THREE CONVICTED IN CIRCUIT COURT WITH 1 ACQUITTED

55-Year-Old Man Draws 21-Year Term in Slaying Of Slope

COLLINS PENNED

Of the three murder trials held in the Floyd circuit court last week and until Wednesday afternoon, this week two resulted in convictions and a sentence totaling 24 years in the penitentiary.

Last week, the first of the murder trials heard, that of Claude Isaacs, charged with the slaying of Bert D. Little, resulted in Isaacs' acquittal. The murder charge filed against Mrs. Ruth Sammons, of her husband, Edgar Sammons, here this year, resulted in a dismissal of the charge when it was said sufficient Commonwealth testimony was lacking.

Evan Collins received a three-year pen term Saturday upon his conviction of the fatal wounding in Knott county last year of Deputy Sheriff Adam Smith, of that county.

Wesley Pennington, 55-year-old Lackey man, was given a 21-year pen term Tuesday when convicted of the slaying at Lackey August 3 of Crayton Slope. Pennington claimant that Slope knocked him down at that he was in fear of his life when he shot him to the effect that Pennington had no choice but to shoot him as he started to rise to his feet.

The murder docket continues on through this week. The grand jury adjourned Wednesday last week, after a nine-day session during which it examined 300 witnesses and returned 137 indictments. The jury's final report pointed out the improvement in the crime wave that has been present in our county for the past several years recommended the enlargement of the Circuit Clerk's office and the screening of jail windows; endorsed WPA enlargement or modernization of the courthouse, and praised officials who co-operated with them during their sitting here.

Alleged Impersonator of Officer Nabbed On Complaint of Man Here

Marvin McKinney, of Pikeville, was in the Johnson county jail at Paintsville last week facing two felony charges as a result of his alleged hold-up of C. L. Hyden, West Prestonsburg council here.

McKinney, it is alleged, held up Hyden, who was en route to Mr. Sterling with a truckload of hogs near Canoe Coal Gap, in Johnson county, impersonating an officer and assessed from Hyden a fine of \$1, giving a receipt for the fine. To the receipt he signed only a number, that of W. F. (Buddy) Wyrick, state highway patrolman.

The license number of the auto driven by McKinney was noted by R. G. Dyer, who in another auto was accompanying Mr. Hyden to Mr. Sterling. Check-up revealed that the car McKinney was driving belonged to Lola B. Anderson, of Ashland, and that the auto had been loaned McKinney by Mrs. Anderson's son while the latter was at Pikeville. Identity of McKinney thus established, Mr. Wyrick and Pikeville police arrested McKinney and lodged him in jail. He is charged with highway robbery and with impersonating an officer.

'JOCKEY GROUND' SCENE OF DEATH

One Dead, Another Wounded Saturday on Rock Fork, Knott County

One man is dead and another seriously wounded as the result of a "jockey ground" shooting affray near the Baptist Church Association held on Rock Fork Creek, Tolen, Saturday afternoon, and Clarence Conley (or Wickory), a man aged about 35 years, died at the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, Sunday morning at 1:30 o'clock from a bullet wound in his abdomen.

Thomas Manns, 31, of Wayland, is in the same hospital, where he has said Wednesday to have a fair chance of recovery. He was shot in the right chest.

Conflicting versions of the shooting have been received here. The consensus of these reports says the drinking was general around the "jockey ground." Conley was shot first, it is claimed. Turning, he saw Manns with a revolver in his hand. He then shot Manns. It has not been definitely established that Manns shot Conley, however, according to the report received here. The victim is survived by his widow and five children. Both of the wounded men were taken to the hospital at Martin in ambulances provided by E. P. Arnold, of Prestonsburg. Body of Conley was returned to Rock Fork where burial was made Monday.

KENTUCKY-VIRGINIA CITIZENS TO MEET

In Outing at Breaks Sunday; Congressman May, Others to Speak

Large delegations from Kentucky and Virginia are expected to gather in the Paintwoods area of the Breaks of Sandy Sunday, October 6, for an all-day outing which will serve the purpose of assembling supporters of the move to have the Breaks area made a national park and to secure the construction of a surfaced highway into the Breaks.

Congressman A. J. May, of Prestonsburg, Governor George C. Perry, and Congressman John A. Flanagan, of Virginia, and highway commissioners of both states will appear in addresses. Congressman May and Flanagan are joint sponsors of the bill in Congress providing for the creation of a national park in the Breaks area. Other features of the meeting will be music and airplane flights over the Breaks. All roads leading to the Breaks are in good condition, it is announced by G. J. Coley, chairman of the Breaks Good Road Club, which is sponsoring the gathering.

