DWALE PLANT TO COST \$500,000

BIG SANDY REA RECEIVES 3RD ALLOCATION

HALF OF \$100,000 MAY BE SPENT IN FLOYD

Funds making possible the construction of an additional 10 miles of Rural Electrification Administration line in this section was made available last week to the Big Sandy Electric Co-operative Corporation, Prestonsburg, as the REA announced the allotment of \$100,000 to the co-operative.

Most of the allotment will be spent on lines in Floyd county, it was said here.

Last week's appropriation brings the total of allotments to the Co-Op to \$360,000. The first allotment, under which work has been done in this and adjoining counties to date, was for \$150,000. This was followed by a second of \$100,000 for electric fixtures.

At least half of the last allotment will be allocated to the construction of lines in the Right Beaver section of the county and on the Left fork of Middle Creek.

The \$150,000 allotment is being spent in the construction of lines on Abbott and Middle Creek in this county, and in Johnson county. The lines into Bull Creek, Ohio and Arkansas Creeks and the Auxler section are to be financed by this first allotment.

At this time 75 miles of line are under construction with an additional 20 miles planned. The \$100,000 appropriation is ready for staking, it was said.

Some delay has been experienced in the work as a result of heavy defense orders for materials used by the REA, yet the work has made better progress than expected, it was said at the Co-Op's office here.

W'WRIGHT LAB RATED BEST

FOLLOWING SURVEY CONDUCTED BY STATE BOARD

Following a recent survey of hospital laboratory facilities for the performance of pre-natal and pre-natal blood tests, Dr. John R. Pate, of the State Board of Health, said that the laboratory of the Inland Steel Company hospital at Wheelwright achieved the highest rating in Kentucky.

The laboratory is prepared to perform all tests related to the diagnosis of syphilis, either by the darkfield method or serological blood test. Pre-natal blood tests are available.

\$10,000 Is Sought In Suit Filed By Craft

Alleging that Arthur Thomas Craft was permanently injured by burns through carelessness and negligence of his employer, Marvin Music, and of Marion Leak, Howard Brown and Ernie Baldrige, Clarke & Francis, Craft's attorneys, filed suit last week against the four, asking \$10,000 damages and an undetermined amount for hospital fees.

The petition, filed through Craft's mother, Mrs. Florence Craft, alleges that Ernie Baldrige, an employee of Music, carelessly placed an open can of gasoline near an open fire and that Leak and Brown, employees of C. H. Smith, Gulf products distributor, carelessly kicked the can, as a result of which the plaintiff was burned.

BODY FOUND BESIDE RAILS

ORA DAVIDSON, 37, HELD VICTIM OF TRAIN

Body of Ora Davidson, 37 years old, Drift miner, was found beside the railroad tracks at Drift Saturday night. He is believed to have been a train victim.

It was reported here that two small boys told of seeing a man lurch against a passing train, but they could not describe him.

Davidson is believed to have resulted from a brain concussion. The skull, though lacerated, was not fractured. Other injuries consisted of bruises about the face and arms.

A native of Perry county, Mr. Davidson had been employed for several years by the Beaver Coal & Mining Company at Drift where he had many friends. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Ella Spencer Davidson, six children: Claude, Clyde, Mary Lou, Jack, Franklin D. and Orris Glenn, and four brothers, all of Drift.

The body was prepared for burial by the Ryan Funeral Home and taken to Chaves, Perry county, where the funeral was held Tuesday. Burial was made in the family cemetery.

WOMAN EDUCATOR, TEACHER AT 16, IS VICTIM

Mrs. Jennie Wells Elliott, 75 years old, who taught school in Floyd, Bath, Rowan, Montgomery, Fayette and Pike counties during 50 years of service, died Sunday after a long illness.

Born in Montgomery county, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Wells, she began teaching when she was 16 years old. She was married in 1922 after 28 years there.

She had long been active in social and charitable work and belonged to numerous organizations, including the Order of Eastern Star.

