GAS DRILLINGS ON INCREASE

FIVE OPERATIONS UNDER WAY IN THIC COUNTY

With two completions reported in Knott county and five operations under way in this county, gas well drillings are definitely on the increase in this section.

The Inland Gas Corporation has completed well No. 206 on the Zada Hutchinson land on the right fork of Troublesome Creek in Knott county at a total depth of 2922 feet in white slate. The well was shot Saturday and production data is not yet available.

The Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company reports the completion of well No. 250 on the Charles Coble land at a total depth of 2648 feet in shale and a daily gas production of 123,000 feet.

In Floyd county the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company is down 2655 feet in well No. 585; A. C. Webb, on Sanson Part of Frazier Creek, with drilling continuing in shale.

The same company has reached the 2500 foot mark in shale in well No. 586, Levi Mitchell, on Mitchell Branch of Mud Creek, and is drilling at the 1380 foot level in sand in well No. 587, J. C. Campbell, in same locality.

The Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company is down 516 feet in slate in well No. 582, Jock Wicker, and is moving to location of well No. 583, Mary and J. B. Adams, in the same area.

The same company has reached the 1340 foot mark in salt sand in well No. 5282 W. R. Hall, on Johns Fork of Left Beaver, and is rigging up at well No. 5283, J. P. Stuppill, nearby.

The Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company is laying water line to well No. 5288, John P. Burchett, on Cow Creek, and is rigging up at well No. 5289 (Jeff Jarvis) John C. Cider, on Home Branch.

In Knott county the Inland Gas Corporation is rigging up at well No. 213, W. R. Smith, et al, on the Right Fork of Troublesome Creek.

SURGEON GENERAL WARNS THAT PLAGUES MAY SWEEP INDUSTRIAL AREAS OF U. S.

A warning that plagues may sweep the densely populated industrial areas of the United States unless precautionary measures are taken was issued by Thomas Parran, director of the United States Public Health Service, at the annual conference of state and territorial health officers.

"Let us be lulled into complacency by accomplishments, let me sound a note of warning in respect to possible outbreaks of plague, typhus fever, yellow fever and smallpox."

Typhus fever and plague have been spreading eastward from the Pacific Coast among rats, ground squirrels and other rodents. Dr. Parran said, and the bites of the fleas which infest

them may transmit the disease to human beings.

The dread maladies have been found in most of the Pacific and Rocky Mountain states and in some Plains states and Southern states.

"The incidence of human typhus fever seems to be increasing within these states and the disease is extending to surrounding territory," Dr. Parran added.

Typhus fever and plague were the scourge of the middle ages and occurred in epidemics in the United States as late as 1900.

For many years this country "has escaped the ravages of yellow fever because of strict quarantine measures."

the Surgeon General said, but since the disease is still prevalent in South America and because of rapid airplane transportation between the North and South American republics a real danger exists.

The mosquitoes which transmit the disease are common in the United States and, in addition, persons who contract yellow fever may reach the interior of the United States by airplane before the infection becomes apparent.

The Public Health Service early this year reported several minor outbreaks of smallpox. Dr. Parran said, and "it is necessary again to call attention to the high proportion of people who failed to be vaccinated against the disease."

had dragged them on a "lizard," a V-shaped slide that held up one end of the log was a thing of note in any neighborhood. More attractive still was the skill of the rafterman, who had piloted his collection of valuable logs down some treacherous creek or river in midwinter and had lived thru it all, little the worse for wear. Then it was great sport to visit the mill and see the huge logs dismembered, to see the great pile of sawdust, to smell the newly sawed wood. Local youths tried to be able to run the saw carriage, to try their skill at sawing planks of a certain thickness. In fact, the man who could do this work was almost as much envied as the man who cut bundles at wheat-threshing time.

All the earlier mills were run by water power. Usually there would be, at the really established mills rather than at those in the woods, other things like a grist mill or even a cotton gin. So when we went with a log wagon, drawn by oxen, to the old mill, we were likely to see most of the machinery of a whole neighborhood.

TIDBITS OF KENTUCKY FOLKLORE

IN THE DAYS OF THE SAWMILL

Kentucky was once a great lumber state; wanton destruction of our forests has about brought to an end any likelihood of our seeing any return of earlier conditions, but the preservation of our timber in state and national reserves and parks will insure to our descendants a supply of timber that will partially serve their needs. Since I lived in the Jackson Purchase,

the "last west" of Kentucky, I knew as a boy much of the tradition of the lumbering industry. Here and there in the state the same conditions still exist in a small way. The sawmill literally cut a swath across our time. In almost every community there formerly existed one or more mills, located, usually, in the actual woods to be ruined. To them were hauled the most promising logs; the others were brought together in heaps at log-rollings and reduced to ashes. Coarse, rough lumber was sawed out, to be used in building houses, barns and fences. Yellow poplar, our most distinctive timber, suffered soonest, as lumber of this type was easily worked and relatively light. The various oaks suffered next, with the numerous kinds trailing. The mill was a great rendezvous for the neighborhood, as it was one of the few mechanical things we knew. Huge piles of sawdust and cutting stavings often were the only remnants of gigantic forests.

Greatly aided with the sawmill industry was that of crate-making. This was known as "tie-making," and the men who made the ties were called "tie-makers." Usually the tie-makers were a young lot, who moved on as they demolished the timber resources. Many of the sawmill people likewise followed the opening up of new fields. Great as were their gains with a skill that seems unbelievable. The broad-ax, so useful in building the houses and barns before the sawmill came, became the symbol of a more destructive use of timber. Crates were hauled to the nearest railroad or to the rivers, where special boats came for them. Within a few weeks of the time when I am writing I saw a boat being up one of our central Kentucky rivers for a cargo of ties, in an area still not completely ravaged by lumbering.

But aside from the wastefulness of the mill there were things that all of us remember with pleasure. The very skill of the men who had learned to log through the muddy bottoms or
