C. & O. NAMED IN PIKE SUIT

\$10,000 Asked in Death of
William Pinson

Pikeville, Ky., Dec. 18.—A suit for \$10,000 was filed in circuit court here today against the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway by George Pinson, Jr., Pikeville postmaster, over the death of his son, William J. Pinson, who was struck and fatally injured by a train in West Pikeville on the night of last December 17. The suit names T. J. Vance as engineer of the train and alleged that Pinson was struck while crossing the city and that the engineer failed to sound the whistle or give other alarm and that the train was traveling at a great speed that the 20-mile limit fixed by the city. WELL-KNOWN LADY CLAIMED BY DEATH

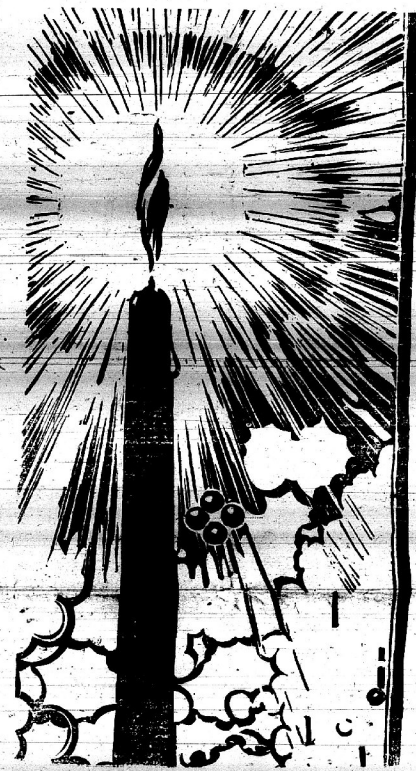
Mrs. Minnie Sizemore Blevins

PAINTSVILLE "CHAIN GANG" SEEKS \$75,000 DAMAGES

Three suits seeking to recover for James Price, William Dills and Oscar "Blackie" Peleberry, prisoners in the Paintsville, Ky., "whipping post" case, a total of \$75,000 were filed in the Johnson circuit court Thursday by their attorneys, County Attorney Forrest D. Short and Boyd & Bond, Prestonsburg law firm.

Alleging that they were "unlawfully and inhumanly" put in chains, irons and handcuffs, led through the streets of Paintsville on December 5 and chained to a pole on a main thoroughfare of Paintsville for three hours during which they suffered great mental anguish and pain and, thinly clad in the inclement weather, contracted severe colds, each of the plaintiffs ask \$25,000 damages of R. A. Patrick, Paintsville police judge, Powell Williams, chief of police, and Jeff Allen, town marshal, and their sureties, the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, the National Surety Corporation and Dan Wheeler.

The plaintiffs were arrested December 2 on drunkenness charges and upon their failure to pay or replevy fines and costs of \$28.50 each were removed from jail to work on the streets of Paintsville. When they refused to work, they were chained. Still refusing to work, they remain in jail, and have been informed it is said, that their time in jail will not count toward paying their fines until they agree to work. Hailed by the metropolitan

press as a throw-back to the days of the pillory and the whipping post, the chaining of the men has brought Paintsville into the glare of the spotlight, and the outcome of this damage suit will be awaited with interest by persons throughout the country.

JODY ADAMS DIES INSTANTLY SUNDAY AT SLAYER'S HOME

Toy Potter Surrenders Here
Tuesday; Claims Adams
Was Aggressor

Toy Potter, Burton, murderer, surrendered to Deputy Sheriff Frank Hatfield here Tuesday morning to answer a murder charge in the slaying Sunday night at the Potter home in Bethlehem, Adams, 31 years old. Adams is a son of David Adams, a brother of Sam Adams, the finding of whose body at Auxier a few years ago uncovered a sensational murder mystery, first reported by them two months ago, one of which passed through the right side of his chest, the other entering his left shoulder and riving around to emerge near his shoulder blade.

According to the story told Deputy Sheriff Hatfield, who arrived at the Potter home shortly after the shooting took place, Adams came to the Potter home, intoxicated and armed with a revolver and a shotgun. Mr. and Mrs. Potter had retired, and Adams seized Mrs. Potter by her arm, attempting to drag her from bed, and threatening to kill the couple, this version of the shooting continues. Potter then fired two shots into his body at close range.

Friends of Potter say that he had fled from home two or three times earlier in the day to avoid trouble with Adams. Potter executed \$5,000 bond Tuesday to answer to the action of the grand jury next month. He is a native of Pike county, and is about 32 years old.

