Caleb Newsome, ex-convict who terrorized roadhouses in this section of the county before engaging in a running gunfight with officers on Abbott mountain, near here, was arrested Sunday at his home by Wheelwright police and jailed there. He was brought to the county jail here Monday by Coroner Earl Prater.

Newsome faces trial on warrants issued by three of the county's four Magistrates. Offenses alleged to him include reckless use of a deadly weapon and shooting at with intent to kill. A peace warrant was also sworn out against him.

He was arrested officers said, after leaving a rock through the window of a car when its driver failed to stop at his hall.

RURAL POWER WITHIN WEEK

IS SEEN BY CO-OP AS SUB-STATION PARTS ARRIVE

With the arrival Wednesday of a transformer for the sub-station located on the Bramham farm near here, electrification of not less than 150 homes located on the first power line constructed in this section by the Rural Electrification Administration will be effected no later than next week. Lawrence Hubbard, superintendent of the Big Sandy REA co-operative, said Wednesday.

First homes to receive REA current will be those on Abbott Creek, Right Fork of Middle Creek, the Sawyer-Coff section of this county, Bull Creek and the Jenny's Creek section of Johnson county. The number of homes energized will be increased from day to day as meters are installed and other arrangements are made.

Contract for construction of additional mileage in the territory to be served by the "B" allotment has been let and work will be begun not later than Monday, Mr. Hubbard said. Terms of the contract specify that the work must be completed within a period of 100 days. G. I. Collins has been appointed line man and maintenance man for the co-operative.

The Big Sandy co-op's office was moved a few days ago, from the Layne building, near the First National Bank, to more spacious quarters in the old Marks home, First street. The four front rooms of the residence will be used as offices, the two rooms at the rear for storage space.

NEGRO SLAYS WHITE MAN AT W'WRIGHT

POKER GAME DISPUTE ENDS SUNDAY IN GUNFIGHT

A poker game dispute over \$1.70 was said to have resulted in an early Sunday morning gunfight at Wheelwright in which a white man was fatally wounded and Negroes were shot.

Man Hall, a native of the Left Beaver Creek section, died instantly with four revolver bullets in his body. His slayer, Joe Nelson, negro, was shot through his legs and his head and a third bullet grazed his head. A second negro, Robert "Pump" Finley, was shot in his arm while in his legs as he fled the room in which the battle was waged at close range.

Nelson fled to the hills but surrendered to Wheelwright police Tuesday night and was jailed here after midnight Tuesday.

The shooting took place at the slayer's home after an all-night session of poker. According to testimony obtained by Commonwealth Attorney John Allen and Coroner Elbert Prater, who investigated the

OPPOSES SENDING BOYS OVER THERE

I am not an isolationist and I am for all reasonable aid to England, but that is an European-Asiatic-African war on the other side of the ocean and I am against sending our young men overseas to fight and lose their lives for foreigners, and equally I am against sending them down to the malarial swamps and forests of South America to come to the same end. Even Canada, a part of Britain and already at war with Germany, sends none of her soldiers to Europe to fight without their consent.

But the brass hats and military goose-steppers at Washington are all out for it and they are trying to scare our people into believing it is necessary to keep our boys in the army indefinitely and to send them out of the country in order to prevent Germany from invading us. Such a silly idea! They cannot even invade England only 20 miles away! I am for England because I think she is right in this war, not because I have the least fear of a German invasion.

And they have now introduced a bill in Congress to keep our boys in the army indefinitely when, under the present law, they were only to be kept for one year. This is the first step to sending them all the way across. They are already sending them into the icebergs of Greenland and will next send them to the bloody battlefields of Africa and Europe and even Asia. Give them a year out of your boy's life and

they take five. Give them Iceland and they will next take Europe and all the rest of the world. And Andrew Jackson May, our Congressman, is all out for this. He believes everything that the Washington military clique tells him. He is all drunk with excitement. He doesn't realize that there never was a military clique in the history of any country or any other country that was satisfied unless they had all the young men in this country goose-stepping for them. Many of them ought to be tied to a bedpost for the good of the country. Mr. May says that the information given him by General Marshall should be kept secret. His hat off. His trouble is that his hat is naturally loose on his head—and most any puff of wind knocks it off when he gets excited.

