The plane from which he leaped to his death was a Wheeler bi-plane and was piloted by a pilot of Duke Moore, transport pilot of New Ky. The plane was reported to be owned by Thos. Taylor, of Stone.

TELEPHONE COMPANY RATES IN PRINSTONBURG REDUCED

Oranges and lemons are valuable and necessary parts of the well-balanced diet. Through the use of them we get the protective food element which is most appetizing. They fit into any part of a meal from cocktails through the dessert.

Lemon Cocktail Sauce For Fruit
 1/2 cup sugar.
 1 cup water.
 1/8 teaspoon each of cinnamon and nutmeg.
 1/4 cup lemon juice.
 2 cups dry sliced fruit mixture.
 1/2 cup sugar, water, cinnamon and nutmeg for 5 minutes. Cool. Add lemon juice and pour over sliced fruit. Serve chilled in cocktail glass.

Fruit Cup
 1 cup orange segments.
 1/2 cup orange juice.
 1 cup long slender, red sliced apple pieces, unpeeled.
 1/2 cup shredded dates.
 2 tablespoons lemon juice.
 2 tablespoons sugar.
 Combine ingredients, and serve very cold.

Orange Sherbet
 1 grapefruit.
 2 oranges.
 1 lemon.
 1/2 cup orange juice.
 Slice unpeeled fruit, very thin. Add three times as much water as fruit. Boil 20 minutes. Add 3/4 cup of sugar for each cup of fruit. Boil 30 minutes or until it gives the jelly test. Just before removing from heat add 1/2 cup lemon juice. Pour into sterilized glasses; cover with paraffin when cool.

Baked Whole Oranges
 Remove halve ends of whole oranges. Boil them 30 minutes. Cook cut slices of butter on each of each orange and remove core. Into each orange put 1 teaspoon butter and 1 teaspoon sugar. Bake in a closely covered baking dish, filled 2/3 full of water, about 1 1/2 hours in moderate oven. To make sauce add 1/4 cup of cornstarch and 1/4 cup of remaining liquid. Heat and stir until thickened. Serve hot or cold with baked ham, lamb, pork or roast beef.

Harlequin Dessert Salad
 Halve large seedless oranges and remove pulp and dice. Mix with equal quantity of diced pineapple, quartered, marinated, sliced almonds and banana. Mix with salad dressing to which you have added 1/4 cup of maraschino cherries, cut in quarters, and 1 cup of whipped cream. Fill orange skins and garnish with whole nutmeg. Serve on lettuce.

Orange Salad
 Allow one orange for each serving. Peel and segment fruit. Arrange segments on lettuce. Garnish with sliced orange slices, or pineapple slices. Serve with French dressing to which a dash of catsup has been added.

Orange Layer Cake
 4 tablespoons shortening.
 1/2 cup sugar.
 2 eggs.
 2 teaspoons baking powder.
 1 1/2 cups flour.
 1/2 cup orange juice.
 Cream fat and sugar. Add beaten eggs together. Add alternately with orange juice. Fold in sifted beaten egg whites. Bake in two layers in 8x8 inch pan for 35 to 40 minutes. Sprinkle with orange filling and frost with orange frosting. Top garnish with segments of orange.