NO APOLOGIES, JUSTICE WRITES

Deposed Highway Commissioner Tells Governor His Stand Toward Administration

In a letter to Governor Laffoon which he made public recently after he had been deposed as highway commissioner from this district, Zach Justice informed the Governor that "it is true that I have opposed certain policies of your administration. I have no apologies to make." "I assumed," Mr. Justice wrote, "that my co-operation in the affairs of the state would be based upon the duties of a highway commissioner. I served the people to the best of my ability." "Opposition to certain administration policies," Justice declared, "presents a different situation." "I opposed the gross sales tax for other than school and relief purposes, as sponsored by your administration. It was the reason that this policy of your administration transferred the burden of taxation from the rich to the backs of the poor people of our state," Justice stated.

OUT OF FRYING PAN INTO FIRE

A Lot of Alleged Slaves: Haywood Freed at Atlanta But Jailed Here. When Charley Haywood walked from the federal penitentiary at Atlanta Monday, a free man as far as the federal government is concerned, he found Deputy Sheriffs R. B. Allen and Will Wills ready to claim him for trial in Floyd county on a murder charge.

Following the shooting of Pitts, Haywood escaped into the hills and succeeded in evading county officers. While a fugitive, however, he is alleged to have robbed a post office in Greenup county, for which offense he was sentenced to a term of two years in the Atlanta penitentiary. Recently, when Sheriff M. T. Stumbo went to Alabama to return Ed Thomas, fugitive slayer, to this county, he sought the release of Haywood, for return to this county, but was told that Haywood's term would not expire for a few days.

Miss Sylvia Collins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Collins of Edgar, died at the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, last Thursday after a two-day illness from cerebro-spinal meningitis. She became ill December 11 at the home of her uncle, John Ward, at Sugar Loaf, near here. The body was brought here and prepared for burial by E. P. Arnold. Because of the dangerous and extremely contagious nature of the disease which caused Miss Collins' death, the coffin was sealed and not opened at the funeral on instructions of the undertaker, Mr. Arnold. Funeral rites were conducted by the Rev. A. W. Gartin, grandfather of the bereaved parents. Burial was made in the family cemetery Friday.

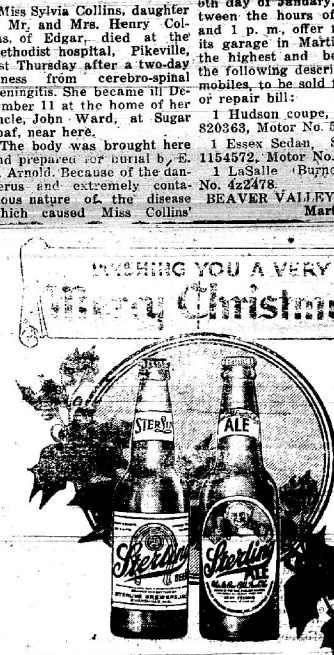

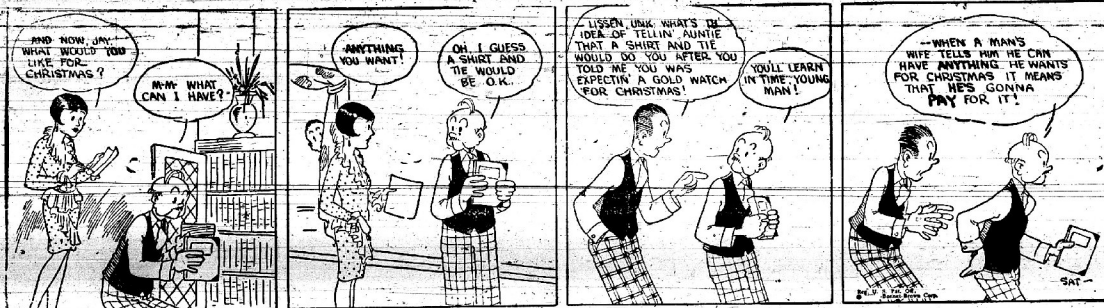

BUICK ANNOUNCES FOUR LINES OF CARS

Flint, Mich., Dec. 20—Four lines of motor cars are announced by the Buick Motor Company for 1935, covering the broad range from the low medium to the high medium price fields and offering the largest variety of body types in the history of the Buick organization.

The new cars, keyed to modern requirements of style, comfort and performance, are being displayed simultaneously throughout the United States in the showrooms of Buick dealers and distributors. With the factory in full production on the 1935 models, adequate stocks are now in dealers' hands and representative models of the complete line are on display. Dealers, consequently, are able to make prompt deliveries.

