D-Day and the long-awaited invasion by U.S. and allied soldiers of Nazi Europe came in the early hours of Tuesday morning, and Floyd County workers and farmers followed the air waves jammed with news of history's greatest military adventure.

Reports of how paratroopers in Occupied Europe first in darkness to slash at enemy communications, how an armada of 4,000 ships and 2,000 other water craft bore the allied fighting men and their supplies across the Channel to the beaches of France, how an air fleet of 11,000 American and British planes blanketed enemy lines.

With other Americans, Floyd Countyans prayed in silence for loved ones, the safe return of loved ones. Later in the day—a day marked by anxious suspense, tense interest in every match of news available—the faith of gathered in churches over the county to offer

prayers. The story was much the same throughout the county. Landings operations, expected to be a costly venture, were made along the Normandy coast with a surprising loss of lives and material. Apparently, tactical surprise was achieved over the Germans by General Dwight Eisenhower.

The operations continued according to schedule and Wednesday Bayeux, five miles inland and in the center of the Normandy invasion, soon had fallen to allied forces. It was the first French town to be liberated by the invasion forces.

Success of the early phases of the invasion should not create over-optimism. Allied military leaders emphasize. The big test lies ahead when the enemy makes his counter attack.

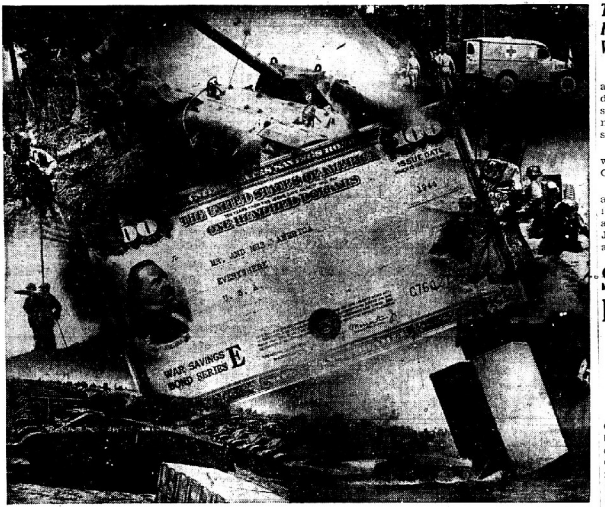

LYON ASSAILS SANITY TRIALS

Says Kentucky Law Outmoded, But Still Shackling Patients

Frankfort, Ky., May 13.—The mentally ill in Kentucky are still figuratively outmoded by statutory provisions Dr. A. M. Lyon, director of hospitals and mental hygiene, charged in a radio speech over WHAS at 1:15 p. m., today, sponsored by the Fayette county unit of the Kentucky Mental Hygiene Association.

The address was part of a general program Dr. Lyon has inaugurated to remove the adjudication of insanity from criminal court procedure and lodge it with physicians and psychiatrists.

"Fines become known as the patron saint of the insane after he had been shackled stricken from the mentally sick in France in 1922," Dr. Lyon said. "By virtue of our outmoded statutory provisions, in Kentucky the shackles, in a measure, still remain."

Dr. Lyon outlined legal procedure for a sanity inquest, showing that it follows the routine of criminality rather than the diagnostic routine of the medical profession.

"The patient is known as the defendant and the court must appoint a lawyer to protect his interests," Dr. Lyon stated. "The Commonwealth's attorney also is charged with the duty of proving the responsibility of preventing a person being found of 'unsound mind and a lunatic' if, in his opinion, such is not the case."

"All persons named in the petition seeking the inquest, including the defendant, by consent shall be notified by a summons to appear at a stated time and place, not less than three days after the service of the petition alleges that the defendant is of violent character and is dangerous, a warrant may be issued for his arrest."

The patient-defendant must be examined by two physicians appointed by the court, but paid only \$3 each by the county.

"The court may require the physicians and other witnesses to be present at the hearing," Dr. Lyon said. "The court also may, in its discretion, require the presence of the defendant at the time of trial. Furthermore, the court, in its discretion, may conduct the trial or inquest in chambers."

"It is well to note two things of interest and importance here: First, the use of the word 'trial' in the statutes definitely places the defendant in more or less of a criminal shadow."

"Second, it is the customary procedure to frisk the possibility of holding the inquest in chambers where the sick person will be free from inquiring eyes and morbid curiosity."

"When one is hospitalized for serious physical illness, it is not uncommon to exclude visitors, nor would one want to intrude upon the privacy of a sick room if, by so doing, he would endanger the life or comfort of the patient."

"Yet the court, who has this idea in mind, often will subject the mentally sick person to what we believe is an undue strain by holding his trial in open court with the court reporters curiously gazing and commenting on the patient's behavior and condition. It is not uncommon for a group of spectators to enjoy the trial and report at length on the happenings," Dr. Lyon said.

The speaker then pointed out that the verdict rests solely in the hands of a jury, as it does at a criminal trial, and that the jury of laymen under oath is required to do a number of things which should require a comprehensive study and history of the defendant.

The 2902 he seeks in Kentucky law, Dr. Lyon said, is to guarantee a mental patient his constitutional rights of due process, yet spare him the ordeal of a courtroom trial.

THE WEEK IN OPA

Processed Food Changes Announced

OPA changes in the point value of processed foods have been made for the June rationing period, the OPA has announced. The new point values are effective June 4 through July 1.

Reduced to zero are canned carrots, orange juice, cranberry-grapefruit juices and grapefruit juice.

Grape juice was increased four points for the pint container, the new value for this size being 10 points. Pineapple juice was advanced three points from 12 to 15 for the No. 2 can.

