NATION GIVES RECORD FUND

For Fight on Polio; Floyd Ranked 7th This Year in State

Announcing that the American people had contributed an all-time record of \$10,873,491 to the 1944 Fund-Raising Appeal of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Basil O'Connor, Foundation president, declared this week that these donations will permit an expedition of the war against the children's enemy on the home front.

With epidemics or serious outbreaks now taking their toll in 12 of the states of the nation, Mr. O'Connor pointed out that the number of cases reported is already higher than for the comparable period last year when the country suffered its third worst epidemic.

Mr. O'Connor said the National Foundation would now be able to acquire more ambulances and additional equipment for emergency aid and, at the same time, continue its relentless fight to learn how to prevent and cure the disease.

Floyd County's increase in contributions to the infantile paralysis fund this year was commensurate with the record-breaking contribution of the nation as a whole. With \$2,841.96 contributed, the county ranked seventh in Kentucky in the year.

Records for the 1944 March of Dimes, Mr. O'Connor continued, "will permit the National Foundation not only to expand its aid to those who are stricken but also to open up new frontiers of research which some day will pierce the defense of this disease and permit us to prevent it."

"Already 1,400,000 dimes are at work in the state of North Carolina," said a representative of the National Foundation work day and night with state and local authorities to provide emergency aid, professional and equipment to meet the epidemic situation.

Dimes and dollars contributed by Americans also are at work in Kentucky, New York, Louisiana, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Ohio, Michigan, Maryland, Mississippi and Indiana where there are serious outbreaks, he added.

"We have no way of knowing how far the danger will spread, nor how many homes will suffer tragedy before this year's epidemic subsides," said Mr. O'Connor, adding, "but we do know that we have never before been so well equipped to meet the ravages of infantile paralysis as we are this year."

"This year's donations almost doubled the former record of \$5,827,500 set in 1943," Mr. O'Connor said, and the total comprised millions of small donations indicating that "almost every person in this country has had some part in creating the means of carrying on this mighty crusade."

"From army and navy bases half way around the world came donations from the brave fighters in our armed services," said Mr. O'Connor, who he considers "a mandate to us here at home not to neglect the fight against this home-front enemy while they are battling our foes abroad."

Mr. O'Connor praised the cooperation of the fine industry, movie patrons, the sports world, the press, radio, war workers, school children, labor, industry and "Mr. and Mrs. America" every where in the nation of the war who in this vital movement.

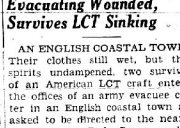

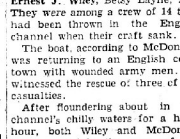

Betsy Layne Sailor, Evacuating Wounded, Surviving LCT Sinking

AN ENGLISH COASTAL TOWN—Their clothes still wet, but their spirits undampened, two survivors of an American LCT craft entered the offices of an army evacuation center in an English coastal town and asked to be directed to the nearest naval post. Red Cross workers greeted them with coffee and doughnuts.

The seamen were Lawrence McDonald, S. C. Oneo, Conn., and Ernest J. Wiley, Betsy Layne, Ky. They were among a crew of 14 that had been thrown in the English channel when their craft sank.

The boat, according to McDonald, was returning to an English coast town with wounded army men. He witnessed the rescue of three of the casualties.

After floundering about in the channel's churning waters for a half-hour, both Wiley and McDonald were rescued by the crew of an LCV. Concerned about their families, they asked Red Cross workers to cable messages to them.

## THE WEEK IN OPA

New Sugar Stamp Valid September 1

Stamp No. 32 to War Ration Book Four will be good for buying five pounds of sugar beginning September 1, 1944. The OPA has announced.

Like other sugar stamps now being used, Stamp No. 33 will be valid indefinitely. Stamps now good for five pounds each are No. 30, 31 and 32.

Sugar Stamp No. 46 is good for five pounds of canning sugar through February 28, 1945.

Local War Price and Rationing Boards have been authorized by the OPA to withhold fuel oil rations from anyone who destroys oak or wood burning equipment, or who sells it or gives it away without good reason. In order to obtain a fuel oil ration.

