GRUESOME FIND AT WEEKSBURY, OFFICIAL PUZZLE

Discovery of Skeleton Brought Uncovering of Mysterious County Murder

PROBE IS MADE

Another mystery confronts Floyd officials following the discovery on the mountain top, above Weeksbury, Tuesday of the headless skeleton of a man.

It was not definitely ascertained if the man had been killed, though those who examined the skeleton had no doubt that a bullet had been fired into the man's body. At present, authorities are seeking to establish the identity of the nameless victim.

The gruesome find was made by Earl Fannin, of Weeksbury, Sheriff J. M. Stumbo and Deputy Sheriff R. R. Allen went to Weeksbury Tuesday evening and made an extensive investigation. Upon their return here, they said the man had been dead several months. Head of the victim had rolled downhill a few feet. Only shreds of flesh remained beneath a pair of overalls and coat the man wore when overtaken by death.

Officers found the initials "T. S." and the name of the manufacturer, "Roberts Tailoring Company, Cincinnati, O." inside the coat. These are for the only chance of identification of the body. The few remaining strands of hair were gray, indicating the victim may have been 60 or 70 years old.

MAY SEES BYRNS AS NEXT SPEAKER

Position of Floor Leader Gives Tennessee Inside Track To House Leadership

What has been characterized as a wideopen race for the Speakership of the national House of Representatives to fill the vacancy created by the death of Speaker Rainey will result in the election of Joseph C. Byrnes, of Tennessee, Congressman A. J. May predicted upon his return here this week from Washington.

Congressman Byrnes, floor leader last year, has Congressman Rayburn, of Texas, as his chief opponent for the Speakership. Mr. May gave the following reasons for what he termed "overwhelming sentiment favoring Mr. Byrnes."

Because Mr. Byrnes' long service in Congress and because of the fact that he is the present Floor Leader;

Because the usual procedure in filling a Speakership vacancy is to elevate the Floor Leader to the post, and if this precedent is broken, the same would probably apply to seniority rights on down through the Congressional committees;

Again, because Texas, Mr. Rayburn's home state, already has seven chairmanships of major committees.

It was said this week by Mrs. J. D. Mayo, a member of the Prestonsburg Woman's Club.

Mrs. Mayo, who has long been active in state conservation work, said Floyd county is one of the outstanding "dogwood counties" in Kentucky, this beautiful flowering shrub growing in great profusion in this locality. Kentucky has become famous for its dogwood, no less than for its celebrated rhododendron, said Mrs. Mayo, and to consider its destruction for commercial purposes is viewed as preposterous by those who are interested in preserving the state's natural beauties, she said.

Mrs. Mayo said she proposes to appeal to the club women of Kentucky and to others interested in the conservation of its forests and flowers to join in a concerted movement to preserve its dogwood and prevent its destruction for commercial purposes.

1 MORE BARRIER FACES BLACKCATS

On Road to Big Sandy Conference Championship; Paintsville is Turkey Day Foe

As The Times is published this week, the Prestonsburg Blackcats, proclaimed by many to be the local school's mightiest football machine, stand on the threshold of a Big Sandy championship. If they can get by the Paintsville Tigers, their last barrier to the march to the title is passed. It is since the Pikeville game in which they won here November 17, the Blackcats are in better shape physically than they have been in the past three weeks. They are, however, minus the services of perhaps two regulars, Coach Watson has taken the team safely over numerous hurdles this season, despite more setbacks, perhaps, than befell any other Eastern Kentucky football team. First of all, he lost Howell, a lineman who had distinguished himself in the matter of blocking punts. Then came a series of injuries which kept the team from reaching full strength with the material left. Hughes, a linebacking fullback was lost, shortly after the victory over K. M. I., for the remainder of the season as the result of an injury. Hall, a big, strong tackle, is now gone, so is Sturckel, guard.