These are the only changes in the processed foods rationing picture. Point values of canned fruits, special products and sprays and other processed foods are unchanged.

Chesse Ration Points Lowered

The point value of all rationed chesse and chesse products has been reduced to 10 red points per pound from 12 points, effective June 4, the office of Price Administration announced this week.

A larger allocation of rationed chesses for civilian use in June, compared with May, makes the point reduction possible, OPA said.

OPA also announced that all meats except the choicest beef steaks and roasts will continue at zero point value.

Fuel Oil Applications Should Be Returned

Renal applications for fuel oil are being made out this week to all consumers whose status is the same as last year. N. W. Grate, OPA District Fuel Administrator, announced. Consumers are urged to fill out and return these applications promptly to their local boards, so that the boards may process them and mail coupons for the 1944-45 heating season.

Other consumers will receive their rations later if they are new applicants or if circumstances have changed, or if rations are for other than private dwellings.

"If you have a central heating plant and a tank holding 300 gallons or more, you not only may but should fill your tank as soon as you get your coupons," Mr. Grate said.

Since kerosene for space heaters will be curtailed this year, due to large demand by the army and navy, consumers are urged to use their kerosene rations carefully in order to have sufficient fuel to last through the heating season.

New Sugar Stamp Valid June 16

Sugar stamp 33 in War Ration Book Four will become good indefinitely on June 16 for five pounds of sugar, the OPA announced this week.

The valuation continues distribution of sugar to household consumers at the same rate as previously—five pounds per person each two and one-half months.

Tire Conservation Urged

Although the number of new passenger car tires available for rationing in June will be slightly larger than in May, demand still far exceeds production or the available quota, the Office of Price Administration said this week in emphasizing the necessity for continued tire conservation.

Thousands of drivers eligible for the replacements will have to wait until the demand for tires from the most essential drivers has been met, OPA said. For the present, local rationing boards must determine essentially the basis of occupancy.

Heavy duty tire trucks will be rationed in June than in May. A critical situation exists, and early quota exhaustion and some idle trucks are inevitable, OPA said.

Don't Ask for New Ration Book

Accidental removal from a War Ration Book of stamps not yet made good for buying rationed commodities is not grounds for getting a new ration book, the OPA reported this week.

In such instances, OPA said, the holder of the ration book should ask his local rationing board to replace it. This is because many of the stamps may never be needed for rationed commodities, and, therefore, may never be validated.

Penicillin Is Available In Limited Quantities To State Hospitals

Penicillin, the new drug derived from a common mold (penicillium notatum), which hitherto has been used extensively only by the army, is available now for limited use to the civilian population. Dr. P. E. Blumberg, state health commissioner, announced last week.

The Office of Civilian Penicillin Distribution has been established in Chicago and this agency has designated various hospitals in Kentucky to serve as "depot hospitals" not only to obtain enough of the drug to take care of their own needs but to supply other hospitals in their respective vicinities. This the drug will become available to physicians for treatment of various infections resistant to the sulfa drugs or other medicines, with the understanding that patients are to be treated in hospitals. Dr. Blumberg pointed out.

For the state hospitals and penal institutions with hospital facilities the State Department of Health has been made the "depot" for distribution and will requisition the drug for these hospitals upon order of the state medical director.

The following hospitals listed are registered "depot hospitals" for penicillin distribution to other hospitals: Bowling Green—City hospital; Covington—St. Elizabeth's hospital; Frankfort—King's Daughters' hospital; Hazard—Hazard hospital; Lexington—Good Samaritan and St. Joseph's hospitals; Louisville—Kentucky Baptist, Louisville General, St. Anthony's, Sts. Mary and Elizabeth, Norton Infirmary, Owensboro—Owensboro-Daviess County hospital; Paducah—Riverside hospital; Pineville—Pineville Community hospital.

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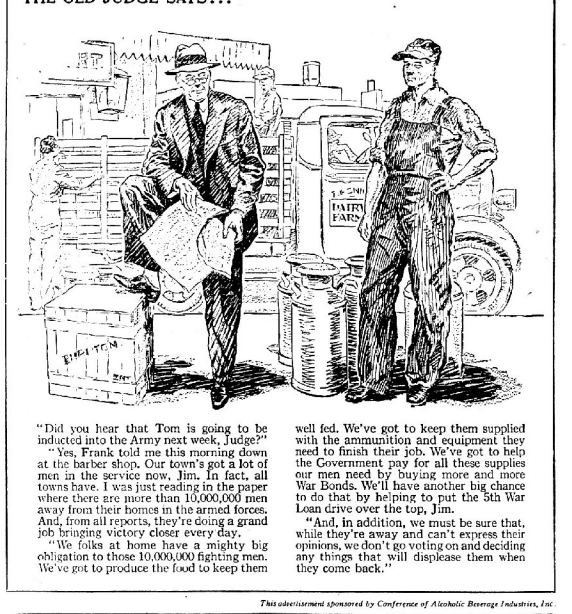

One of the boys was from my home town of Hi-Hat. I was with the boys when that happened, but at that time I didn't know there were any from Floyd county but myself. Maybe some day I can tell their relatives how it happened.

"I think Floyd county is doing a great job for its boys in the service and the war effort. Keep it up, Floyd county!"

Two Floyd county men are receiving naval indoctrination at the Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois. These men will spend a period of leave at home. They are Roy Turner, 34, David, and Alton Kendrick, 37, Prestonsburg.

From an air base in England, Lt. Paul E. Hayes, formerly of Pfc. Hayes, "Your paper fills a vital need in the life of myself and other Floyd countians in the armed forces by bringing periodically and regularly news from the place we all want to get back to—Floyd county!"
