HIRAM HARRIS IS CALLED BY DEATH IN HIS 90TH YEAR

Prominent Prestonsburg Business Man Succumbs at Home Here Saturday

FUNERAL MONDAY

Death Saturday morning at 5 o'clock claimed the life of Hiram Harris, one of this section's oldest and most prominent men, at his home here after an illness attendant upon advanced age, and, though expected, was the occasion of deepest regret to his hundreds of friends, relatives and business associates throughout Eastern Kentucky.

Eighteen days past his 89th milestone when death came, "Uncle H," as he was familiarly known, had seen Prestonsburg and Floyd county develop from a region of hidden, little-known resources into an area of great wealth, and he had taken a prominent part in this development. He was born Oct. 29, 1846, the son of Joseph and Sarah Spurrlock Harris, and spent his entire life in this vicinity.

With his death passed probably the last eyewitness to the battle of Middle Creek. As a boy in his teens he watched the engagement between the forces of General James A. Garfield and General Humphrey Marshall, later meeting the future President and before the Confederate forces left this section passing.

A few hours after Chester Perry and Henry Smith, who were arrested near here last week, had been released to Knott county authorities, three persons, two girls and a young man, were arrested Thursday night by Ashland police and also were turned over to Knott authorities.

These arrested in Ashland were Charles Tanner, 20 years old; Charles Tanner, 16, and Lucy Mae Stephens, 16. They are believed to have operated as a gang in this section with Terry and Mobitt. In Knott county they are wanted in connection with the looting of County Judge E. M. Moore's store. Their alleged crime career in this county is traced by Police Chief Charles F. Howard, of Ashland, to the theft of an automobile from Johnny Martin, of Hueysville. Chief Howard reported that the tags found on his Martin car after it had been stolen were those taken from an Ashland automobile.

Federal Funds Available for Johns Creek Route if Fiscal Court Will Take Necessary Action, Congressman May Points Out

R. C. CAMPAIGNS TO PREVENT ACCIDENTS

Program Inaugurated in Local Chapters to Cut Down Farm and Home Accidents

The American Red Cross has launched a nation-wide campaign to eliminate hazards in the home and on the farm. The program is being inaugurated in local chapters to cut down farm and home accidents. Every school child is being taught to play a part in this campaign. Mr. Pleser said, "Hazards in the various communities will be pointed out. The children in our schools throughout the country will be given a list of the home hazards and asked to enroll parents or relatives in the fight against them."

Nearly five million men, women, and children were temporarily disabled in the homes of America last year by accidents, officials of the National Safety Council have revealed. Most of the accidents in which persons were killed and injured could have been prevented, according to this safety agency. This fact alone largely motivates the Red Cross drive for accident elimination. Active cooperation of social, civic, educational, veterans' and other groups has been secured. Red Cross inspection teams to homes where there are no children with the help of these organizations.

Due to inaccessibility and lack of compensation, little or no pioneering has been done in the field of farm safety, the Red Cross states. However, more progress is being made in agricultural pursuits last year than in any other occupation, making the need for safety education and farm home inspection apparent.

Other agencies now active in the accident-prevention field point to the fact that, because of its nearly 18,000 chapters and branches, the Red Cross has a unique opportunity to successfully promote a project of this nature.

More than 200,000 automobile accidents; they kill nearly as many, claiming an average of about 30 lives daily. In terms of dollars and cents, for the practical minded, home accidents cost more than \$1,000 per minute.

Accidents of all types are Public Enemy No. 4. Only three diseases cause as many deaths each year, heart disease, cancer and cerebral hemorrhage.

"The home is not the place of safety; it is commonly supposed to be," said Mr. Pleser in commenting on the new Red Cross service to the community.

"The Red Cross, as a part of its chartered obligation to prevent death and alleviate suffering, is conducting this humanitarian program to cut down the mounting toll of avoidable personal injury and death in the homes of the country."

The annual Red Cross roll call, running from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day, is one of the means of backing such a campaign. All citizens of the United States are offered the opportunity to join and assist in the work of the organization.

Red Cross Has Busy Year; Statistics Impressive; Services Varied

Figures gathered at random from the year's report of the American Red Cross reveal the magnitude of the work being carried on by that organization. Red Cross workers assisted 54,305 patients; 357 Red Cross Public Health Nurses paid 921,456 visits to 181,526 patients; \$3,444,181 of certificates were issued while 46,693 persons were trained in life saving. Volunteer workers produced 3,107,842 surgical dressings, with 80,611 volunteers being on active duty throughout the year.