880 ENROLLED IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Enrollment in the Prestonsburg schools this year, though slightly below last year's total, is expected to equal, if not surpass, all former attendance records in the local schools.

The high school has the same enrollment as that of last year, 1934. The enrollment in the graded enrollment included here in West Prestonsburg and in the school in the Porter Addition. As in the past, work of the schools under the leadership of Prof. Iehmae Triplett, superintendent of city schools, is going along smoothly.

Footwashing Meeting Interrupted by Gunfire

FOUR WOUNDED BY LONE SHOTGUN MARKSMAN AT DICK'S CREEK AS CONGREGATION SCURRIES TO COVER

A "foot-washing" meeting at the Dick's Creek United Baptist Church was rudely interrupted Sunday morning by gunfire which wounded four men at that neighborhood and punctured the churchhouse itself with revolver bullets, according to information received here.

Robert Ambury, who is alleged to have shot the four men wounded during the fight, came to Prestonsburg and surrendered to county authorities Monday. He executed bond in Magistrate Jim Clark's office.

According to the report received here of the affair, Ambury and Floyd Lafferty had an altercation when the former asked Lafferty for a drink of whisky and was told there was none to be had. Ambury, this report continues, went home and got his shotgun and while inside the door of the Churchhouse exchanged shots with Floyd Lafferty and other members of his family.

The wounded are: John Laferly, wounded in the arm; Jess Laferly, shot in his temple, and a son of John Laferly, sprinkled with shot.

170 IN FLOYD TO GET ASSISTANCE

Toward Receiving High School Education, County School Head Is Told

Provisions have been made for aid for 170 high school students in Floyd county through the offices of the National Youth Administration. County Superintendent Ballarg Hunter was notified last week.

Funds not to exceed \$6 per month will be available to needy high school students who meet the qualifications exacted by the National Youth Administration. These requirements are:

Student must be member of a family on relief since May 1, 1935; must be between the ages of 16 and 25; able to do high-grade work in school and must be able to show that they have had to quit school for lack of funds in the past, or that they will be unable to attend school this year without assistance.

The quota of students residing outside Prestonsburg and Weeburg is 159; for Prestonsburg, 8, and for Weeburg, 3. Aid thus provided students is in the form of part-time jobs, which enable them to earn on an average of \$6 a month while attending school. Those needing such assistance should make application directly to the principal or superintendent of the school they would attend if financially able to do so.

A total of 6,423 students will be given aid under this plan. The high school has the same state director of the National Youth Administration, wrote Mr. Hunter.

HAZARD VICTIM OF CATS ATTACK

Local Eleven Runs Victory String to 14 With Early Onslaught

Striking with startling suddenness, Blackcat 7-0 thrall upon a foe that came here rated prime favorites to defeat them and break their victory string of 13 straight, the Prestonsburg Blackcat football team Saturday afternoon defeated the Hazar Bulldogs, 13 to 7.

Only in the second quarter when they made their only touchdown did the visitors show the offensive and drive expected of them. After a long march, a driving Ed Barker, left half, plunged over the marker.

In the first quarter "Otto" Archer, Prestonsburg quarter-back, stopped a Hazard pass on his own 40-yard marker and behind excellent blocking raced to the Hazard 10. From that point "Turkey" Hughes carried the ball across on the first attempt. Before the half ended the Blackcats scored a gain. Archer taking the ball from a driving Ed Barker, Hughes added the extra point.

For the greater part of the game Hazard was on the defensive, with the fast Prestonsburg back pounding steadily goalward behind a line that outplayed the heavier Bulldogs throughout. The Cats showed great improvement over their performance of the previous Saturday when they were expected to defeat Raceland. Coach Messer's boys annexed 12 first downs to Hazard's five and outclassed the visitors in every department of the game. Archer and Hughes starred in the Prestonsburg backfield with Patton and Barker sharing in the line. Work of the lesser-coached eleven indicates that the Blackcats will be a powerful factor, barring injuries, in the race for the Big Sandy conference title which they won last year.

WORK PROJECTS IN PRESTONSBURG TO COST \$133,000.00

West P'burg Included in Works Scheme, Mayor-Says; Roads, To Be Begun Soon

WPA FUNDS AWAITED

A total of \$133,000 will be spent on Prestonsburg and West Prestonsburg street paving and sewer construction, Mayor A. C. Carter said this week in reviewing projects approved for WPA work here. In this work will be included the construction of a bridge to supplant the obsolete span connecting Second avenue with the Garfield Addition.

