Why Criticize the Gentlemen?

The Courier-Journal criticizes both J. Lyter Donaldson and Judge S. Willis as gubernatorial candidates for their failure to endorse the proposed change in the state Constitution to remove the ceiling on salaries paid public officials of the state.

Why should they endorse the change? Aren't they seeking the highest office in the state at the old salary? Are they willing to admit that a higher salary would induce men of finer type to seek the office? Having their own political hides to save, why should they carry the torch for the Courier-Journal's pet idea?

Besides, the two gentlemen vying for gubernatorial honors are not still of the same mind as in 1925—against any increase in public officials' salaries.

THE TIMES would not attempt to contend that no salary increase whatsoever is needed as a matter of justice to adjust public officials' pay over the economic changes of the years. But it is not willing to advise anybody to vote for an amendment to the Constitution which would literally lift the ceiling from official salaries, throw the ceiling away and let any whim of the State Legislature dictate what the next set of officers would receive.

The Legislature's judgment in money matters dropped to a new low in our estimation when it "passed" its way to a million dollar appropriation for the state highway patrol at its last session.

Aside from helping officials in the plain matter of living costs, what proof have we that higher salaries would help Kentucky? What proof have we that higher salaries would induce men of higher caliber to seek public office? Is not the honor of being Governor of Kentucky or even a subordinate official some sort of recompense? Would any sensible voter want to vote for a man who one year refuses a responsibility because of low pay and the next seeks it for the one reason that the salary has been hiked upward?

Some of the finest service this country has received during the present war has been rendered by men who have left lucrative professions and businesses to work as patriots at a mere fraction of their normal pay. The finest service Kentucky will ever receive will be from men who, financially independent, undertake public service with duty in mind more than pay.

No, Willis and Donaldson do not deserve to be criticized for their failure to endorse this "ceiling-lifter" which would leave the sky the limit for official salaries. In these days when you hear so much argument against higher wages and inflation, the leaders of the two great parties in the state have no business urging unlimited salaries for those who are willing to spend money to get into office.

Stoves: Certificate to purchase most heating and cooking stoves that burn coal, wood, oil or gas must now be obtained from local board. Public Can Help Secure Clean-up of Eating Places

Health officials are making every effort to improve the sanitation of eating places. In this connection, more inspection reports transmitted and public health officers are being urged to inspect eating places. There are two ways in which the public can help: one is to report to the health department any eating place which appears to be unclean or unsanitary. Stevens Elkhorn Mine One of Kentucky Trio Included in Report

Improvements for three Kentucky coal mines produce a total output of 1,400 tons of coal daily.

The Stevens Elkhorn Mine of the Stephens Elkhorn Coal Company, at Darfong, in the Blue Grass No. 3 Mine of the Darfong Coal Company, both of which were visited for the first time recently. The Pacific mine employed 158 men and produced 1,400 tons of coal a day, and the Blue Grass mine employed 76 men and produced 800 tons of coal a day.

Better Air and Timbering For Goose Creek Mine

Better ventilation and safer timbering practices are among the primary suggestions made by federal coal mine inspectors for providing additional protection for workers employed at three Kentucky coal mines producing about 310 men and producing 1,675 tons of coal daily.

The Bureau of Mines last week informed Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes that the Goose Creek Company's mine near Garrettsville, the Harlan Central Coal Company's Toix mine at Toix, Harlan county, and the Miller Coal Company's Hunt mine near Regina, Pike county. Reports prepared after the federal inspectors' several months' tour described existing commendable safety features of each mine.

YOTERS! DON'T BE MISLED!

The Democratic party in this election is quite willing to compare its record with that of the Republican party in Kentucky or in the nation. And it has paid Kentucky out of debt. Have you not heard the Republican party scoff at WPA, at Social Security, at most of the other things the Democratic party has done within the last dozen years to make the common man's lot easier? What did the last Republican Governor do? His name was Flem Sampson. Remember him? And if Judge Willis were elected Governor, what would he do? What would he do next year in the Presidential election, an election when the country will determine if we shall co-operate with other nations to the end that the peace shall be enduring or if it shall follow the road of isolationism and permit dictators again to brandish the sword over humanity's head? He will be doing as a good Republican can be expected to do. He will be fighting the Republican fight. All those Republican candidates, from Lieutenant-Governor on down to Constable, who are running with him will be doing the same thing. Remember that.

