



Filled with said and sills threa neighboring or upstream hills, these streams have rendered the greater part of hottom-lands in this section either useless or a high gamble if an attempt to till them is made.

Then the federal government should, hesides the construction of dams and the work of canalization on the larger streams, begin dredging these smaller streams to make their channels capable of carrying floodwaters away without damage to contiguous bottomland crops.

crops. Such stream improvement, of course, would be only temporary and almost valueless without reforestation, control of forest fires and other work necessary to prevent further crosion and re-filling of the crede beds with a new supply of sand. For this reason, those communi-ties to benefit by stream improvement should be required, first, to co-operate in steps necessary to prevent washing away of the soil.

No program could more intimately reach into isolated communities and be of greater help to farmers along hun-dreds of the smaller streams. Any atureus of the smaller streams. Any at-tempt to restore to the country a native Wealth of soil and timbertand and their normal production would be only half-hearted and ineffectual without this work being done.
