'WILDCAT' WELL MAKES NEWS

IN QUIET WEEK ON OIL, GAS FRONT

Although no gas well completions were reported in this county last week, the drilling in a "wildcat" well in Johnson county, possibly heralding a new gas field, held the spotlight. Attention has been sharply directed to Johnson county with the completion of a well by S. C. Allen on the Albert Horn land at a total depth of 2319 feet. Before tubing was run and the well closed in, it was making better than 300,000 feet of gas at the bottom of conferters. There has been a general leasing campaign in Johnson county for the last few weeks but the drilling in of this "wildcat" well has brought a decided spurt in leasing activities. Most of the leases in the immediate vicinity of the well four miles west of Paintsville, have been taken up, and the present leasing is directed at tracts further away. There has been no commercial production of gas in this immediate vicinity before and bringing in this well is certain to be followed by drilling of others, according to authoritative sources here. The case of developing a new gas field in this area is stressed by the fact that the Allen well is within a mile and a half of one major firm's pipe line and within two and a half miles of a second large pipe line.

In Floyd county the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company is down 1235 feet in sand in well No. 691, Crit Mitchell, on Mud Creek, and is drilling at the 1800 foot level in big lime in well No. 5280, Samuel Justice, on Justice Branch of Left Beaver Creek. The same company is setting machinery at well No. 603, W. J. Hunter, on Cow Creek, and also setting machinery at well No. 604, James Howell, on Prater Creek. The Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company has reached the 1985 foot level in well No. 5281, Joel Stumbo, on Brannan's Creek, and is drilling at the 980 mark in sand in well No. 5285, A. J. Sturgill, on Toler Creek. The same concern is idle at well No. 6276, Anderson C. Stratton, on Mare Creek.

The Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company has completed well No. 5282, on the Benjamin Smith land on Four-Mile Branch of Jones Fork in Knott county with the well reaching a total depth of 2665 feet in shale. It is producing 100,000 feet of gas, 13 hp. with foot pressure of 280 pounds. Hybrid corn yields in McCracken county ranged from 66 to 75 bushels to the acre.

Grass and hay production will occupy a major place in the farm program in Christian county this coming year.

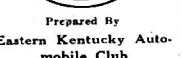
Farmers Are Urged To Increase Speed On ACP Practices

Farmers should make all possible headway on their 1941 Agricultural Conservation Program this winter, and plan ahead for speedy carrying out of soil-building practices in the spring, points out O. M. Farrington, state director of the program in Kentucky. The reason is, he said, that the 1941 program year will end June 30, 1941, two months earlier than the 1940 closing date.

With the later closing date, farmers sometimes have deferred completion of their conservation programs until after harvest. They have carried credit in the late summer and fall by applying lime and phosphate, and by seeding legumes and winter cover crops. Late legumes and grass seeding practices will not be possible this year until after harvest. They have carried credit in the late summer and fall by applying lime and phosphate, and by seeding legumes and winter cover crops.

Farrington suggested that farmers can top-dress meadows and pastures with lime and phosphate this winter, and get these materials on their farms, ready for application on spring seeding. The materials should be ordered now or as soon as possible, he said, in order that delays due to seasonal rush may be avoided.

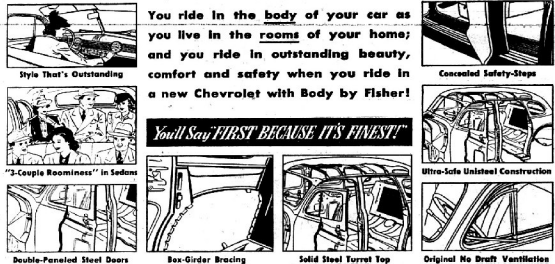
