## PETRY AWARDED NOMINATION FOR REPRESENTATIVE

Judge Gaudill's Decision Eliminates Jack's Creek and John Possum Vote

### HATCHER TO APPEAL

Mel Petry was awarded the Democratic nomination for Representative from the 93rd legislative district in an opinion handed down Tuesday morning by Judge John W. Gaudill of the Floyd Circuit Court.

In directing that the Floyd county election commissioners grant Petry certificate of nomination and that County Clerk A. B. Meade cause Petry's name to appear on the ballot, the Democratic nominee instead of the contestee, J. J. (Jimmy) Hatcher, Judge Gaudill dismissed counter claim and counter-grounds of contest filed by the contestee, and held that all costs of the contest suit, except those incurred in the taking of depositions, be paid by Mr. Hatcher.

John Possum and Jack's Creek precincts were thrown out of the vote count by Judge Gaudill's ruling. As a result of the recount of the vote made shortly after the primary, Hatcher amassed a vote total of 2266 to Petry's 2128. In this instance, however, Possum, disregarding the Jack's Creek vote, the opinion out of Hatcher's total 876 votes, and the loss of John Possum decreased the total Petry through this decision lost only one vote in Jack's Creek and 23 in John Possum.

The decision leaves the vote: 2165 for Petry, 1710 for Hatcher.

Neither contestant nor contestee was held guilty of violation of the Corrupt Practice Act. Attorneys for Mr. Hatcher are preparing to carry the case to the court of appeals, it was said Tuesday.

## MILBURN KILLED BY WRECKED CAR

Estep Hurt As Truck Topples At Station

Bill Milburn, a man of about 40 years, was fatally injured Friday afternoon at Garrett, and Barbel Estep, 29, well-known Garrett man, was seriously hurt when the truck owned by E. S. Martin, Wayland, toppled from the highway and over an embankment onto them.

Milburn died Saturday at the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, as a result of internal injuries and Estep is in the same hospital, suffering from a broken pelvis. His condition is such that his sister, Mrs. K. C. Beverly, Prestonsburg, said Tuesday that his recovery yet is doubtful. Both were pinned beneath the truck.

Estep and Milburn were working at the roadside near the Tilling station of Mr. Estep's father, Will Estep, when the truck sought to pass another car. Seeing, it is said, that it would not be possible to pass the other auto safely, the driver applied the brakes and the truck plunged over the bank.

Milburn was a widower and had resided for some time at the home of Ben Lyons, Garrett. He worked at odd jobs about Garrett, and had numerous friends there. The body was prepared for burial by E. F. Arnold who returned to Garrett where burial was made Sunday.

## TWO DIE BENEATH WHEELS OF TRAIN AT BETSY LAYNE

Stilton and Patrick Victims Believed To Have Been Asleep When Struck

### FUNERALS AT TRAM

Roy Stilton, 35 years old, Betsy Layne miner, and Jimmie Patrick, 25, of Tram, were instantly killed shortly after midnight Saturday when struck by a train on the G. and O. tracks near the old St. Paul bridge below Betsy Layne.

Both bodies were badly mangled. It is believed that the two men had fallen asleep on the tracks. Trainmen are reported to have said they saw the two men on the tracks too late to stop the train before it struck them. They had fallen Betsy Layne and were believed to have staggered toward Tram where Patrick lived.

Stilton was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Stilton and was born at Grundy, Va., March 16, 1900. Besides his parents, he is survived by his widow, Mrs. Bessie Layne Stilton, a daughter of Lee Layne, of Tram; three children, Pearl, 11, Fred, 8, and Mabel, 5; three brothers and four sisters: Mrs. Virgie McClellan, Mrs. Nannie McClellan, Miss Augusta Stilton and Mrs. Josephine Clevenger, all of Grundy, Va.; Charles, Anita and Ray Stilton of Elkhorn City.