She is survived by her husband, Robert C. Elliott, Pikeville; three sons, Edward, Clark and George; George, Winston-Salem, N. C., and Lieutenant Ewing Elliott, Fort Knox; four daughters, Mrs. Ann Mary Bohon, Harrodsburg; Mrs. Belle Moore, Dorton; Mrs. Elizabeth Mary, Betsy Layne, and Mrs. Manny Harp, Pikeville; two brothers, Lieutenant, Greenwood Wells, Memphis, Tenn., and Dr. Edmund W. Wells, Newark, O., and a sister, Mrs. George Conington, Taylorsville.

Finley, Only Man To Hang In County, Was Offered Freedom On Bond Of \$600, Old Records Show

Only 8000 stood between Gus Finley, the only man ever legally executed in this county, and at least temporary freedom, old records uncovered by WPA indexing workers in the Circuit Clerk's office here show.

To Finley's credit remains the fact that he did not plead self-defense in the slaying of young Jim Hunt. When the case came up for trial here before Circuit Judge John M. Rice, Finley's only defense was that he was drunk and not responsible for his acts at the time Hunt was shot.

Mrs. Nancy Warrens, Long Ill, Dies Near Garrett

Mrs. Nancy Moore Warrens, one of the county's best women, died Friday at 7 p. m., at the home of her daughter, John Wes Gattine, of Rock Fork Creek, at the age of 82 years. She had been in ill health for the last 10 years, and a stroke is believed to have been the direct cause of death.

Mrs. Warrens resided on Turkey Creek for the greater part of her life. She had been a member of the Regular Baptist Church for a quarter of a century and was one of this section's best women.

X-RAY CLINIC TESTS MADE

15 PCT. OF SENIORS ARE REACTORS TO SKIN TESTS

The Floyd County Health Department this week is completing the work of skin-testing Floyd county high school seniors, preparatory to the tuberculosis x-ray clinic to be held in the department's offices here Tuesday of next week.

The clinic will be conducted by Dr. John B. Floyd, of the tuberculosis department, State Board of Health, and will be under the auspices of the Prestonsburg Woman's Club and the county health department.

Any person who desires an x-ray examination may benefit from services of the clinic. A nominal charge of \$1.25 per x-ray photograph is made.

Dr. Raymond Rensdell, director of the health department, said that approximately 15 percent of the high school seniors given tests are reactors.

Gas Company Plans Program Costing Over \$2,000,000

The Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company will shortly begin construction at Dwale, nine miles south of here, of a compressor station at an outlay of \$500,000.

Peter C. VanGilst, Ashland, vice-president in charge of operations for the company, Wednesday confirmed reports of this and other pending developments in this section.

At the same time, he told THE TIMES that an additional \$100,000 will be spent in increasing the capacities of the company's compressor stations at Drift and above Wayland. Moreover, VanGilst announced, 40 wells in addition to the 90 already planned will be drilled in Floyd, Pike and Knott counties.

Beginning of work on the Dwale station depends, it was said, upon the installation of sidetrack there to accommodate 100 carloads of materials which will go into the huge plant.

The station will be of approximately 5,000 horsepower and will have a capacity five times that of the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company's Maytown plant. When the Warfield Gas Company's station at Boldman was planned in 1931, it was said that its original 4,000 horsepower would give the plant a capacity of 40,000,000 cubic feet daily; hence, it is estimated that the Dwale station will have a capacity ranging between 50,000,000 and 75,000,000 cubic feet.

Mr. VanGilst declined to state the company's plans on a 200-mile pipeline which has been surveyed from this county to northern West Virginia. "We are going ahead with the Dwale station, irrespective of the pipeline," he said. "We want to get it advanced to construct this station in order to give a better gas supply to the cities of Louisville and Pittsburgh."

The new compressor station will be constructed at the northern lower limits of Dwale where the gas company has owned a 19-acre tract since 1926. Construction work will be done by the company itself, with "local" labor doing practically all the work, it was stated.

