CITY HAS NEW MOP FACTORY

(Painitsville News)

A mop factory has been established in Painitsville by Col. J. B. Arrowood and J. B. Wells, Jr. The new undertaking is the first factory of any kind to be located in Painitsville, and it promises to be a good enterprise since the organization, namely, the Arrowolds Mop and Broom Company has announced that they are manufacturing a quality product to compare with the best of prices which are attractive and competitive.

The factory is located in the old Home Furniture Company building at Earl and Triston street. Output of this factory is estimated to be an average of 20 dozen mops a day. The managers are, however, planning to buy additional equipment in the near future which will increase the output to approximately 75 dozen a day.

When the new equipment is installed it will require the employment of several additional operators and yarn cutters. In the manufacture of domestic wet-mop, mop yarn and mop material, the yarn is obtained from the Southern states, and the handles are now being purchased from West Virginia and Indiana.

The company has made it known that if anyone in this section is in position to manufacture these handles and are able to compete with prices offered with the foreign sources, that is the manufacturers from other states, and are able to produce a product in quantities, that they should get in touch with the company and try to work out some system by which they can do business.

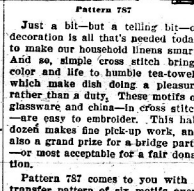
