MAY WINS NOMINATION BY 15,000

QUIET OF ELECTION FACULTY OF HIGH DAY DISTURBED BY MUD CREEK KILLING SCHOOL IS NAMED

Lawrence Roberts, Election Officer, Killed Near Hazard Saturday Night

TWO JAILED HERE

An otherwise tranquilly peaceful election day was marred by the slaying shortly before midnight Saturday afternoon on Mud Creek, near Hazard, of Lawrence Roberts, 58 years old, father of Ex-Magistrate Dewey Roberts, and well-known Floyd county man.

The boards are expected soon to agree on appointment of an athletic coach. Frank Brannan has been mentioned as a probable assistant coach. September 7 has tentatively been designated as opening date of local schools.

WOMAN FATALLY HURT IN MARTIN

Police Chief J. U. Maynard, of Martin, county headquarters, said Mrs. Mary Maynard died of injuries suffered during a melee in the woman's small house at Beauty, a Martin county hamlet.

He said Joseph Ward and Ward's father-in-law, Elmer Ward, are in jail at Hazard. No charges had been placed against either Maynard said.

Funeral rites for Andrew Jackson (Jack) Boose, 60 years old, who died Wednesday last week, of injuries sustained at his home on Town Branch, near here, when a box of dynamite exploded in his hands, were conducted Friday by Revs. Isaac Stratton and B. W. Craft at the graveside in the Branhams cemetery near the Boose home. Burial was made under the direction of E. P. Arnold.

Surviving Mr. Boose are his widow, Mrs. Hattie Towler Boose, one son, Robert, and one daughter, Mrs. Lena Cooley.

High School Boy Under \$5,000 Bond in Tragedy

Ray Craft, Prestonsburg high school student and athlete, was placed under \$5,000 bond Tuesday afternoon, a few hours after Paul Vaughan, 28 years old, of this place, had been fatally injured on the Mayo Trail at the mouth of Daniels Creek when Craft's car left the highway and sent a traffic hurtling against Vaughan's body.

The victim was working with a state highway department maintenance crew when injured. Crushed about the chest and head, he died within half a hour, just as fellow workers were carrying him into the Boaver Valley hospital, Martin.

Highway employes, said they had just returned to the scene of the tragedy from Allen with a truckload of gravel when Craft's auto came into view racing at high speed downriver. The truck was parked on the side of the road taken by young Ray Craft. The six-kettle, workman said, was five or six feet off the road, Vaughan standing near it. Henry Holbrook, one of the workmen, said Craft evidently tried to evade striking the truck by steering his car from the pavement with the cone of the tractor machine crashed into the kettle which was crushed against Vaughan's body.

Another report says a car was approaching from downriver and that young Craft was unable to stop, having only a choice of driving off the road on his own side or cutting to the left and meeting the approaching car head-on. This version of the mishap said the youth made every effort to avoid the tragedy.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Vaughan, the victim was one of Prestonsburg's best young men, and his tragic passing came as a shock to his many friends and relatives. Besides his parents, he is survived by two small daughters, Dolores and Verna, and the following brothers and sisters: Bill, Dore and Harry Vaughan, of Prestonsburg; Frank of Marion, Ind.; Mrs. Dick Gilston and Mrs. Richard Ball, of Prestonsburg, and Mrs. John Mitchell, of Abbeville, S. C.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed when this was written. The County Attorney Forrest D. Short and body was brought here and prepared for burial by E. P. Arnold.

ASK \$35,000 BOND FOR RELEASE OF 3 COMPLETE SWEEP MADE BY VICTOR

Stumbo and Hamilton Execute \$10,000 Bond Each; Johnson Bail Set at \$15,000

A total of \$35,000 bond was asked Tuesday by John Allen, county judge pro-tem, for the release of three men facing murder charges in the slaying of two Floyd county men.

Walk Stumbo and Basil (Tinker) Hamilton, accused of the slaying of Alton Patton at Martin, \$10,000 bond is asked. Johnson produced no testimony at the examining trial held Tuesday afternoon. Two eyewitnesses to the slaying were sworn. One of these said he was approximately 75 feet away, that he saw Patton hit the ground and ask the officer not to shoot him, saying that he would go home. He said Johnson fired three shots. The other witness testified that Johnson was attempting to arrest Wayne Hagan, when Patton interfered, saying he would take Hagan's money and that the two men grappled, wresting money from Hagan's front of John Stephens' restaurant. Johnson then shoved Patton back and fired four shots, this witness said.

County Judge W. L. Stumbo, O. E. Stumbo and John M. Hall signed Walk Stumbo's bond. O. E. Stumbo and John M. Hall were sureties for Hamilton. Johnson expected to execute bond today (Wednesday).

BURKE TRAILING

Poling a majority in each of the eight counties of the district. Congressman A. J. May, complete return shows, took the leading route Saturday to the nomination for Congress from the Seventh Congressional district.

Burke was giving John R. Mollette, Van Lear, a run for his money in the race for the Republican nomination for Congress. He was behind 500 votes, with Knott county supporters.

But, of the six races run on the two tickets, the Senatorial contest between Senator Mills M. Logan and Ex-Governor J. C. W. Beckham commanded greatest interest as the vote out in the state gave Logan a majority that was not so large but that, many believed, Beckham would rebound high in the city of Louisville. The vote count continued in Louisville and Jefferson county on through Wednesday, and as this was written Wednesday afternoon the election was yet unsettled.

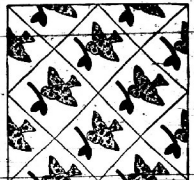
The attack on the woman and child took place near the Floyd-Madison line, and officials here said they believe Madison county has jurisdiction in prosecution of the charge which may be filed against England.

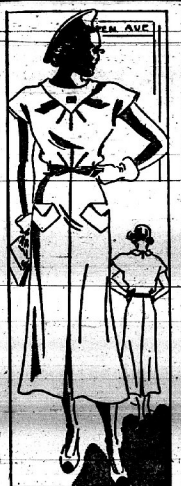

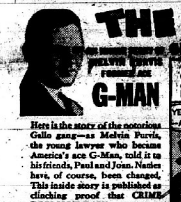

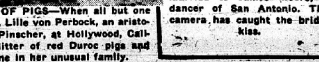

Watch for the September issue of our State Farmer section. The Times is sure you will enjoy it and likewise appreciate issues to follow in the next full week of each month to follow.

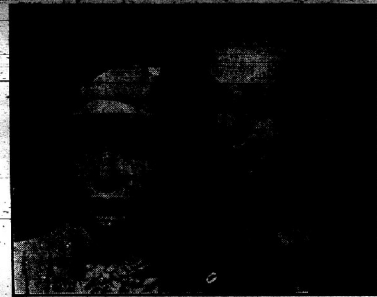