Cost of drilling the 90 wells originally scheduled in this section during 1941 and of laying connecting pipelines was recently placed at \$1,250,000. With the 40 additional wells planned and the \$600,000 to be spent on the Dwale Drift and Wayland compressor stations, the company's total expenditures in Big Sandy development this year is expected to approach \$2,500,000.

Of the 40 wells on the company's new drilling schedule, 10 are expected to be sunk in Floyd county, bringing the total to be drilled in Floyd to 55 or 60. Remainder of the schedule will be carried out in Pike and Knott counties, it was stated.

A TITLE EXAMINER'S NIGHTMARE

It would seem that a Prewitt, Texas, attorney started the new year, 1928, off in embittered mood. It was on Jan. 4 that year, that he indited the following masterpiece after worrying himself apple-addle over a title to a "certain tract or parcel of land."

Mr. Alex Deaton, Prewitt, Texas.

In accordance with your order, I have examined abstract of this title in seven parts covering the Texas 2946 acres out of the 24-mission survey in Kentucky, West Virginia, which you are preparing to buy and herewith render my opinion.

Don't buy the C46375141 land. It has been my sorrow and burden to look over several horrible examples of a title-examiner's nightmare, but this alleged title takes the outclass mystifier. It is my private belief that you could cure the defects if you used every body from the Spanish government (who started this mess) on down to the present possessor of the

title Hunt was shot.

And on Sept. 19, 1884, three days after Finley was convicted, Dr. Alex H. Stewart, famed old-time mountain physician, filed an affidavit supporting the slayer's claim.

And I now give it as my opinion that he is a dipomaniac and that he inherited the disease and that when attacked with a desire to drink he is unable to resist it and that when under the influence of intoxicating liquor to any extent he has no control of himself."

The affidavit further described dipomania as becoming more severe as age advances, with shorter intervals between attacks, "until the age of 35 or 40 years, after which it almost invariably terminates in confirmed imbecility or death. A very small amount of the stronger intoxicating drinks may and usually does produce in these persons fits of anger and outbursts of the strongest." "Homicidal intents usually seize their best, over which they have no control. . . ."

In his motion and grounds asking a new trial, the condemned man, these old records ascribed by the index defendant or hang the jury six months. Another, it was claimed, told the jury that Hunt was the third man that Finley had killed.

But the motion and grounds were in vain. Finley went to the scaffold here on April 17, 1885, saying, "I am being made an example of and I'll be the last man ever hung in Floyd county." His prophecy, at least, was true.

Jury Commissioners Not To Be Paid For Overtime
Jury commissioners who serve more than the statutory five-day maximum do so without extra pay. Assistant Attorney General Jesse K. Lewis advised Circuit Judge Henry Stephens, Jr., last week.
Judge Stephens wrote that the commissioners appointed last March spent five days in selecting jurors and then were called back into session last November when the list had become exhausted. He said the State Finance Department had disallowed a claim for their pay in November.
Lewis wrote that when the General Assembly increased the time limit to five days to cover such situations, it made no provision for additional pay beyond that, and added:
"It is a well recognized rule of statutory construction that when extra duties are imposed upon officers, and no compensation therefor is provided, that none can be had."



