BUDGET SLASH MAY DELAY DAM WORK

MAY SAYS PROJECT IS CERTAINTY, HOWEVER

Quered by THE TIMES as to prospects of immediate work on the Johns Creek dam, Congressman A. J. May in Washington said that this depends upon final action of the Army chief of engineers who will be obliged to work with funds less than half asked of Congress, a few days ago.

Major General Schley, chief of engineers, advised Congress that \$368,808,925 could be profitably spent on rivers and harbors and flood control projects, but only \$184,410,000 has been budgeted for such work. Of the \$19 projects recommended, Johns Creek's dam was one. Major General Schley asking \$2,000,000 for the beginning of work there.

There may be no more than \$20,000,000 available for new projects, and whether Johns Creek can be kept out of the "new" classification is not yet known.

The budget slash for such improvements is a result of President Roosevelt's policy of cutting down on all expenditures except those of a strictly defensive nature.

"As any man," Congressman May concluded, "if the people will just be patient, this work will come along after a while."

Mrs. Ford had resided here since her marriage in 1931 and was held in high esteem by all who knew her. She had been a member of the Methodist Church since childhood, and was an active church and civic worker.

She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Felix Compton and was a native of Pikeville. In addition to her husband, she leaves one son, Winston, Jr., four brothers, Tyler, Felix and William David Compton, all of Pikeville, and John Paul Compton, of the U. S. army.

The body was returned to Prestonsburg and funeral rites were conducted there at the Methodist Church here Friday morning, the pastor, the Rev. W. B. Garriott, assisted by the Rev. Campbell Jeffries, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, officiating.

The funeral here was under the direction of the Arnold Funeral Home. The body was then taken to Pikeville where the rites were held at the Methodist Church Friday afternoon, burial following in the family cemetery.

Prestonsburg's Blackcats achieved something Saturday night at McDowell they hadn't been able to do, all season; defeated Garrett's Black Devils—and so won the basketball championship of Floyd county in the 58th district tournament.

Prestonsburg as champion and Garrett as runner-up in the district meet will represent Floyd county in the regional tourney starting here tonight (Thursday).

Both the winner and runner-up were expected en route to the finals—Prestonsburg, by McDowell Saturday afternoon; Garrett, by Auxier, at the same station. Garrett was hurled to defeat on all reserves on the preceding night to defeat Wayland, 30-22.

The tournament, which drew hundreds of fans from all parts of the county, began Thursday night with the Maytown-Betsy Layne encounter, with the Bobcats taking an easy 47-22 victory. The Turner-Elkton Independents of Drift downed the Mayo College team, 33-23, in an "added attraction" tilt.

Friday afternoon, Prestonsburg easily got by Martin, 32-17, and McDowell was having an easy time of it with Wheelwright, 46-26. TEACHING VET TAKES LESSONS IN DRIVING, THEN SELLS 3 CARS IN WEEK

"You don't have to be an author to sell books," argues B. C. Barnett, of Martin—and proves it by selling automobiles.

Until a month ago when he became a salesman for Howard Brothers, Ford dealers here, he had never owned an automobile or driven one as a car salesman. In two days, he sold three cars in a week—and this was well on his way to proving that you can sell drugs without being a pharmacist.

Mr. Barnett, after completing his 25th year as a teacher, last month came from his Buck's Branch home, near Martin, to the automobile agency here and applied for a job. "My school was in need of a teacher," he told News-Herald, "and I was a member of the firm."

But when he admitted that he had never owned an auto, never driven one, and his teaching employer was skeptical of his future as a salesman of that particular kind of product.

First of all, they didn't think he would be a good risk out on the highway in an automobile.

"You don't have to have a solution to that one of your cars. I'll buy one myself," said Barnett, as a teacher, he knew about cars, as a teacher, he knew next to nothing—he went out and sold cars to folks who, like him, had never owned an automobile.

LEFT BEAVER CONTRACT ASSURED

CUTLER SAYS ROAD TO BE FINISHED THIS YEAR

Surfacing of the entire Left Beaver highway will be done this year, County Attorney Forrest D. Short was assured a few days ago by Donald H. Cutler, chief engineer of the State Highway Commission.

Contract on surfacing from the junction of the highway with Route 80, near Martin, to a point near Hunter, a distance of approximately six miles, was awarded last summer to the Gorman Construction Company and part of the work was done after a belated start. This work is expected to be resumed this spring.