(3) You are interested in your County Judge being qualified also because he presides over the Juvenile Court which has jurisdiction over delinquent children, and you would not want your boy or girl imprisoned in his or her youth for a minor crime. Your child may falter and fall into bad company and after seeing his error, reform to make a good citizen; when, if imprisoned with other bad company he would likely become a hardened criminal with the stain of imprisonment upon him. I know you want a County Judge who is qualified and who will give your boy or girl careful, unbiased and fair consideration regardless of who he or she is and regardless of who may want them punished.

(4) He should be qualified and know the law in order to properly try cases involving the division of your land and the allotment of dower to your survivors. Many legal questions come up in such cases requiring legal training and qualification.

(5) He should also be qualified in order to apply the law in your civil cases, involving the numerous questions that may come up in the Quarterly and County Courts. If you have a law suit you will want a lawyer to try it right and according to established legal rules. You would not want to lose your case because the other fellow had a better attorney. You want the Judge to apply the law regardless of persuasion or influence.

(6) Your County Judge should be versed in the law and well qualified in order to handle the business of the county. The business of the county involves nearly every conceivable question. Your own business is small as compared with the business of the county, and you find it necessary often to get an attorney to handle your business. Great numbers of persons make efforts to get money from the county on illegal claims, and your County Judge should know how in order to prevent their payment and to assist your Magistrates to do the legal thing.

(7) It is convenient and sometimes saves you large fees to have a County Judge qualified to advise you in regard to your property and affairs. You would not want one who would advise you incorrectly. These are only a few of the reasons you should have a qualified County Judge.

I do not attempt to pass upon the qualifications of either of my opponents. That is for you to decide. As for myself, as I have told you before, I graduated from law school and have a degree from one of the best law schools in the state of Kentucky. I have practiced law ten years and have had your experience as your County Judge.

I do not drink whiskey, wine, beer or gin and do not intend to. You should inquire of my honesty and integrity. During election time, when a man in office is seeking re-election, you may be sure his opponent will bring up his mistakes and errors. What are they able to accuse me of?

I am in favor of regulating roadhouses, as you well know, and will do so with the help of your Sheriff. Certainly I want to improve our roads and build more needed bridges. It would not cost me a cent to do so, and there is no reason why I would not do all I could to improve travel conditions. 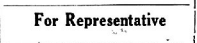

Cadet's Letter Tells of Army Activities

In a letter to his mother, Mrs. Byrd C. May, Cadet David D. May, West Point, N. Y., interestingly describes army activities at Fort Benning, Ga., as seen through the eyes of a young man being trained in military technique at the nation's famed school for future army officers. The letter follows:

West Point, N. Y., June 22, 1941. I arrived here about 7:30 this morning, having left Fort Benning at 9:30 p. m. Friday. We were not off the train en route.

The camp at Benning was very interesting and profitable. We really saw how an army works from the fighting angle through health of the administration of supply and sanitation.

We were out seeing demonstrations and sometimes actually firing from about 7 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. Everything was spectacular. We saw a pontoon bridge built across a 300-foot river in 50 minutes and over this bridge went 52-ton tanks, heavy trucks and a regiment of infantrymen. From all I saw I am now more confident of our powers as a fighting force. In fact, the army at Benning is one to be proud of.

We saw mass parachute jumps from planes and studied phases of administration and technique of the army. I flew in one of the two motor bombers out over Hampton Roads and saw the first view of the Atlantic. Also at Benning I descended from the 200-foot tower by means of a parachute. The jump was quite a thrill. The tower is used for training of the parachute troops.

We also studied the armored force and rode in the "Banana" car which can do things a mountain truck wouldn't think of doing. Also took a ride in one of the tanks. It is now afternoon and quite warm. We had an excellent dinner today—duck, peas, potatoes, milk, tea, coffee and ice cream.

I will be away from West Point four more weeks in all this summer. I will let you know later just when I will be away.

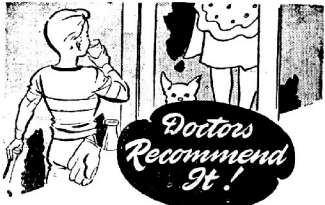