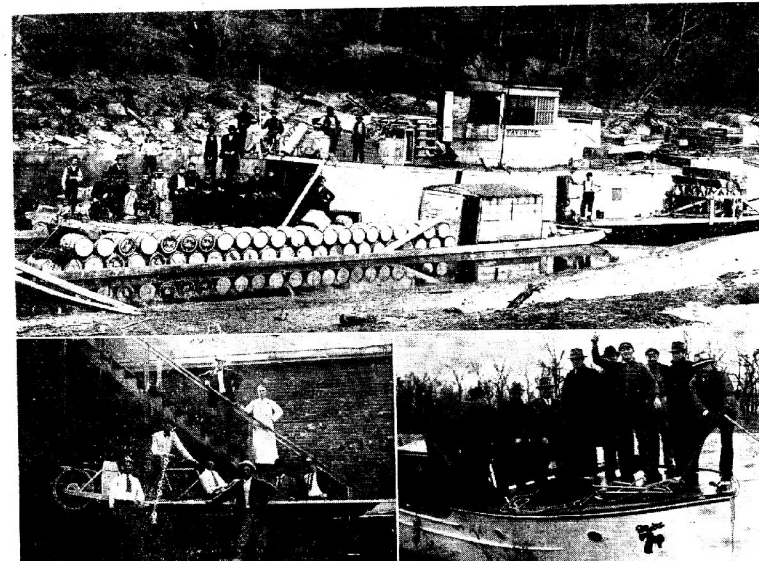

It's The Big Sandy In His Blood--This Love Former Prestonsburg Man Has For Boats



Top, "The Favorite," first of the three boats in a Prestonsburg man's life. From the days, half a century back, when as a boy he rode "The Favorite" his father's steam freighter, up and down the Big Sandy, Joe Branham, former Prestonsburg man, today retains his love of the water and boating.

"The Favorite" and "The Natchez," the two boats owned and operated by his father, the late George Branham, were, of course, his first loves. Then came one of his own inventions, a "bicycle boat," which he built in 1909 after he moved to Tulsa, Okla., where he now is a bottling company executive. Latest craft to claim his fancy is the "Miss 7-Up," a trim motor cruiser.

"The Favorite" and "The Natchez" are names to conjure with among old-timers from Pikeville to Castlettsburg—but for ingenuity, now that "bicycle boat" was sumptuous. While it was a building, some of Oklahoma's most prominent men stood by to watch Mr. Branham work and to wonder how it all would come out. Well, it floated all right; worked on water. Just like a bicycle on land—only it wasn't so easy upset. As long as the old legs held out, you kept on going. "I don't see why boys don't build bicycle boats now," says Mr. Branham. "Bicycle parts can be bought, second-hand, and ball bearings would make propelling the boat much easier. They're a lot of fun."

Incidentally, while building his bicycle craft, Mr. Branham got the idea of entering the soft drink bottling business. And that plan worked, too—so well that it is one of Oklahoma's leading enterprises of its kind. The boat-lover himself is president of the firm.

Mr. Branham's parents moved from Prestonsburg to Castlettsburg during the old steamboat days, then to Tulsa, about 35 years ago. He is a brother of Mrs. D. C. Harmon and Mrs. Flora Sizemore, both of Prestonsburg.

'SPITE WORK' MAY HELP THE LAW

"ALL SPITE WORK," the official branded the charge against the defendant. And so the case escaped the close attention ordinarily to be expected.

And therein the official erred. Perhaps the indictment was made as "spite work"; maybe many the warrant is sworn out by some individual seeking revenge.

But therein lies the strongest ally of the law—"spite work." Without it, few criminal acts would be divulged; the links of every crime ring would be iron-strong.

In Floyd county so many "good" citizens fear criminal elements that they are inclined to suffer in silence. So moonshine nests, thing rings and other forms of outlawry sometimes flourish unharmed, unabated. They flourish in comparative security until rivalry or jealousy or some bitter enmity invades the "set-up." Then—from "spite work"—the authorities learn the full story. Indictments are made, warrants sworn out, arrests made.

All remaining to be done, after that, is for trial of the case—trial, whether the prisoner is at bar as a result of "spite work" or the righteous indignation of an aroused citizenry.

THE SIREN SONG, AGAIN

IF THERE has been any doubts about the role of Charles A. Lindbergh in contemporary American

affairs, the former Colonel in the Air Corps Reserves has now resolved them himself. For he has effectively denounced himself as the nation's foremost defecator.

We must keep hands off this war. Mr. Lindbergh writes in the current issue of Collier's Magazine, because we have waited until it is too late. "We are unprepared . . . We have not as many thoroughly modern fighting planes . . . as Germany produces in a single week." There is "no feasible plan of victory. Our leadership will not carry us successfully through these periods of war and crisis."

