**ACCEPTING A CHALLENGE**

**To the Voters of the 97th Legislative District:**

I had not intended to take up the voters' time by campaigning during the present emergency, but my opponent, Mr. Mullins, has distributed a handbill which, to keep the record straight, needs some response.

My opponent challenges me to point out any legislation credited to me which is beneficial to the people of this county.

In accepting this challenge I ask the voters to consider two pieces of legislation in particular:

1. The Workmen's Compensation bill, which I sponsored. This bill, Mr. Mullins should but evidently does not know, was for the benefit of the workman, since it reduced the waiting time for the unemployed to be paid unemployment benefits, increased the rate of pay and altogether eliminated any contribution to the Unemployment Compensation Fund by the worker or employer. There are thousands of workers in this county as well as in others, who do appreciate this effort to help the workman, even if Mr. Mullins does not.

2. The Re-Districting Bill by which Floyd county gained a vote in the State Legislature (two votes instead of one). I think most Floyd counties will agree with me that a county the size of Floyd is entitled to two Representatives if some Central Kentucky counties with less than half the population are entitled to one.

**Would Mr. Mullins say these two bills are not beneficial?**

Insofar as roads are concerned, Mr. Mullins seems to be under the impression that a man has only to go down to Frankfort to have roads built. If I had voted for certain bills which I considered harmful to my constituents, I probably could have got some road work done. But that smells too much like selling out.

My record is clean and it is no secret how I voted on any bill. I refer the people as a whole to my record. I refer Labor to the President of District No. 30, United Mine Workers of America, and to those labor representatives, who were at Frankfort during the sessions of the State Legislature. I attended as your Representative, and I believe the vote of an overwhelming majority of the people from all walks of life will endorse me at the polls Nov. 2.

I ask that the voters consider my past record and vote to give Floyd county an honest vote in the State Legislature at all times.

Myers would call a special session of the Legislature to grant the much-needed aid to our underpaid school teachers.

Robinson also wrote that he who always has had an aversion for negroes, has seen in the last 22 months only two white girls and would not have seen them but for an U. S. O. crowd. "Well," he concluded, "I can't call a lot of these big healthy boys around there Draft-Dotters, because they got out of defending their country. I think that's a shame."

"Ain't no use worryin' about them," said Pvt. Lee Prater, of Huesville, Ky., hospitably making room in his two-man machine. "And if one does hit you it's too late to worry."

"That guy's been shootin' off'n on all day but he never hits nobody much. Them critters don't worry nobody; it's the cursed mortar that gets my goat. Last one they threwed up here didn't miss me more'n 30 feet."

"Pvt. Prater pointed to a ragged shallow crater nearby. "We crouched happily in the mud and smoked a pair of soggy cigarettes, well out of the reach of the sniper's bullets which sang past occasionally when somebody along our section of the line stuck his head up. Rifles cracked occasionally along the line."

"The boys been tryin' to pick that cuss off all day, but they ain't got him yet," Pvt. Prater said.
