4 County Road Projects, Drainage Work Is O.K.'d

\$233,260 TO BE EXPENDED ON FARM-TO-MARKET ROUTES IN DIST. NO. ONE

A total of \$233,260 will be spent on farm-to-market roads in Magisterial District No. 1, which was notified last week when four such routes were approved for construction by the Works Progress Administration in the district.

The four projects are road grade and drain surfacing, Cliff to Auxier, Abbott Creek Cliff to Auxier, Abbott Creek East Point to Auxier, and Bull Creek. In addition to grade and drain, a heavy rock surface, the top of which will be limestone chips, is to be added on sections of length of highway to be constructed, amount to be expended and number of men to be employed follow for each of the four projects:

Abbott Creek—six miles, \$72,728, plus \$4,750 by sponsor, to employ 150 unskilled workmen, four to six intermediate laborers, one to 13 skilled laborers, one professional workman and two superintendents.

East Point to Auxier—six miles, \$26,615, plus \$2,440 as sponsor's share, to employ 100 unskilled workmen, four to six intermediate and five skilled laborers and one professional workman.

Bull Creek—6.7 miles, \$66,506, plus \$7,225 by sponsor, to employ 131 unskilled, one intermediate, 12 skilled and three professional or technical workmen with five superintendents.

Cliff to Auxier—5.5 miles, \$40,236, with sponsor contributing \$2,760, 78 unskilled, eight intermediate and four skilled workmen and four superintendents.

The Mud Creek road is already under construction. Magistrate M. C. Wright said here this week that he would begin work toward preparing right-of-way deeds on the Salt Lick Creek road which has been approved by the WPA.

MINE AT LIGON TO RESUME OPERATION

New Company Incorporated at \$50,000 Opens Mine

Last week articles of incorporation of the Blue Beaver Elkhorn Mining Company, of Ligon, capitalized at \$50,000, were filed last week with Miss Sara Mahan, secretary of state. The incorporators are S. B. Hardy, H. S. Adkins and J. Mandt, F. L. Heinze, of Prestonsburg, is a stockholder in the company.

The new company takes charge of the operations of the former Blue Beaver Elkhorn Fuel Company on Clear Creek, and started work last week. Approximately 100 men will be employed in and around the mines to start with, it was said. The mines have been inactive since August 1 when they were abandoned by the Payne-Edger interests. A commissary to supplant that destroyed by fire several months ago will be erected, it was said.

Mr. Hardy and Mr. Adkins are connected with the Darby Fork Mining Company in Perry county, and Mr. Mandt, third of the incorporators, is connected with the Stephens Elkhorn Fuel Company at Alportetta.

HIGHLAND AVENUE WORK FUND BRINGS TOTAL TO \$183,000

News was received here this week, Mayor A. C. Carter said Wednesday, that an additional \$50,000 has been approved for expenditure on drainage and storm sewer construction in Prestonsburg by the Works Progress Administration. This appropriation, with the \$133,000 already approved for street paving here, brings the WPA fund for Prestonsburg up to \$183,000, Mayor Carter said.

The drainage and storm sewer work begins with Highland Avenue. It was said, extends the length of that street to near the gymnasium, thence into Trimble Branch. Highland Avenue property is inundated at every rainfall of any consequence, and the water from that section pours on down into the lower section of the town.

Work on local projects is not expected to start before next month, it was said this week.

MRS. OAK BURCHETT DIES AT LOUISVILLE

Native Floyd Woman Succumbs at Age of 34 After Long Illness

Mrs. Mae Wright Burchett, 34 years old, wife of Oak Burchett, died at the Kentucky Baptist hospital, Louisville, Friday following an illness of several weeks. Death was caused by enlargement of the spleen, and Mrs. Burchett had been seriously ill for some time at her home near Pikeville before being taken to Louisville for treatment.

A daughter of the late A. J. Wright, well-known resident of the Bull Creek section, and Mrs. Martha Willis Wright, Mrs. Burchett had a host of relatives and friends in this county. For several years she and her husband resided here. A few years ago, her husband being employed by the Piney Oil and Gas Company there. Mrs. Burchett was one of this section's best women.

Mrs. Burchett is survived by her husband; two children, Eula Mae and Jack Reynolds; her mother, two brothers, Edgar L. and Elder Wright, of Prestonsburg, and one sister, Mrs. Ed Banks, of Water Gap. Body of the victim was returned to the Burchett home near Pikeville, from which funeral rites were conducted Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock by the Rev. Isaac Stratton, of Banner, and the Rev. B. W. Craft, of Water Gap. Burial was made near the home under the direction of E. P. Arnold, Prestonsburg funeral director.

MISS GAYHEART DIES AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

Miss Hattie Gayheart, 37 years old, of this place, died Saturday morning at the Dever Valley hospital, Martin, after an illness of a few days. Miss Gayheart's death was unexpected. She had received treatment at the hospital a few days earlier, had returned here, then was returned to her own hospital, where her condition became worse.

Miss Gayheart resided here for the past six years at the home of W. S. Harkins, Jr., and had a host of friends who mourn her passing. She was native of Knott county, a daughter of the late Joseph and Martha Gayheart. Surviving her are two sisters and four brothers. The body was taken to the Gayheart home at Yellow Mountain, Ky., where funeral services were conducted and burial made Sunday in the Bolen cemetery.

BLACKCAT VICTORY STRING RUN TO 15

With one last, despairing scoring thrust, the Prestonsburg Blackcats surged over the Olive Hill goal line in the last three minutes of Saturday afternoon's game at Olive Hill to keep intact one of the longest victory strings ever unwound by a football team from this section.