That Mr. Lindbergh admires the type of leadership exemplified in Germany has been revealed abundantly in that period in which he made the miraculous transition from an aviator who dared, successfully to fly the Atlantic, to a political scientist. "That we have waited until it is invited late we have learned also; to our regret. We also know that had we ignored the Lindberghs earlier, it would not now be so late.

But the people of America will not accept the coward's dogma that there is no feasible plan for victory." They will refuse to allow a naked defeatism to be dressed up in bogus patriotism and held before them as their only reasonable foreign policy. Having been lulled so long by the old siren song, they will not go back to sleep again until it is, in truth, too late for anything but complete appeasement, then slavery.

If we are unprepared now, how much better prepared shall we be if we permit Britain to go down, then are left to face what has been specifically proclaimed to be a world revolution that demands our dissolution? Does Mr. Lindbergh's workman "the wave of the future," which has engulfed all who have not heroically attempted to push it back?

For one who purports to think in terms of American values, this advocacy of complete nonresistance, of fainting and despair, is strange doctrine. It is the heart of the Nazi's most strenuous intention to hypnotize anti-Fascists into a belief in the invincibility of the Axis. But we shall not repudiate our leadership for that of the Axis in this critical hour. Nor would we hope for peace to be exploited by those who make us pitroons and slaves.—Cincinnati Enquirer

land who is there by virtue of a peculiar instrument, optimistically designated by the abstractor as a general warranty deed.

In the first place, the field notes of the Spanish government do not close. I don't think it is possible to obtain a confirmation, grant since the unpleasantness in 1898. In the second place, there were 19 heirs of the original grantee and only three of them were named in the execution of the conveyance into the next party in this very rusty chain of title, which is a major defect in the first place. We might rely on limitation here, except that I am reliably informed that nobody has succeeded in living on this land for a longer period than two years, before dying of malnutrition. Laches might help out but anybody who undertakes to buy land under a title acquired by laches is, to paraphrase Mark Twain, setting out like the man who set out to carry the cat home by the tail—they are going to acquire experience that will be of great value to them and never grow dim or doubtful.

The land has been sold for taxes eight times in the last forty years. Nobody has ever redeemed one of these tax sales—good to be rid of it, no doubt. The last purchaser

sued the tax collector a month after he bought for cancellation of the sale for fraud and misrepresentation. He doubtless had grounds, but this incident will give you a rough idea of what kind of muzz-loading smoothbores have been frittering this title.

On January 1, 1908, a gentleman who appears suddenly out of nowhere by the name of Eli Gretzberg executes a quit-claim title to one Peter Perkinson. Perkinson, the prolific old billy goat, died, leaving two wives and seventeen children. The legitimacy of two of them being severally contested, I am not being furrner than the circumstances indicate; he actually left two wives and it seems never to have been legally adjudicated who he done wrong by. Each one of these ladies passed away in the fear of God and the hope of a glorious resurrection and left a will devising this land to their respective heirs. A shooting match between the two sets of claimants seems to have assisted the title slightly by reducing to six, the original number and substituting eleven sets of descendants. One of the most prevalent causes of title in this area seems to be the amorous proclivities and utter disregard for consequences prevailing in this neighborhood.

Your prospective vendor derails title by virtue of an instrument concerning which I have previously remarked. It is executed by a fair majority of one set of the offspring of Peter (Prolific) Perkinson and is acknowledged in a manner sufficient to pass a County Clerk with his fee prepaid. Outside of the fact that it doesn't describe the property under search, the habundum clause is into the grantors, the covenant of general warranty doesn't warrant a thing and it is acknowledged before it is dated. I suppose it is all right. I might mention that this land was the subject of a trespass to try title suit between two parties who appear in the abstracts for the first time when the suit was filed and one of them recovered judgment awarding title and possession. We may waive this as a minor defect, comparatively speaking.

