revealed, but it is said that they told of his plans of ending his life.

Worry over the tragic death here in 1932 of his wife, Mrs. Minnie Burnett Daniels, is believed to have led to his suicide. Residents of the neighborhood where the body was found placed the time of the shooting at from midnight to 2 o'clock Friday morning. The body was found by Bill Blackburn and George Swafford.

As policeman here, Mr. Daniels won many friends. He was a native of Tennessee. Surviving him are a daughter, Dan Edith, two brothers and two sisters. The body was prepared for burial by B. F. Arnold, and was taken to Cool Creek, Tennessee, for burial in the family cemetery.

Jim Hughes will probably make no further attempt to execute bond for his release from the county jail here as the slayer of Green Castle, his attorney, having elected to await action of the grand jury which convenes Monday. Slaying of Castle took place near Huerfonia Sunday, August 10, when a shot from Hughes' shotgun also wounded John M. Whitaker. The latter is recovering.

There are no new developments in the Wilson Kidd death at Harold, Leg Station and Belmont—Meyers, accused of the murder of Kidd, and at Elbert under \$5,000 bond such a grand jury investigation of the case will be made next week.

Commonwealth's attorney D. C. Hall said last week that he planned further investigation into the case over the weekend. Only circumstantial evidence has been uncovered to date. Charges against Kidd's life are attributed to Stuten and Maynard, who engaged in a fight with Kidd on the night he is believed to have been killed. It is held that whoever slew the youth hid his body under corn stalks near the river bank and did not throw the body into the river until a short time before it was discovered. Bloodstains near the Harold bridge, a short distance below where signs of a struggle were found.

LANGLEY-RAMEY SUIT DISMISSED

Settlement Follows Counter-Claim Action and Hearing on Demurrer

Mrs. Langley withdrew her contest suit against H. H. Ramey without prejudice.

Mrs. John W. Langley's contest suit against Harry H. Ramey, her victorious opponent in the race for the Republican nomination for Congress from the seventh district, was dismissed Saturday by a counter suit filed by C. B. Wheeler, Mr. Ramey's attorney, attacking the vote cast for Mrs. Langley at the August primary in two precincts of this county.

Mrs. Langley's suit seeking to set aside the vote in Magoffin county was, and if she is permitted to retain her complete Floyd county vote, she will be the Republican nominee by a lead of 50 votes. It was said by Joe H. Hester, her attorney here, that either of the two Floyd county precincts which she carried and which is attacked in the counter suit is lost to her, Ramey will win, even though the entire Magoffin county vote is voided.

The counter suit filed for Mr. Ramey alleged illegal voting in Dairway Harve precinct where 193 votes were credited to Mrs. Langley and attacked the former Congressman's vote in John Hill precinct on the allegation that votes of the Rev. William H. Hill were missing and that the election officers failed to certify to the vote. Mrs. Langley received 162 votes there to Ramey's 2, and cancellation of the vote there is sought.

As a hearing had Saturday on the demurrer to Mrs. Langley's petition Circuit Judge J. C. Beck Howard, of the Magoffin circuit court, overruled the demurrer as to alleged violations of the Corrupt Practices act but sustained it as to the allegation of an excess number of ballots, illegal voting and other irregularities. After news for Mrs. Langley prepared this week to ask the court of appeals for a ruling on Judge Howard's decision annulling the demurrer in part.

FORMER MAGOFFIN-CO. OFFICIAL IS CLAIMED

RE-ORGANIZATION OF RELIEF OFFICE BEING MADE HERE

Investigation by Federal Authorities Promised; Personnel Changes Made in County

PROBE CONTINUES

Investigation into the conduct of relief administration, spurred on by the destruction by fire here last week of the Floyd county relief office, this week has led to four definite developments.

They are:

1. Announcement by Thornton W. Wilson, U. S. Attorney, for Kentucky, that a federal investigation will be made of the Floyd county relief office.

2. Temporary elimination of the Floyd county relief office and maintenance of all relief work in the county.

3. Continuation of the investigation being made by Miss A. Mearns, chief investigator for the Kentucky Relief Commission, who is due here next week to conduct the probe in the 12 precincts of the county.

4. Against those indicted as having committed irregularities in relief administration.

Resignation of two county relief committee members.

The threatened federal investigation is to come by way of a probe into the probability of fraud having been committed through the "forged" names, fraudulent signatures and receiving of cash as well as investigated.

Mr. Wilson started last week, upon his return from Washington, that his investigation, so far had been in cooperation with local authorities. He said that the only reason his investigation had been delayed had been because his office had been assisting in the cases up for trial in the Floyd circuit court in Scotland.

Effective Monday night, relief committees in Floyd county. All relief office employees, all workers of every kind, were relieved of their duties. J. S. Murphy, U. S. Attorney, said that this step was not to be taken as a reflection upon any worker, adding that the work simply was being stopped until the present investigation was completed.