Second of the victims was a son of Steve and Bessie Miller Patrick, of Tram. He had many relatives in the vicinity of Prestonsburg and elsewhere in the county. He is survived by his parents and by three brothers and six sisters: Mae, Kate Adams, Willie, Adis, and Truly Patrick, all of Tram; Mrs. Malcom Prater, of Coal; Mrs. Warren Hale and Mrs. Mack Harmon, West Prestonsburg; Mrs. John Reuther, of Prestonsburg.

Funerals of the victims were conducted Monday afternoon. Patrick's at 1 o'clock from the home of his sister, Mrs. Adams, at Tram, and that of Stilton two hours later at the home of Lee Layne, of Tram. Rites were conducted by the Rev. Isaac Stutz, who resided in the block from the home of the Rev. Stutz, at the time of the accident. Both funerals, Patrick was buried in the Powell cemetery, and Stilton in the Layne cemetery.

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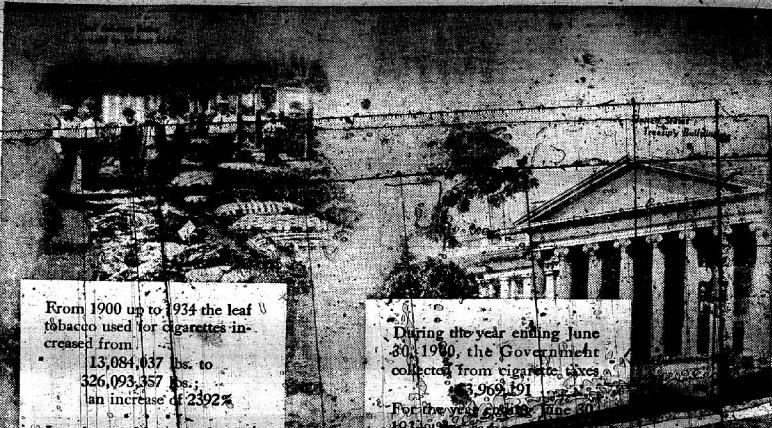

# Floyd County Board AUDIT REPORT

Pursuant to your instructions, I have made a detailed audit of the books and accounts and records of the Board of Education, Floyd County, Kentucky, for the period July 1, 1934, to June 30, 1935, who made the settlement with the Sheriff for the taxes and fines of the various Consolidated Districts and submit herewith, Balance Sheet, Statement of School Funds covering all receipts and disbursements, except the Sinking Fund of School statements of each Consolidated District and the necessary supporting schedules, detailed and found your records well kept and expenditures all allowed by the board.

Schedule I. (Receipts) All of the receipts and disbursements of the Consolidated Districts are set out for your information and are not additional receipts and disbursements.

Schedule U. (Reconciliation of Bank Balances) While there might be some question as to the advisability of carrying this Bank Balance at the close of the Fiscal Year, it appears to be necessary to take care of the current expenses for the Rural Schools until your next convenience coming in.

Schedule R. (Recapitulation of Indebtedness) This Schedule shows a net reduction of indebtedness for the Fiscal Year of \$38,504.91 after eliminating all Bank Balances. I believe this speaks for itself without any further comment.

Schedule T. (Warrants outstanding) Includes one warrant duplicate of Number 2407 issued by the preceding administration; this warrant is for \$686.70, payable to F. A. Massey and there was no record of same.

Schedule U. (Accounts payable) Are as taken from your books and include accrued teachers pay rolls.

Schedule V. (Overpaid commission on Consolidated districts) Section 1426-2 Code of Statutes only allow the Sheriff 1 per cent. This excess commission is noted for your information.

Schedule W. (Interest on average general monthly balances) Under an order entered by your Board July 2, 1934, your depository was required to pay 2 per cent on average monthly balances. This amounts to \$832.12 and has not been paid.

I was given all assistance possible by your Superintendent and his helpers and take this opportunity of thanking them.  
I certify that, in my opinion, subject to the comments above, the accompanying Balance Sheet and supporting schedules, fully reflect the financial transactions of the Board for the period named and the condition of the various funds as of June 30, 1935.