They won, 6 to 3, and thus extended their undefeated record to 15 consecutive games. Through three quarters and a minute of the fourth it was a badly baffled bunch of Blackcats who faced Olive Hill. In the first place, the 'Cats were away from home for the first time this year, and next, they were fresh from a rousing victory over Hazard and were over-confident.

The Comets took the lead in the second quarter by virtue of a perfect dropkick for a field goal from the Prestonsburg 35-yard line by Garynt. Thereafter, the Comets pounded away at the 'Cats, threatening often but being held by the big Prestonsburg line when in a scoring position.

BULL CREEK MINE TO RESUME WORK

Tipple and Shop-House Destroyed by Fire Replaced; Good Run Seen

Construction of a tipple and shop-house to replace those destroyed several months ago by fire was near completion early this week by the Sandy Valley Coal Company at Water Gap, and the mine was expected to resume operation late this week or early next, J. R. Hurt, superintendent, said.

A good run is in prospect. Mr. Hurt said. The mine will furnish work for about 125 men, most of whom have been idle since the fire. Production of the operation will be around 400 tons of coal a day, it is predicted.

The tipple replacing that which was burned was moved to Bull Creek from Van Lear, where it had been used by the Consolidation Coal Company, and is adequate to satisfy all the needs of the mine.

LEFT BEAVER MAN GETS SECOND TERM IN LITTLE SLAYING

Hall Draws Two Years; So Does Tackett in Death of Uncle

NEW JURY ANNOUNCED

"Pistol" Joe Hall is pardoned beyond recall. Paroled several months ago from a 21-year term for the slaying of Willard Little at Wheelwright, he was indicted soon after his return to this county for the murder of Willard Little's son, Estlin, who was fatally wounded at the same time his father was killed. Friday, last week, a jury in the Floyd circuit court adjudged him guilty of the slaying of Estlin and gave him a two-year pen term.

The defendant, a deputy constable at the time of the shooting, claimed that he fired in self-defense. It was testified at the trial that he had had the "litties" under arrest but had liberated them, telling them to go home. Commonwealth's testimony alleged he shot the two without provocation.

Andy Tackett last Wednesday drew a two-year term for the slaying of his uncle, Curtis Hamilton, on Mud Creek recently. His brother, Curtis Tackett, was acquitted of the murder charge filed against him in the same slaying. Hamilton's head was crushed, allegedly by a blow dealt him by one of the brothers. The Tackett boys it was stated, had an altercation with Hamilton's sons and Hamilton had gone upon his home, more than a mile up Mud from the scene of the light, to where the boys were. Shots were fired. The Tacketts claimed Hamilton fired on them and that he was struck in self-defense. Hamilton's Commonwealth contention that they assaulted their uncle without provocation.

Murder charge filed against Frank Hatfield by the grand jury which adjourned two weeks ago was dismissed Tuesday on motion of Commonwealth's Attorney O. C. Hall. Deputy Sheriff Hatfield and Deputy Sheriff Willie Johnson were named in a murder indictment for the slaying of Walter Mills, of Moline, recently, but their trials were sent separately. It is believed Johnson will not be given trial.

Though the October term of court is a civil session, at least one murder trial is docketed. This is that of Harry Lee Leslie, charged with the slaying of Jack Harris. The trial is set for Friday.

Gentlemen:

Pursuant to your instructions, I have made a detailed audit of the books of account and records of the Board of Education, Floyd County, Kentucky, for the period July 1, 1934, to June 30, 1935, also made the settlement with the Sheriff for the taxes collected for the various Consolidated Districts and submit herewith, Balance Sheet, Statement of School Fund, covering all your receipts and disbursements, except the Sinking Funds, detailed statements of each Consolidated District and the necessary supporting schedules.

I found your records well kept and expenditures all allowed by your board. Particular attention is called to the following Schedules:
Schedule B. (School Fund) As noted above, this Schedule includes all of the receipts and disbursements. The detailed statements of the Consolidated Districts are set out for your information and are not additional receipts and disbursements.

Schedule Q. (Reconciliation of Bank Balances) While there might be some question as to advisability of carrying this Bank Balance at the close of the Fiscal Year, it appears to be necessary to take care of the current expenses for the Rural Schools until your receipts commence coming in.

Schedule R. (Recapitulation of Indebtedness) This Schedule shows a net reduction of indebtedness for the Fiscal Year of \$38,504.91 after eliminating all Bank Balances. I believe this speaks for itself without any further comment.

Schedule T. (Warrants outstanding) Includes one warrant, duplicate of Number 240, issued by the preceding administration; this warrant is for \$686.70, payable to F. A. Maggard and there was no stub or record of same.

Schedule U. (Accounts payable) Are as taken from your books and include accrued teachers pay-rolls.

Schedule V. (Overpaid commission on Consolidated districts) Section 4426-2 Carroll's statutes only allow the Sheriff 1 per cent. This excess commission is noted for your information.

Schedule W. (Interest on average general monthly balances). Under an order entered by your Board July 2, 1934, your depository was required to pay 2 per cent on average monthly balances. This amounts to \$332.12 and has not been paid.

I was given all assistance possible by your Superintendent and his helpers and take this opportunity of thanking them. I certify that, in my opinion, subject to the comments above, the accompanying Balance Sheet and supporting schedules, fairly reflect the financial transactions of the Board for the period named and the condition of the various funds as of June 30, 1935.

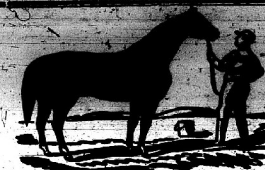
