





Extra Canning Sugar Available in 1944 As in Past Year

Kentucky consumers will be able to obtain extra sugar for home canning at about the same rate as last year and in much the same way. E. Reed Wilson, district director of the Office of Price Administration, announced any time after March 23.

As previously announced, 5 pounds for home canning may be bought with sugar stamp 40 in War Ration Book Four. The remainder—a total of 20 pounds of sugar per person—will be granted on application to local War Price and Rationing Boards on a new and very simple form—O-P-A R-323—and the entire transaction may be handled by mail.

Mr. Wilson explained, A single application may be filed for all persons that live at the same address.

The application must supply the names of persons for whom sugar is requested and the hospital name of the person who is making the application, and the number of pounds of sugar (in units of five pounds) and making fruit spreads.

In order to make it unnecessary to send ration books through the mails, spare stamp #1 from War Ration Book Four is used for purposes of identification. This stamp must be attached to the application form for each person applying for sugar.

April Food Supply In Abundance Seen

Kentucky's bumper crop will move into the coming month to find little or no change in the abundance or variety of foods, either raw or processed, to these may be added fresh spinach, snap beans, cabbage, celery and carrots, expected to move from southern producing areas during April. "Let us forget the hokey but precious onion," he added. "Supplies of new crop onions should be available in most of the principal marketing centers during the last half of the month." Among unrationed foods that will be available in relative abundance in April, is unrationed Tomatoes, green and wax beans, frozen vegetables (including frozen baked beans), soy flour, grits and flakes, wheat flour and bread, macaroni, spaghetti and noodles, oatmeal, dry breakfast foods, peanut butter, rye mix and dehydrated soups and stews.

Raisins and dried prunes have been made point-free to permit reduction of stocks and moderately large supplies should be available during the month. Peas also have been reduced on canned peas (from 8 to 2), canned corn and canned tomatoes (from 10 to 7). Peas of the Best Seven foods should be available in relative plenty during April.

Pikeville Pilot is First Rescued By Louisvillian's Rescue Service

By SAM ADKINS (The Courier-Journal) A U. S. Thunderbolt Fighter Base somewhere in England, March 15—Capt. Ralph Johnson, 24, Pikeville, Ky., is believed to have been the first American fighter pilot fished out of the English Channel by the Air-Sea Rescue Service. The service, incidentally, is headed by another Kentuckian, Lt. Col. J. W. Burgard, of Louisville. Here is "Franchise" Johnson's story of the rescue: "We were supposed to pick up some bombers coming home from a raid. Just inside the French coast, 12 Messerschmitt 109's jumped us, and we did have a busy day. It was an old-fashioned dog fight and we were outnumbered four to one. I, or rather my ship, was hit at least 1,000 times by 30-calibre slugs, and took four or five 20 mm. shells. "But, brother, those Messerschmitts can take it as well as dish it out. My old 'Kentucky Pud' just kept rolling around in I thought she couldn't possibly fly. Once a bullet knocked the stick right out of my hand. How all that lead and steel missed me, I'll never know. Guess it just wasn't my time. "Anyhow, I got away from the Jerries and flew the poor old 'Pud' back home, but I couldn't land her. All my instruments were shot out. My hydraulic fluid was gone. One landing wheel was knocked down, and I couldn't get the other one down, no matter what I tried. "Colonel Zemke (Colonel Hubert Zemke, the group leader) had been out on the mission, too. He had just landed and when he saw what kind of shape I was in, he took off and came upstairs to help me. He guided me around 400 swivel, making suggestions how to get the stuck wheel down. But it wouldn't come. You can't land a Thunderbolt on one wheel; it's too hot. And my gas was running low. So the colonel guided me out over the water and told me to jump. "I jumped and was the most surprised guy you ever saw when that parachute opened—and the happiest. It wasn't more than 20 minutes before the Air-Sea Rescue launch came out and got me, but I was wet and plenty sore."
