It is reported that McGoy had been released from the Wayland jail on an intoxication charge, after which he drove his truck to Garrett and parked it in front of the hotel at around 11 p. m. Wednesday night. He had been rooming at the hotel.

Cause of the fire is not known. It could have been started from the heater, still burning when the fire was extinguished from a lighted cigarette, or from a match used to light a cigarette.

The flames had burned the structure on the west side of the barn, and then had come in contact, thereby causing the fire to blow continuously and spread to the other side of the barn.

The fire was completely dead due to application of hoses cranked in the cab by fire help could reach him.

McGoy was started to The Times Monday that when the door was forced open the blaze then engulfed the cab, but was extinguished by water before the rest of the truck was destroyed.

Surviving McGoy are his wife and one child, and his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Melvin McGoy. The body was prepared for burial by G. D. Ryan.
