## THURSDAY GROUP VIEWS FLOYD SITES FOR HOSPITAL

### Hippo Farmer Offers Free 15-Acre Tract For Hospital Site

Half a dozen potentially available sites for a tuberculosis hospital were considered this week by a committee named to seek for Floyd county location of one of the five proposed state hospitals.

Representative W. G. Biggers, co-author in the House of the bill providing for the expanded anti-tuberculosis program in the state, said he had received a letter from Bob Kremer, Hippo farmer, saying he would donate 15 acres for a hospital site on the Kentucky State Fair.

The committee seeking a suitable location is composed of County Attorney W. W. Burnett, Dr. Marvin Randall, B. F. Combs and J. D. Harkins.

Each county seeking location of one of the five hospitals has been given till Sept. 10 to the formal application, accompanied by full particulars of available site, with Joshua B. Everett, chairman of the Kentucky Tuberculosis Hospital Commission, New State Office, Frankfort. One hospital in each of five districts is planned.

## RAIL EMPLOYEE HELD SUICIDE

### Frazier Hangs Self In Ashland; Rites Conducted Monday

Funeral rites for Arble Frazier, 28 years old, C. & O. clerk at Martin, whose body was found hanging from a bar in a cell of the Ashland city jail Friday morning, were conducted Monday from the Sandy City Free Will Baptist Church and burial was made in the Williams cemetery.

Body of Frazier was found approximately 12 hours after he had been jailed on an intoxication charge. It was said a noose fastened from blankets suspended him by the neck. On the afternoon preceding his suicide he was stricken ill at the Ashland home of his father, C. W. Frazier, and was taken to the King's Daughters' hospital for treatment. He was later dismissed from the hospital.

Is Floyd County a Sleeping Beauty?

THE "lead" paragraph in a recent Courier-Journal news-story should be pondered by Floyd of all the counties in Kentucky. It read:

"Wide-awake Kentucky communities are on their toes with post-war planning that is working already, the 'Smaller War Plants' Commission, district office here reported yesterday."

In the hope that Floyd county's officials, civic and business leaders will see this story here, THE TIMES re-prints it:

Wide-awake Kentucky communities are on their toes with post-war planning that is working already, the Smaller War Plants Corporation district office here reported yesterday.

In recent months seven Kentucky cities have attracted out-of-state plants with pay rolls aggregating in excess of \$1,000,000 a year, and fifteen other plants are seeking to establish in the state.

The S.W.P.C. said it assisted civic groups at Mt. Sterling, Winchester, Corbin, Glasgow, Paducah, Danville and Greensburg in obtaining factories employing a total of more than 1,000 workers. All of the cities are in Group 4 labor classification, meaning they have a surplus of workers.

John M. Frier, district manager of the S.W.P.C., said his office also aided seven communities in setting up industrial "go-getting" organizations patterned after the Louisville Industrial Foundation and that all these cities are now bidding for plants. They are Lebanon, Greensburg, Central City, Middletown, Mayfield, Murray and Paducah.

C. L. McBride, traveling representative of the S.W.P.C., has been detailed to work with the communities in getting industrial plants, Frier said. All of those now operating are engaged either in war production or essential civilian goods.

Numerous inquiries have been received from plants in Northern and Eastern cities leading the S.W.P.C. to believe Louisville will be "in excellent position" to draw industries after the war, Frier said.

"The high-caliber of labor in Louisville and throughout Kentucky, excellence of transportation and readiness to power through this area wide open to postwar development," Frier said.

Principal functions of the S.W.P.C. have been to get war contracts for small industries throughout the state and to lend financial assistance to the performance of the contracts. Prime contracts totaling millions have been channeled through the S.W.P.C. office here and war contract loans now exceed \$5,000,000.

The No Creek Homemakers' Club in Ohio county bought a \$100 War Bond with which to improve the clubhouse after the war.

Now, while all this has been going on, what have Prestonsburg and other Floyd county communities been doing but live in the fool's paradise of a wartime boom in the coal and gas industries, without which we are deep in the throes of a business depression?

Re-read Paragraph Six of the reprinted news-story. Numerous inquiries are coming in from plants in northern and eastern cities, asking about Kentucky locations. Then ask yourself a question—Is Floyd county on that Kentucky map those plant-owners are studying?

The district manager of the Smaller War Plants Corporation is quoted as pointing to the "high-caliber" labor that is Kentucky's, the state's nearness to power, its excellence of transportation. And he is not excluding Floyd county's labor, its power and its transportation facilities. He is not denying that we have the coal and gas here, that the 'Smaller War Plants' river splitting the county, a railroad which has stood up under the wartime load of millions of tons of coal, an almost complete north-south highway. But is Floyd county itself doing anything toward causing others to know we have all this? Is it making any effort to get that high-caliber labor, that ready supply of electric power, its natural resources and all the rest into use by its own business?