Those that remain are in good shape with the exception of Branham, hefty center, who has been laid low for several days by a severe cold. Meanwhile, Paintsville, Prestonsburg's traditional athletic foe, has been gaining momentum as the season progressed, and is headed this way bent on victory. It's going to be a game to talk about, those who know their Big Sandy football say. Paintsville has lost but one game, and that to Pikeville. Prestonsburg defeated Pikeville, but did not look as good in the game with Bellair, as did Paintsville in its first loss Saturday with the same team. Take your choice. Prestonsburg is solidly behind the "Cats" and may the "best" team win!

About 8 o'clock Tuesday morning, Mrs. Hicks, in a different room from the one occupied by the child, smelled the odor of burning paper. Rushing into the tot's room, she found one wall aflame. Her

Fiscal Court Asks Approval of Road Work: Five in Of fice Here

Four relief projects have been approved for Floyd county, and work on four others has been requested by the fiscal court since re-establishment of the relief office here. Projects already approved are county sanitation, completion of the city hall here, paving of 800 feet of Highland avenue from Court street in front of the city hall, and construction of equipment for the relief office.

Projects applied for are road construction on Big Mud, Rock Fork, Clear Creek to the head of Jack's Creek and Brandy Keg to German. The score of more of projects of which work started a few months ago may be reinstated, it was said this week, on application of the fiscal court.

Personnel of the relief office here includes five persons: Miss Sarah Hays, county relief worker; W. S. Wallen, assistant clerk; Russell Hunley, commodity clerk; Mrs. Winston Ford and Mrs. L. P. Jones, office workers.

VETERANS HAVE TILL JANUARY 2

For Filing of Applications for Adjusted Service Cer- tificates

Washington, Nov. 18.—Inasmuch as the period in which filing of applications by World War veterans for adjusted service certificates expires January 2, 1935; Frank T. Hines, administrator of veterans' affairs, today outlined provisions of the World War Adjusted Compensation Act with dependents eligible for adjusted service certificates or for payment of adjusted service credit. He must file application for such benefits on or before January 2. The law provides that any application not filed on or before the date "shall be held void." Hines outlined the law's provisions as follows:

Applications must be filed with the Secretary of War if the last service of the veteran was with the military forces, or with the Secretary of the Navy if the last service was

FLOYD SALES TAX CHECK \$8,043.96

Huddleston Says Tax Satisfac- tory, State in Good Finan- cial Condition

George B. Archer, county treasurer, last week received a check for \$8,043.96 from State Treasurer Elam Huddleston as Floyd county's share of the fund derived from sales tax collections during the first three months of the existence of the gross receipts tax in Kentucky.

In his letter to Mr. Archer, Mr. Huddleston said: "The sales tax law, so far as I can discover, is operating successfully and satisfactorily. It has strengthened the credit of the Commonwealth, thereby purchasing those responsible for purchases to buy at better prices, and in a much more satisfactory manner. It has put Kentucky on a solid financial basis; in fact, I think in the best financial position of any state in the union."

On the basis of sales tax returns already made, this county will profit to the extent of approximately \$25,000 from the tax in this fiscal year. County sales tax tags may be spent for three purposes: payment of principal and interest on road and bridge bonds; floating indebtedness incurred in the construction and maintenance of roads.

Thirty Minute Menu Magic

Even THE most carefully planned daily schedule will sometimes go awry and the harassed housewife find herself hurrying home from a prolonged rubber of bridge or a lengthy shopping trip with half an hour at the most left in which to serve an attractive, ample supper.