First Aid Treatment Taught Thousands By Red Cross

More than 187,000 certificates showing completion of first aid courses were issued last year by the Red Cross. This shows a gain of 56,000 certificates over the previous year. Approximately 61,200 persons in C. C. Camps throughout the country passed first aid tests. Since the first teaching, being one of the first organizations in the world to do so, almost one million persons have been trained in handling emergency treatment.

The annual report of the Red Cross further reveals that more than 27,000 copies of the Red Cross Aid Handbook have been sold at home and abroad.

The Red Cross has assisted 54,305 persons in clearing their cases through the U. S. Veterans' Bureau this past year.

Last year 2,877,941 persons became members of the Red Cross. The annual roll call takes place each year between Armistice Day and Thanksgiving Day.

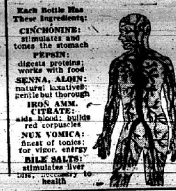
Junior Red Cross members increased by 42,400 enrollments during the year which has just passed. Junior members carried on an exchange of correspondence with their members in 62 other countries having Red Cross Societies.

A few years ago, The Times engaged in a rather lengthy discussion of this matter with members of the State Board of Education. Neither convinced the other of anything except that the other was deluded, deceived and hopelessly wrong. To this day, The Times remains convinced that our opponents in this long distance debate were wrong. Doubtless, his opinion is unchanged.

If he could only get out of the maze of idealism, he would be on the ground, he would know that the only way to get something for him to have is to get the best man in Floyd county who would have been a liberal and a practical educationist.

He would have known all along who the candidates for Superintendent were. He would have known that old-time politics were being played, with probably a few added modern touches. He would have seen school affairs in politics so unmistakably that even the race for Governor was overshadowed at times.

This is not to criticize any faction in the Board of Education, but to point out the fact that the thing is in politics, hence politics will be played.

It is just as reasonable for one to object to election of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction by popular vote as it is to object to the election of a County Superintendent of Schools by direct vote of the people. Try electing the State Superintendent once by the slash, alias "board" method; then come around and tell us how the thing was removed so Utopian-like from politics.

Of such is the fabric of dreams!

DIES, WHILE ON VISIT IN FLOYD

Stricken by a sudden heart attack October 18 at his old home in Betsy Layne, where he was visiting, William Roe Layne, of Washington, D. C., died before medical aid could be summoned.

Though he had been ill for some time, his sudden passing was a shock to his relatives and friends.

At the time of the fatal seizure he was in this county from Washington visiting relatives during his vacation of a few weeks. Mr. Layne was a son of Cyrus Isle Layne and Rebecca Nesbitt Layne, deceased, and was born February 17, 1877. His early manhood was spent in Floyd county where he taught school and attended school in Prestonsburg, until he enlisted in the Spanish-American War. Later he was called to Washington, D. C., where he held a position in the Agricultural Department. He was a student of the Bible and reading creative writing were his chief pleasures.

Being ambitious, he availed himself of the opportunities to further his education by attending the National University, Washington, D. C., and graduated in law in 1907 and earned M. A. degree in 1908. He was admitted to the bar in 1921. In 1924 he was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States and in the same year Mr. Layne was appointed Assistant Attorney in the office of the Attorney General of the United States and was assigned to the Indian Office. In 1926 as representative of the Indian Office, he was appointed a member of the Federal Commission on Federal Land Policy, cooperating with the Agriculture Department. This committee listed as its personnel the Assistant Commissioner of the Land Economics, Engineer Conservation Branch and Representative of Geological Survey of the Secretary of Agriculture.

Mr. Layne came in direct line of splendid Revolutionary stock. In social recreation he was a member of the University Club of Washington, and member of Lafayette Masonic Lodge No. 19 and other fraternities in Washington. On October 23, 1909, he was married to Miss Annie Graves of Franklin, Ind., who survives him. One sister, Mrs. W. J. Fitzpatrick, Miami, Fla. and two brothers, J. S. Layne and C. B. Layne, of Betsy Layne, and a host of relatives and friends mourn his loss. The funeral service was conducted at the old home, and interment was made in the family cemetery at Betsy Layne.

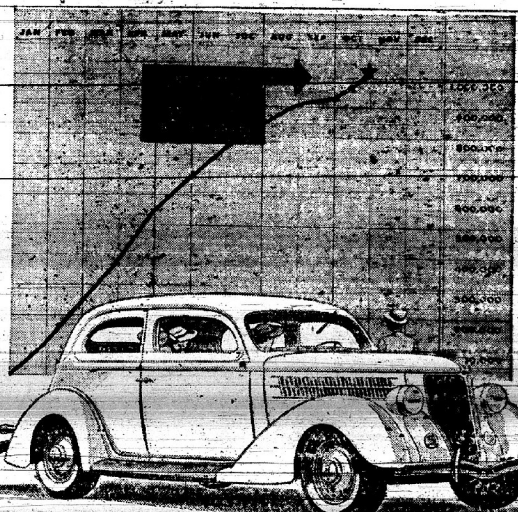

APPROPRIATION FOR SCHOOLS IS MADE

Construction of Six Buildings Already Approved, Others Pending, Hunter Says

More than \$20,000 have already been appropriated by the Works Progress Administration and the Floyd county board of education for approved work that will be completed in the next few months. It was said Tuesday by Ballard Hunter, superintendent of Floyd county schools.