Heretofore Boards have only been permitted to revoke outstanding rations if such other equipment was destroyed or made unserviceable after the ration was issued.

Because of the shortage of kerosene and other heating oils, the OPA also has halted the issuance of fuel oil rations for hot water, domestic heating or domestic lighting if the householder or other applicant has the use of electric equipment for these purposes. If the electric equipment is not adequate, the ration will be reduced by the maximum amount that can be saved through the use of electric equipment.

Meat Points Changed

Utility grades of beef and lamb have been removed from rationing for the period from August 13 through September 2, the OPA announced this week.

At the same time, ration values for pork loin, ham and canned fish were restored and point values for cheese and butter were increased. Country butter has advanced to 12 points a pound but creamery butter continues at 16 points.

Inventory Point Adjustment

Because many items were placed at zero point value on May 4, 1944, and because point values higher than zero were placed on some items on August 13, 1944, some wholesalers and retailers may not be able to buy such Basic Ration Order 16 foods for their needs with their present point capital. OPA said this week.

To relieve any hardship caused by these point changes OPA has made arrangements for making point adjustments from August 12 through September 15, 1944.

Stamps 30, 31 and 32 in Book Four now good for five pounds each indefinitely. Stamp 33 valid September 1. Stamp 40 in Book Four good for five pounds of canning sugar through February 28, 1945. Also, application may be made to local Board for additional allotment upon presentation of Spare Stamp 37.

Shoes  
Airplane Stamps 1 and 2 in War Ration Book Three each good indefinitely for one pair of shoes.

Gasoline  
Stamps A-12 good for 3 gallons through September 21. B-3, C-2, B-4 stamps good for 5 gallons until used. State and license number must be written on face of each coupon IMMEDIATELY upon receipt of book.

Tires  
Inspections not compulsory unless applying for tires. Motorists must keep old inspection record. Commercial vehicle inspections due every six months or 5,000 miles, whichever is first.

Fuel Oil  
Consumers who have central heating plants have been mailed 1944-45 rations. Have your supplier fill your tank immediately.

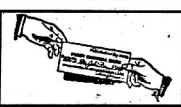

that section. Dr. W. D. Osborne, of Byrro, this county, has treated two or three sufferers.

Twelve or more persons have polyomyelitis without knowing it for every case that is so diagnosed, it was said recently by Dr. Hugh R. Leavell, at Louisville.

"The proportion of cases recognized and diagnosed is relatively small," Dr. Leavell declared.

"Probably a large percentage of you in this room have had it and thought it was a stomach upset, a headache or maybe a hangover."

Polio is caused by a filterable virus—that is, one that will pass through an unglazed porcelain filter—and is communicable through nose and throat discharges and excreta, he said.

Early symptoms he described as stomach-ache, or headache followed by stiffness of the neck and back.

"Typically infantile paralysis victims in the first days cannot sit on the edge of a bed or table without bracing themselves up with their arms," Dr. Leavell said.

Paralysis may start developing after two or three days, he added.

Eighty per cent of the cases this year are children under 10, and 90 per cent have showed some paralysis, although only about 25 per cent will have evidence of permanent paralysis.

Paralysis may be reduced by continuing treatment, he added.

denise. Whittle said the little Baptist Church burned about 20 years ago.

"Since that time," he wrote, "the little flock has held together and conducted services in a schoolhouse, in private homes and perhaps some other places, and from time to time, has conducted revivals in tent meetings upon the lot where the church formerly stood."

He said the Carlos liquor store was built on a corner of the lot purchased from the church and has been in operation 10 or 12 years.

When members started a campaign two years ago to rebuild the church, Carlos contributed \$50 toward the construction, it was said.

The law provides that churches can file written protest against the licensing of beer and whisky establishments within 200 feet of a church, and Whittle said that in this case the protest was made by the pastor and members acting in concert but no action was taken at an official business meeting of the church.

"The Carlos place and the church face different streets and the city jail is between the two buildings. In view of the attitude of friendliness and helpfulness on both sides there is no reason why this situation cannot be resolved in a manner agreeable among those involved," Whittle observed.
