

A RERECANS have decided by an overwhelming majority to support A all-out war effort. This may mean drafting men into industry as well as into the armed forces, but one thing we all know, all-out war effort will mean sacrifice on the part of everyone. Up to the present time many Americans have made few sacrifices. In fact, many people were more properous in 1941, due to war activities, than they have been for years. The 1941 national income, highest in our history, amounted to 945 billion dollars, which was 22 per cent over 1940.-Wages and salaries paid to American workmen amounted to 612 billion dollars, which was 25 per cent above the 1940 figure The greatest amount of this increase can be traced directly to government/spending. Farm in-come in 1941 was the highest for any year since 1949. Do these figures look like sacrifice? Workers and farmers are still using the war to better their positions. Labor is right now asking for a dollar-a-day increase in many of our key war industries and is pressing our government to decide that industry should grant this increase.