I would advise you to keep the abstracts if you can. They are a speaking testimonial to the result of noariety public drawing instruments, county clerks who would put a menu on record if a fee was tendered and jacklegged jugheads posing as lawyers.

You can buy the land if you so desire. There are five hundred and seventy-three people who can give you as good a title as your prospective vendor has, not counting the heirs of the illegitimacy son of Prather Linkin who died in the

penitentiary in 1889 while serving a term for sodomy. Yours very truly, Kress L. Campbell, F. S. You owe me two dollars more for headache powders I used.

FISH AND GAME

The Floyd County Fish and Game Club is an organization of sportsmen and farmers united in an effort to improve, protect and restore fish and game to the fields and streams of Floyd county.

Dues for the club are \$1.00 per year. All of the money taken in is spent for the program of re-stocking and protecting fish and game in Floyd county. This year (1941) about 500 quail will be liberated. Twenty-five raccoons have been liberated, some in every corner of the county. The organization plans to spend about \$125 for the foxhunters of the county. Plans are now being made for the purchase of red-foxes to be turned loose where foxhunters most desire them.

Through the efforts of the Fish and Game Club we now have a full-time Game Warden, paid by the state. Warden B. R. Burke and 18 commission wardens are using every effort possible to keep down fish and game law and fire violations. Report all fire law violations to the warden.

Junior sportsmen clubs have been organized in nine high schools to teach boys when and how to hunt for SPORT, how best to improve farms for game and the value of the sportsman's part in the task. Boys are also taught how to handle firearms safely; how to get the most out of fishing; and the importance and protection of song birds. The club is of the opinion that future success of our fish and game program lies within the education of our boys in fish and game/sportsmen. V. A. Hayes, Langley, Ky., is in charge of the Junior Sportsmen. If you would like to have more information about a Junior Sportsmen club for your community, contact Mr. Hayes.

Here are a few things that the Fish and Game Club has done:

1. This is the first time Floyd county has ever had a full-time state-employed game warden.
2. First time Floyd county has ever had an allotment of quail.
3. First time we have shared equally in fish from state hatchery.
4. First time we have been offered red foxes free.

All of these things have been made possible by an active club working toward but one end—to re-stock and protect our fish and game.

Join the Fish and Game Club and help re-stock, protect and provide for game and fish. Add your dollar to the program.

In order that the public may see what happens to all funds of the Club, an itemized financial statement will be published in THE FLOYD COUNTY TIMES.

The Club wants every citizen to help in protecting our fish and game, by preventing and putting out forest fires. Fire will drive away all quail, coon, rabbits and foxes that are turned loose, and refrain from hunting out of season, and help in the general program of the Fish and Game Club.

1st Blue Ribbon Day In Two Years Held At Wheelwright

(Continued from page one)

A feature of the graduation exercises held at the Wheelwright graded school, March 21, was a Blue Ribbon program, the first presented in Floyd schools during the past two years. Dr. Marvin Ransdell, director of the Floyd County Health Department, assisted by Miss Gertrude Mayer, nurse, and the Inland Steel Company, and Miss Margaret Denham, county health nurse, made physical examinations of the school's 200 students during the past two months. Two hundred and seven corrections were made, including five tonsillitomies and 18 were fitted with glasses. During the program 214 blue ribbons were awarded.

The school, Dr. Ransdell stated, rated a high average in its health program. To receive a blue ribbon a student must be in excellent physical condition, have received vaccination for mumps and diphtheria, have sound teeth and good tonsils. They must also make passing grades. With slight corrections to their teeth or other minor defects many students in this school would be eligible for blue ribbons, Dr. Ransdell said. Every student in the Wheelwright school has been vaccinated against mumps.

Their wheels were built with a 4 foot, 8 inch spread, a measurement that became standard for cars in England during the Roman invasion of the British Isles. Early English tramways were built to accommodate carts of this size, and much later, their railroads were also built with tracks 4 feet, 8 inches apart. Principal early American railroads adopted this gauge, too. Finally, so many roads conformed to it that the measurement became standard!