For the first time, the Buick Motor Company enters a new year with four distinct groups of automobiles, all similar in design and construction, varying only in details of dimension and price class. The extensive line gives price coverage of approximately 27 per cent of the entire automobile market, a condition expected greatly to increase Buick volume during the coming year.

The 1935 Buick cars consist of the following groups: 1. The new series 40 Buick on a 117-inch wheelbase, having a valve-in-head, straight-eight engine developing 93 horsepower at 3200 revolutions per minute.

2. The series 50 Buick for 1935 is built on a 119-inch wheelbase chassis and is produced in five body types, and has an 88-horsepower engine.

3. In still another price arena, and one in which the company has dominated throughout its manufacturing history, is the Series 60 Buick, distinctly a fine car, and a standard-bearer of Buick quality. NOVEMBER CHEVROLET SALES BEST SINCE 1926
November retail sales in the United States by the Chevrolet Motor Company, totaling 50,819 units, were the largest for

that month since 1926 and were exceeded by only one previous November in the history of the company. M. E. Coyle, president, announced here today, November broke another record of eight years' standing and it marks the first time since 1924 that sales for the month have exceeded October sales.

Reports from dealers indicate that last month's sales more than doubled the total for November, 1933, and even exceeded the total of 47,808 units sold in November, 1929, which was the biggest year in the history of the company and of the industry in general.

To supply the continued demand for Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks, Chevrolet maintained its production of current models at a high rate through November, operating all of its assembly plants and carrying its manufacturing schedule into December. Last month's production of 49,615 units set a new record for the month of November in the entire history of the company.

Approximately 70 per cent of the month's total represented production for the domestic market, the greater part of the remainder being produced for the growing export trade. Mr. Coyle pointed out that a demand for the master models, which has held remarkably firm, has been responsible for the unusually heavy production.

FORD TO MULTIPLY AUTO PRODUCTION

The Ford Motor Company is "out of the depression" and will build 1,000,000 cars in 1935, marking the first time since 1930 production has been set for more than a million, officials announced recently. The 1,000,000 production quota for the United States is twice as many cars as Ford Motor Company produced in all of its plants in the world last year. In 1932, 432,186 cars were built and in 1931, 762,058 were constructed in world plants.

"Make it 1,000,000 or better," Henry Ford commented on the announcement. "Our experience during the last six months and what we see in the future tells us a year of improved business is ahead."

When asked whether 1934 would "end the depression," Ford replied: "Why, the depression would be over for the whole country very soon if American industrialists would just forget the

alphabet schemes and take hold of their industries and run them with good sound American business sense. They should take hold of their country, too, in the same way and run it with good sound American common sense.

Pass 600,000 Cars

The Ford Motor Company has already passed the 600,000 mark in production this year, officials said.

Belief business conditions had improved sufficiently to warrant preparations for a great sales year in 1935 was likewise expressed by Ford managers, gathered here from all over the country.

July 19 the 22,000,000th Ford ran off the assembly line. Of this number 15,000,000 were Model T's and slightly more than a million were V-8's.

Pontiac, Mich., Dec. 19—One of the feature presentations made daily before each group of 250 or more Pontiac dealers attending the annual sales convention here during the first 10 days of this month, is that of F. A. Berend, advertising manager of the Pontiac Motor Company.

The advertising program, covering the announcement of the new Pontiacs for 1935, and the campaign for next year, will embrace more newspaper advertising than ever before in the history of the company, says Mr. Berend. More than 2,500 newspapers, with a total circulation of more than 36,500,000 will be used. Total adult newspaper reader impressions for the year are estimated at almost 3,400,000,000.

"Other advertising media scheduled for 1935 include magazines with a circulation totaling 13,000,000; a generous use of outdoor poster boards; radio network broadcasts and spot radio announcements," said Mr. Berend. "However, the largest part of the 1935 budget will go into newspaper advertising, thus definitely identifying the local dealer with the Pontiac car." Mr. Berend dramatized his advertising presentation with a two-reel talking picture, entitled "One Family Multiplied By Millions," in which a typical American middle-class

family, that is in the market for a new car, sees and hears the story of the 1935 Pontiac car as told in the various advertising media used by the company.

GRAHAM TO FEATURE ALL SAFETY GLASS

Although Michigan and seven other states have adopted laws requiring safety glass in automobiles, safety crusaders in many states and cities not having such regulations have been urging leaders in the industry to equip their new cars with safety glass throughout in order to reduce injuries in traffic accidents cases. Leaders of the safety movement predicted that all states within a year will require safety glass in all motor vehicles.

It was pointed out that a national survey taken two years ago showed that 45 per cent of those injured in traffic accidents were cut by shattered glass. Dr. and Mrs. J. F.
