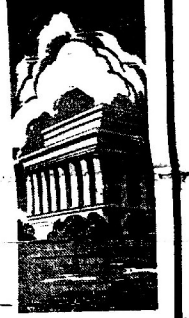

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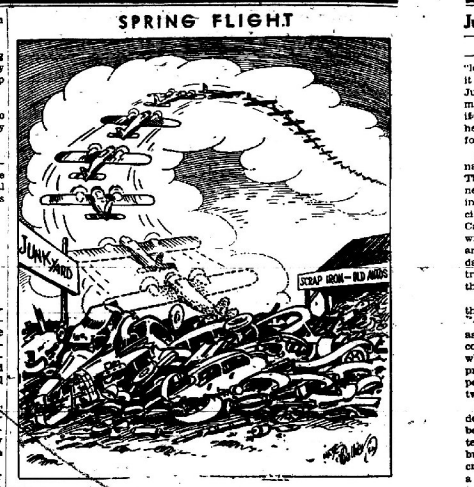

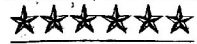

DRINK SENDS PAROLEE BACK

Man Who Escaped Chair 3 Times, Back in Pen

"He couldn't leave whiskey alone, so he's back in the pen," was the description given last week by Bill Hall, well-known Ligon merchant, of the plight of Robert L. Bennett, 37, who three times escaped the electric chair in the Louisville slaying of his grandmother, and who had been given a job by the merchant. Bennett was arrested last month and returned to the LaGrange penal farm as a parole violator. Mr. Hall said he was charged with drunkenness and with threatening officers. "He did fine for three or four months, was a good worker and gave no trouble of any kind," Mr. Hall explained. "The men began drinking and I turned him over to the authorities. I have helped several boys try to get back on their feet, but when they start drinking, I have no use for them." Bennett was sentenced to death three times and each time the sentence was set aside by the Court of Appeals, a record never equaled before or since. Bennett was accused of killing his grandmother in 1934. He was to marry the girl she had just approved. Records disclose he did not marry the girl, but they do not reveal her present whereabouts. At the fourth trial he was given a life term. At each of the four trials he confessed the signed confession exhibited by the Commonwealth had been forged by police "third degree" tactics. Bennett and his attorney were satisfied with the life term and did not appeal, permitting the young man to end his six-year stay in the death cell and move into the state reformatory in 1938. After serving a year longer than the eight years required before life-tenure becomes eligible for parole in Kentucky, Bennett was given a job in this county. He was paroled last Oct. 19 to Mr. Hall, a merchant and farmer, at Ligon, with a provision that he must return to Louisville, the scene of the crime.
