**BLACK WIDOW SPIDER FOUND AT FORT GAY, SAYS LOUISA PAPER**

S. B. Noe, constable of Butler district, killed three black widow spiders at his home near Fort Gay recently. The black widow is the most poisonous of all spiders and all know that it was found in Wayne county. This is the first indication of its presence here. Mr. Noe's identification of the spiders is not to be doubted, however, because he formerly lived in Texas where the black widow exists in abundance and is therefore able to identify the species on sight. These spiders have a red spot on the underside of the abdomen that could scarcely serve as a means of hasty identification, because if there is anything you must not do is to pick up one of these spiders and turn it over to inspect its coloring. The best identification is the jet black color, the big globular abdomen, which suggests a big black shoe button, and the length of its legs, the front leg being the longest, the third leg the shortest of the four legs. On her back and around her abdomen she has a variable number of small red dots. She is large, with body half an inch long. —Big Sandy News.