The Democratic ticket this year, from Lyter Donaldson on down, "will be going down the line" for Franklin D. Roosevelt, the one man who can lead this country through this war and on to the peace that lies beyond. This is not a promise—it is a fact, proved by these men's past performances. There is a saying, "The Old Guard never dies." And it is as true as gospel. The "Old Guard" is the selfish branch of the Republican party which has dominated it for years out of mind, leading it along the selfish road of isolationism and forgetfulness of everything but Big Business. Congressman Robison of Kentucky—the only Republican from this state in Congress—is of that "Old Guard." Senators Taft and Nye are others. Their total contribution to the war effort—a war in which young Republican and Democratic men are dying as "Buddies," together, without thought of politics—has been to create dissension and weakness by constant criticism of President Roosevelt and an unreasoning opposition to whatever he has proposed.

What of Judge Willis? In a recent speech, during the present campaign, he let the true Willis shine through for a moment. He blamed America's unpreparedness for the present war on the Democratic administration. Does he not know that but for the valiant fight of President Roosevelt and those who saw ahead with him, despite all opposition from the Nyes, Wheelers, Robisons, Ham Fishes and others, the navy of the United States would have been a force and the army of the United States would have been in process of disbandment on the eve of Pearl Harbor. Our Republican friends tell you of the roads that should be built. And they break no news to anybody. These roads should be built. But who built the roads we now have? Not Flem Sampson and his "Flim-Flam" philosophy. Not Herbert Hoover. We all know that these roads were built during Democratic administrations. We all know that, but for the state and county Democratic administrations working hand in hand with a Democratic administration in Washington, not a rural road would have been built in Floyd county, Middle Creek, Abbott Creek, Auker, Cow Creek, Bull Creek, Buffalo, Brandy Rog, Mud Creek, Toler's Creek, Turkey Creek, Brush Creek, Salt Lick Creek, Rock Fork, Clear Creek—set them down and remember them all.

Those roads were built while our Republican friends scoffed. We are all only human. It is natural that we should like to see elected the man or group of men who can and will do most for us and ours. It is good that we are a free people and have the right to discuss these men and vote for the man of our choice. But, exercising these rights, we should ponder long the value of unfulfilled promises as against a record of things achieved. We ask that you do this—think the matter through for yourselves, without prejudice. Consider the future of Kentucky—Floyd county, the nation as a whole. We believe you will agree with us that the best service you can render as a voter is to cast a straight Democratic ballot.

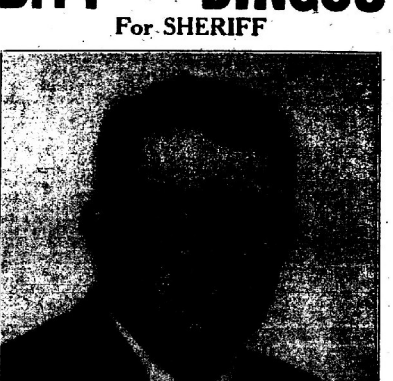

The use of War Ration Book Three will provide a speedy and convenient method of establishing eligibility and identity. The fact that Book Four has been issued to the individual will be noted on Book Three, which then will be returned to the applicant.

The registration procedure is extremely simple and individuals will be able to obtain Book Four with a minimum of inconvenience if they remember the following:

Be sure to bring War Ration Book Three, the last ration book you received when you apply for Book Four.

One individual may obtain Book Four for all members of his family residing at the same address. Each individual's War Ration Book Three must be presented, however.

Don't wait until the last day to apply for the new book. If everyone waits until the end of the period before applying, it will cause delay and overburden distribution facilities.

Book Three, now being used to purchase rationed meats, fats, oils, and dairy products, was distributed to the public by mail last June and July. Individuals who have not received a copy, and who wish to obtain Book Four, should apply immediately for Book Three at their local ration board.