As to property owners, it was indicated, will be confined to payment only of engineering expense.

The President has approved allotments of \$6,155.69 to finance 60 WPA projects in Kentucky, the total cost of which will be \$6,499,595.

Latest grant approved under the WPA for this county is that of \$34,350 to the Floyd County Board of Education for school buildings at Lackey, Garretts and Drift. These projects, it is estimated, will cost \$76,465, and will require 10 months for completion. No loan was requested.

Farm-to-market roads have been approved for construction in this county, but work on only one, the Mud Creek route, has been begun. Work on other such projects awaits only machinery and funds. It was said last week by an official connected with the local relief office.

HICKS ARRESTED IN MIDDLE CREEK

Middle Creek Man Accused of Fatal Slaying of Youth

Dud Hicks, of Middle Creek, was arrested Saturday morning on the head of Buck's Branch, 845 county, by Deputy Sheriff J. D. Fitzpatrick and Constable J. D. Harkins, of Paintsville, charged with the slaying of a boy, Marsillett, on the night of September 21 on Sparkle fork of Middle Creek.

Marsillett, a youth of 17 years, died of the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, Wednesday last week, as the result of four knife wounds, two three of which would have produced death, according to E. P. Arnold, who prepared the body for burial. Most serious of his wounds was a deep slash across the back of his neck, a stab in his chest and a cut which penetrated his intestines.

Officers making the arrest said Hicks did not deny cutting Marsillett, but said he claimed he did so "because I had to." For a time following the cutting of Marsillett authorities were unable to fix the identity of the person guilty of inflicting the wounds.

Hicks received \$500 bond for his appearance for examining trial here this week. Body of Marsillett, after being prepared for burial here, was taken to Sparkle fork of Middle Creek, where burial was made.

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MOUNTAIN AREA OF KY. LISTED AS SCENE OF RESETTLEMENT WORK

The major areas of the mountain area of Kentucky are listed as scenes of resettlement work. The land utilization division plans to concentrate its efforts to demonstrate the value of the proper use and conservation of the state's natural resources, according to James M. Gray, of Raleigh, N. C., Regional Director in charge of this work.

Gray, who has spent 25 years studying the land problems of this region, said that the mountainous area and adjacent lands, including tobacco region and the crossover timber section as areas in this state in which major adjustments in land use are necessary. "This does not mean," Gray pointed out, "that all the land in the designated areas

should be retired from cultivation. For instance, the purchase of woodland and steep eroded slopes for reforestation, as well as the development of small farms, are essential to the success of the program. It may be desirable to retire some of this land from its present use, but I want to emphasize that the long time program of this phase of Resettlement work will be to provide opportunities for farmers to withdraw from these ill-adapted areas and to settle where it is possible to produce a more satisfactory living.

In general, the withdrawal of families from these problem lands would have to be accomplished gradually, as the opportunities arise or are created, rather than by a rapid, large-scale change. There are, however, certain areas of acute distress that may require wholesale action of an emergency nature. The Land Utilization division and the Rural Resettlement division are working out this part of the general program cooperatively.

In portions of the mountainous area, Gray said, the widespread withdrawal of some of the arable farm land in the roughest areas, for conversion to some constructive use, such as forests, will be necessary. This would be followed by the institution of constructive management of forest lands. An increase in the size of farm units in the less broken areas would be advocated to permit larger pasture acreage per farm and smaller aggregate areas of crops. Introduction of erosion measures in the better farming areas would be one of the land-conservation measures necessary.

A program of widespread but not general withdrawal of some of the arable farm land in the hilly tobacco region also would be necessary, Gray said. The land withdrawn would be converted to some constructive use, such as forests, game preserves, or recreational areas. Erosion control and constructive management of forest land would be necessary in this area.

Two major adjustments are advocated in the cut-over timber region, he better management of forest land so as to assure a re-growth of timber, and the widespread withdrawal of the tillable farm land. In some sections, there will be little necessity for the withdrawal of farm land as more constructive use of the forest

land would furnish additional sources of income for farmers now living in these sections.

Re-Employment Service Registers Employables

Registration of employable persons on relief for cases of unemployment has increased the number of persons in the active file available for employment, from 113,684 in June to 236,677 in August, according to Myer Freyman, state director of the National Re-Employment Service.

Activities of the Re-Employment Service were expanded to take care of relief registration and temporary registration stations and traveling interviewers were sent into every county in the state to provide facilities for relief employables to register.

In spite of the fact that activities of the north of the state have been curtailed, these activities have not been discontinued. The registration and assignment of applicants to public works and private employment.