Mr. Cutler told County Attorney Short that plans had already been approved and funds appropriated for completion of the highway. He added that bids will be asked on completion of the route for the awarding of a contract at the April meeting of the Highway Commission.

Other Floyd county road work embraced in the state's 1941 program are grade-and-drain of the Melvin-Websbury road and the Right Fork of Middle Creek highway in conjunction with the Works Progress Administration.

It is held certain that the Middle Creek road, a part of the Prestonsburg-Salversville route, will be completed this year. But prospects for completion of the Magoffin end of the highway are not so bright. Already far behind this county on its part of the route, Magoffin was recently reported as claiming right-of-way troubles were delaying progress.

100 FAMILIES BEING EVICTED

DEPUTIES EXECUTE WRITS EXPELLING MINE FAMILIES

Steps were being taken this week by receivers of the Elk Horn Coal Corporation to evict, if necessary, 100 former coal miners and their families from the company's property at Wayland.

Writs of forcible entry and detainer were being executed by sheriff's deputies during the week.

In most cases the officers said, the former employes of the company indicated they would move further. Their litigation, a few told the deputies they would move when dispossessed.

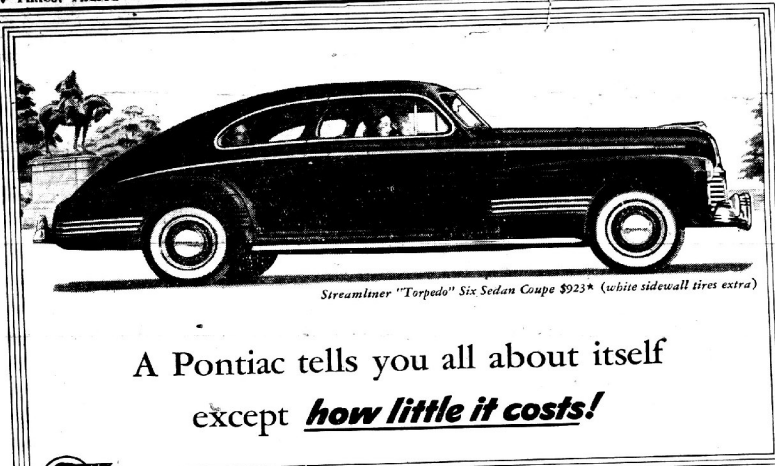

TAXING THE IMAGINATION Ever try looking at a certain scene and imagining what it looked like, a quarter or half a century ago? If not, try it some time. It's a task, but interesting.

Yeah, I saw wide, open spaces where now are thickly-populated streets, mudholes where now is paved but smooth pavement (except on Third street). But I couldn't see that rivelet running down Court street, past the courthouse, the "mud mill" over there on the post-office lot—or that measly \$125 Square Vaughan was paid for a hard day's work.

IN MEMORIAM A few weeks ago, Sarah Virginia Ford handed us what, I am convinced, was her own personal creed. At the time, she didn't care to have her name published in connection with her contribution. Now that she is gone, it remains a memorial to her, and so we re-print it as our tribute to a gentle spirit such as this world can ill afford to spare:

No power I have, prestige, or political "pull." No "swank" jobs, "fine cars," "big bank rolls." Not a "pillar" of the church. I am slighted socially. Ignored publicly. No "swank." No degree. Nothing much to offer friends—That is, in the way of worldly goods.

"Common folks" don't have much "worldly goods." But to you, my friends, In sickness I minister unto you. In sorrow I grieve at your side. In health I rejoice with you. I smile with you, laugh with you.

Dry your tears—and mine. Have long talks about this and that.

The goodness of God and the glory of His handiwork. Take long walks, find the first flower

And the last withered bloom, Share our "Sunday best" or bowl of soup; See life through eyes of understanding, and love and trust and friendship undimmed by selfishness and hate. I'm glad I'm just "Common Folk" and have a heart to give to you.

Dr. Ransdell selected the senior classes in the high schools for the competition because high school seniors are of the age at which incidence of tuberculosis is greatest and since they are leaving their home schools for college or employment elsewhere. "I feel assured that more high school seniors now have, as a result of this contest, a fuller knowledge of tuberculosis than ever before in the county," Dr. Ransdell said upon conclusion of the contest. "This essay contest has been so successful that we plan the same competition in the schools for all past the next year or two." Dr. Ransdell is sending Miss Bailey's essay to the State Board of Health for publication in the monthly public health bulletin. The essay will be published next week in the Times, and the other winning essays will appear in later issues of this newspaper.