In addition to the already approved construction of these six, 11 others have been approved locally for construction by local educational and relief authorities, with 30 other school buildings in the county to be repaired at a cost to the county board of education approximately \$8,000, plus a much larger sum by the WPA.

School buildings approved for WPA construction in cooperation with the Floyd county board of education are:

Cracker, 2-room stone, total cost \$1,500, \$267 of which is to be supplied by the board of education. The same for Orkney, Water Gap and Greeshel. At Hubert, District 78, a stone building requiring the same expenditure. At the same place with no cost to the county, was said by Mr. Hunter.

At Garrett a stone building is to be built at a total cost of \$30,000, \$250 of which is to be paid by the county board of education. Though not officially approved, construction of a four-room stone building on Stone Coal is planned by the Garrett schools.

In West Buchanan, Mr. Hunter said, a stone building is to be built at a total cost of \$21,800, \$21,800 of which is to be supplied by the county board of education. Other proposed school buildings are a 2-room structure on Little Point, the same type building on Big Mud in District 61 and a 3-room building at Wheelright for a colored school. The complete list of buildings to be erected and those to be repaired will be published as released.

Evangelistic services being conducted at the Presbyterian Church are arousing increasing interest. The services being conducted with the Rev. I. W. Wilcox, of Mt. Sterling, as preacher, and various singers of the community joining in the music.

The theme of the minister Friday night at 7:30 o'clock will be "The Christian's Religion." There will be special music, including a solo by Franklin Moore. Sunday morning, Mr. Wilcox will preach on the theme: "The Christian's Obligation to His Community." Sunday night's topic will be "Letting Salvation Slip."

Young People's night is to be observed Monday, with high school and upper grade students urged to attend the services. "Making Life a Success" will be the theme of the speaker.

Mr. Wilcox's clear-cut presentation of Christian truth has drawn his hearers to him and it is hoped much good will come from the services which are to extend through Wednesday night.

WHEELWRIGHT MINER DIES IN SLATE FALL

A fall of slate in the Wheelwright mine of the Inland Slate Company at Wheelright, Friday night fatally wounded Sol Justice, 53, who had been working in the mine 15 months as a rock driller. Justice was badly crushed about the head and body and was rushed to the hospital at Pikeville where he died two hours later.

Justice is survived by his widow, Susie Justice. The body was shipped to Olive Hill, Justice's old home, for burial.

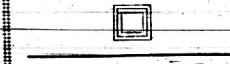

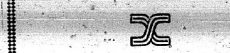

SECOND TALLY OF BOARD VOTE MADE

Reveals No Material Errors; Roberts Contest's Scott's Election.

Aftermaths of the recent election were a re-count of the county board of education vote over the week-end and a contest suit in the Magistrate's court in District No. 4.

The school board re-count resulted in no material change in the vote total. Contesting the election of John Scott, Republican, Magistrate, Dewey Roberts contends that fraud was committed in Tickey, Lee Alley, Mouth of Mud and Toler precincts and that the contestee was guilty of violation of the Corrupt Practices Act.

In Tickey, Roberts' petition alleges fraud, bribery and intimidation of election officers resulted in more than 20 percent of the votes cast there being illegal. He asks that the 204 votes cast there for Scott be discounted.

Twenty-five votes in Mouth Mud precincts, the petition alleges, were cast by persons not qualified as legal electors. In Toler precinct, according to the contest petition, 37 votes of persons not qualified as electors because they are under the voting age, were counted for Scott. Ten votes of non-residents were also counted for the contestee, it was alleged.

The Lee Alley precinct vote was more than 50 per cent illegal, it is contended, since a large number of votes there cast their ballots on the table. The contestant alleged the expenditure of a sum approximating \$3,000 by the contestee.

The Governor said clemency was recommended by all the trial jurors, 105 citizens of the county and a number of officials. Stevens was convicted of the killing of a man named Williams on the mountain between Little Mud and Prater Creeks. Andy Stevens, who also was convicted of the killing, was paroled in 1935, according to county officials here.

The commutation granted Bernard Stevens rendered him eligible for immediate parole.