Placements for the three-month period totaled 5,748 with 1,280 of these going into the private industry and the remainder to projects financed in whole or in part by federal funds. Of the total number of placements made, 659 were women. Veterans who have a preferential rating when qualified by experience and training for assignment to public works were assigned to 1,190 jobs during the three-month period, June, July and August. As the registration of the employables on relief nears completion and the clerical operation to record these activities are finished, personnel of the district offices will be free to resume contact with private employers and Mr. Freyman indicated that placements with private employers would be materially increased.

The June, July and August totals for this district show: Placements in public projects, 351; placements in private industry, 28.

A JUST LAW

Alabama has joined several other states in exempting newspaper men from contempt of court sentences when they refuse to reveal news sources. A provision that should have belonged to publishers and members of their staffs' long ago. For to force a newsmen to divulge the source of his information would often prevent the gathering of news, and its publication would render a distinct community service.

Publishers should be protected in both the assembling and dissemination of news. There should be no power to compel them to reveal where they learned certain things. Of all professions the newspaper man should not be lost sight of in the quality of sentiment he renders. The man in the pulpit or the lawyer at the bar have no more right to expect or receive such protection and when it is extended to them and not to the newspapers, it smacks of the rankest discrimination.

Contempt of court is a much abused term. The man on the bench alone has the right to fix the extent of contempt and to impose the penalty for violation. And even a judge on the highest court is a man, subject to the frailties of other men, not immune to mistakes. Should there be instances where a prejudiced man is elevated to the bench he might vent his spite on a personal enemy who would have no recourse.

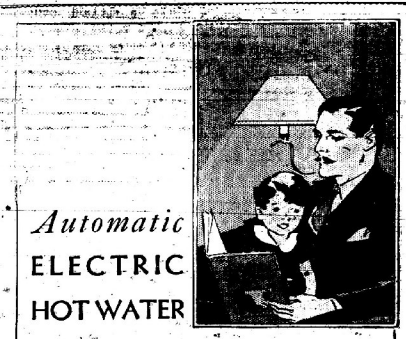

Pursuant to your instructions, I have made a detailed audit of the books of account and records of the Board of Education, Floyd County, Kentucky, for the period July 1, 1934, to June 30, 1935, also made the settlement with the Sheriff for the taxes collected for the various Consolidated Districts and submit herewith, Balance Sheet, Statement of School Fund; covering all your receipts and disbursements, except the Sinking Fund, detailed statements of each Consolidated District and the necessary supporting schedules.

I found your records well kept and expenditures all allowed by your board.

Particular attention is called to the following Schedules:
Schedule B (School Fund) As noted above, this Schedule includes all of the receipts and disbursements. The detailed statements of the Consolidated Districts are set out for your information and are not additional receipts and disbursements.

Schedule Q (Reconciliation of Bank Balances) While there might be some question as to advisability of carrying this Bank Balance at the close of the Fiscal Year, it appears to be necessary to take care of the current expenses for the Rural Schools until your receipts commence coming in.

Schedule R (Recapitulation of Indebtedness) This Schedule shows a net reduction of indebtedness for the Fiscal Year of \$36,504.91 after eliminating all Bank Balances. This speaks for itself without any further comment.

Schedule T (Warrants outstanding) Includes one warrant, duplicate of Number 240, issued by the preceding administration; this warrant is for \$686.76, payable to F. A. Maggard and there was no stub or record of same.

Schedule U (Accounts payable) Are as taken from your books and include accrued teachers pay rolls.

Schedule V (Overpaid commission on Consolidated districts) Section 4429-2 Carroll's statutes only allow the three per cent. This excess commission is noted for your information.

Schedule W (Interest on average general monthly balances) Under an order entered by your Board July 2, 1934, your depository was required to pay 2 per cent on average monthly balances. This amounts to \$832.12 and has not been paid.

I was given all assistance possible by your Superintendent and his helpers and take this opportunity of thanking them.

I certify that, in my opinion, subject to the comments above, the accompanying Balance Sheet and supporting schedules, fairly reflect the financial transactions of the Board for the period named and the condition of the various funds as of June 30, 1935.

That reward stood throughout the trial and no one claimed the reward because no one was presented who would say that I had made that statement. On inquiry I learned that a political enemy of mine was most instrumental in circulating this false, malicious, unwarranted and unfounded lie. I made no such statements, either on the floor of the courtroom or anywhere else, and the starting of this lie was, in my judgment, made for the purpose of trying to prejudice the minds of some people against either Mr. Burke, my brother-in-law, who was a candidate then, or myself in my race for the Senate this fall.