- Cream of Mushroom Soup (ready-to-serve) Served Warm
Chopped Beef, Bacon and Tomato Sandwiches Potato Chips
Cross Cut Sweet Pickles Celery Stuffed Manzanilla Olives
Baked Peas Cookies Coffee



- Chopped Beef, Bacon and Tomato Sandwiches—Separate 1 small jar chopped beef and grill with 12 slices of bacon (notch edges to prevent curling) until crisp, having the beef placed in between the rows of bacon so that the beef may broil in the bacon fat. Toast 18 slices of bread, cut 1/4 inch thick, on one side, and spread the untoasted side with a thin layer of butter and then a very thin layer of Prepared Bacon or Yellow Mustard. On the untoasted side of 6 slices of bread, place 2 strips of bacon and enough chopped beef to cover. Top with lettuce (soak), butter and a toasted side down. Then arrange a layer of thinly sliced tomatoes (2 tomatoes will be needed) and a leaf of lettuce on each, and top with slices of toast.

- Baked Peas—Peel peas, cut in halves and cores. Sprinkle generously with either white or brown sugar and dot with butter. Add only enough water to keep from cooking dry (about 1/4 cup) and bake in a moderate oven (350 to 400° F.) either covered or uncovered, until tender. If desired, the fruit is still hot, place a marshmallow on each pea and it will melt slightly. Serve warm or cold, with or without cream.

One of the largest audiences ever to turn out here attended the program. Miss Powers is only 11 years old. The young artist already displays divine genius both at the piano and with her voice. The young prodigy gave splendid performances of such difficult numbers as Beethoven's "Moonlight - Sonata," "The Butterfly," by Grieg, and McDowell's "Scotch Poem." She sang "Mother Machree," "Smilin' Thru," and "Little

Founding the Epworth League The Epworth league was founded in Cleveland, Ohio, May 15, 1889, by a group of five Methodist young people. Continued from page 1 with the naval forces, including the marine corps. The application should be made personally by the veteran...

These provisions must not be confused with the claims of persons designated by veterans as beneficiaries of their adjusted service certificates.

A widow who has remained before filing application for adjusted service credit loses title thereto. Children are entitled to payment in case they were under 18 years of age at the time of the death of the veteran...

Blanks for making application for adjusted service certificates or adjusted service credit may be obtained from the War or Navy Departments or from the Veterans' Administration.

No payment can be made to a dependent at the time of the death of the veteran or on or before January 2, 1935. A mother who is a widow and has not remarried or is over 60 and a father who is over 60 shall be considered dependent. In case the veteran has not made application during his lifetime for an adjusted service certificate or has not received adjusted service pay, and dies within the six months immediately preceding January 2, 1935, a period of six months after the date of the death is allowed for the filing of the application by the dependent.

The fangs are sharp as needles and hold the venom in the little cups that hold the poison. The whole arrangement works with the swift effectiveness of a hypodermic needle.

The old tale that you can cut a snake in two pieces and its tail won't stop wriggling is a "snake story." But there is one thing about a rattlesnake which is almost as remarkable as the yarn about the living tail—and that is the intricate nature of its poison fangs.

You can cut out these terrible weapons, but if you think you've damaged the old rattler, you're mistaken. For he simply pushes out a new pair of fangs, just as sharp, just as deadly, as the first. You can cut off the tail, and there will come another, for the wise old snake keeps a long row of fangs in reserve.

Original Spanish Main Greatly Narrowed Down

Named in the heyday of conquistadors and pirates, the old Spanish Main originally comprised the Caribbean sea and that part of the Atlantic ocean piled by Spanish treasure ships, says the National Geographic society.

Columbus sighted the palm-fringed shores of the Spanish Main in 1492. Red painted Indians sucking brews from gourds watched the subsequent arrivals of Balboa and others who carried back to Europe amazing tales of pearls, gold, and Indians suitable for slaves. Men swarmed to the coast to erect fortified settlements and to ship supplies of munitions, torpedoes and wild boars. Some, settling near what is Santo Domingo, hunted and smoked buffalo. They became known as bucaniers from the French word boucaner, to smoke meat.

Others became farmers, cultivating tobacco with the aid of numerous white and negro slaves. Many of the slaves ran away and joined the bucaniers, who have become bored with buccant hunting. Lacking pirates, preying on Spanish galleons and coastal settlements.