Mr. Martin, relief commission investigator, returned this week from Lexington where he went last week, according to a statement made by Attorney H. C. Hill, 12 street, beside in the Louisville office. He is continuing his work in the county, working on individual cases as he finds them.

The organization of the relief office here and of the town of home visitors was partially completed Wednesday and the office will be in position to give emergency relief on September 1, it was authoritatively stated.

Office personnel: Miss Elizabeth Crosswell, emergency relief worker in charge; O. E. Carey, emergency clerk; Mrs. Sarah Virginia Ford, stenographer; Bernard Brundham, janitor.

Home visitors under the new setup are Mrs. Hazel C. Hamber, Mrs. Lucille Egan, Mrs. Prudence Stone, Misses Annabelle Horford, Belle Miller, Edna Prater, Fred Fickett, Robert Misco, John Howell, Miss Ella Lee Bunker, Mrs. William Capin May.

Only workers whose connection with the relief administration followed the period during which irregularities are alleged to have occurred are being retained.

The following bulletin was issued Aug. 24 by Thornton Wilcox, state relief administrator, to all KERA employees:

"This is in further reference to the bulletin issued by Captain A. M. Woody, acting KERA Administrator, under date of August 21 with which was enclosed a communication from Mr. Ambrey Williams, acting KERA administrator, both of which dealt with the necessity of completely divorcing relief activities from partisan politics.

"As should be clearly understood by this time by every KERA worker, the Kentucky Emergency Relief Administration is not interested in partisan politics. Further than that, we do not want and will not have in our ranks any workers who are connected by partisan considerations.

"As stated by Mr. Williams, any relief employee who is found to be engaged in any political activity other than the right of proper exercise of his own privilege of franchise, will be summarily dismissed."

Mr. Murphy, area administrator, said it was his work that the work would be carried on without fear or favor, and that as rapidly as is humanly possible all employees who cause relief funds to go to those not in need at the expense of the unemployed and poverty-stricken will be discharged. "Whatever record or process necessary will be made. It will require time," he added, "but certainly it will be done."

To assure relief funds were lost in the fire here, all persons on relief will be furnished by the new application procedure.

FACTS ABOUT NATIONAL RE-EMPLOYMENT SERVICE

The National Re-Employment Service is a service to the unemployed and the employer in filling jobs that become available as the contracts for public works are let. It also performs the same service for private employers in any kind of business. It charges no fees of any kind.

The National Re-Employment Service has no connection with any relief organization. It has no money or articles to give to any one. Applicants are referred to jobs strictly in accordance with their qualifications, not merely because they are in need.

The National Re-Employment Service has no control over the amount of pay given to any workman by an employer nor the number of hours worked. It does not, however, refer workers to violators of N.R.S. codes.

A person must be registered with N.R.S. before it can give any assistance in locating a position. Registration does not, however, guarantee that a position will be secured.

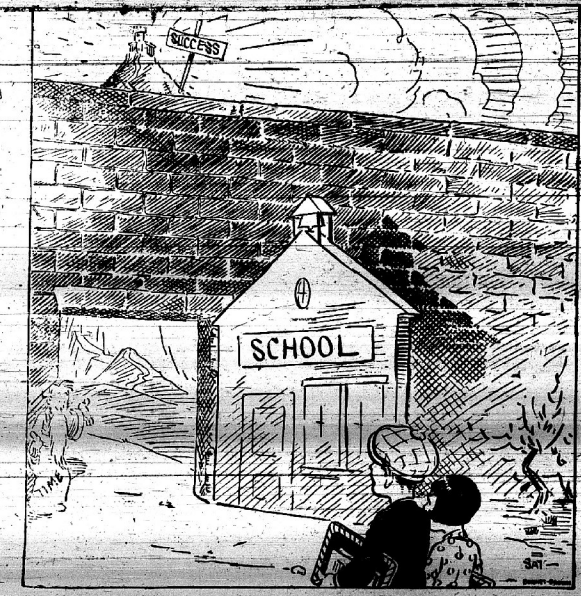
Any one is eligible to register between the 1st of 10 and 15. However, no applicant can be considered for referral to a Public Works Project in this home county unless he has been a resident thereof for a period of six months, next preceding the date of such referral.

When some one registers with N.R.S. it is not necessary to return to the office to see if jobs are available. If any person is available to work, the N.R.S. office should be notified promptly so that the person eligible will be notified by the N.R.S. office to secure an introduction card.

In the event that a person registered with N.R.S. moves or changes the number of the phone by which he can be reached, it is very important to come to the N.R.S. office and report the change.

In the event that a person registered with N.R.S. secures a position without aid of N.R.S. or if he leaves the country, he should notify the N.R.S. office of the fact so that available jobs will not be delayed while N.R.S. is trying to locate the individual one. It is not necessary to report and jobs of a few hours or a few days duration.