For all that has been done to date, its labor may remain in the fields of Ohio and Michigan and in the plants of distant cities till, no longer needed, its men and women straggle home, some day, another potential army of WPA-sters.

We suggest that the Floyd county reader of this editorial study the list of Kentucky towns already benefiting, or seeking to benefit, from the industrial program. Only a very few have spread beyond the "small town" class. But all are growing, all are alive and letting other states and towns know they are alive.

Take Greensburg, for instance. It is one of the towns which, not satisfied with leaving things to chance and reap the windfall or suffer the famine, has gone out and brought in one of those industries. In 1930 that town had a population of 770. The same year, Prestonsburg's population was 2,105. We confess our ignorance, we do not know the exact location of Greensburg (our desk encyclopedia which lists most Kentucky villages and towns does not mention it). But we are not ignorant enough to think that Greensburg is not known to others. It was only one-third Prestonsburg's population in 1930, but if the two towns go along as they are now going, the figures will not be so favorable to Prestonsburg when next census-taking time comes six years hence.

Yes, we have a great county, a great people. Our resources are richer than those of many sections, our possibilities are limitless. But why talk about it? Carthage was great, centuries ago.

Why gaze raptly in the mirror and murmur to ourselves, "How beautiful we are!" if we have not the energy nor the desire to step outside and let the world see for itself?

We ask you!

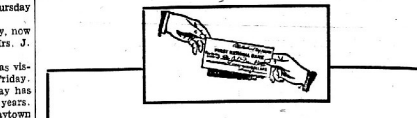

parents, Robert M. and Sarah J. Haywood, on Spurlock, till he was about 10 years old and there he first learned the book-learning which carried him to the high school in the councils of state.

His father, a teacher, moved to Greenup county, Will Haywood recalls, and young Green Hackworth joined his father there. One visit he has paid to Floyd county relatives since that day, and that was when he was about 17.

Mr. Hackworth has no living brothers or sisters. An aunt, Mrs. L. S. Sowards, resides in New York City. Another aunt, Mrs. Joel Crisp, died near Martin several years ago. After leaving this county he attended the Willard (Ky.) Normal School, Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Ind., Georgetown University Law School and George Washington University in Washington, D. C., receiving the A.B. and LL.B. degrees.

He was married in 1908 to Miss Clara E. Christy, Huntington, W. Va., whose father at one time resided in Prestonsburg and they have a son, Carl C., and a daughter, Helen.

Mr. Hackworth started in the government service as a clerk in 1909 and worked seven years before he was paid as much as \$2,000 a year. Now at 61 he has a score or more assistants and is paid around \$10,000 a year. And, did he not resist tempting offers to go into private practice as an international lawyer, he could pull down a far bigger salary than that.

"Who's Who" states that Mr. Hackworth was admitted to the District of Columbia bar in 1912 and to the Supreme Court in 1915; became attorney for the State Department in 1916 and from 1918 to 1925 was solicitor for the State Department. Since July, 1931 he has been legal adviser to the State Department and in March, 1937 succeeded the late Ethel Frost as member of the Permanent Court of Arbitration, The Hague. His standing among international lawyers is such that he has been a member of the Harvard Law School's advisory committee on research in international law and in 1932 was a delegate of the United States to The Hague to the Conference for Codification of International Law.

This unsung hero of the national state department under four Presidents lives quietly with his family at 3715 Morrison St., Chevy Chase, D. C. He is a member of the Christian (Disciples) Church.  
But his politics? A writer recently stated only his friends can tell the political affiliations of this man who works quietly, masterfully with diplomats of the world and with national administrations of every political faith. His uncle, Will Haywood, of Dick, will bet you, though—if he was a bettin' man—that Green Haywood Hackworth is a Republican.  
"His mother and dad were Republicans, I know," Mr. Haywood proudly recalls.

Attracted to the newspaper as steel to a magnet, the association has, for nine years, proved to be a mutually happy one. Davis has trained far afield, wherever new techniques in color photography were being developed. He has traveled from coast to coast . . . caught color shots on land, sea and air. At the Graphic Arts Institute in New York, Harold became friend and protégé of Carlton Dunn, pioneer and foremost authority on tri-color work in this country. Dunn, author of many textbooks on the subject, is a frequent visitor in our studios.

Dark hair falling across a serious brow, Harold talks about the 40-pound lens Leica which simultaneously filters basic colors on three plates. "It's done with mirrors" . . . and while it's the best available now . . . great strides will be made in this field after the war. Perhaps then Harold will find a color lens capable of catching the exquisite beauty of his wife . . . who is remarkably photogenic. So far, none has done her justice.

Italians if they are friendly. We should think very highly of those smiling ambassadors from Japan who were making beautiful oriental bows and smiling and showing themselves very friendly while their brothers of the same color and caliber were planning the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor.

"Who ever heard of saloons being friendly to churches? Let the tears of wives who have drunken husbands, the cries of children who have drunken daddies, the pleas of destitute homes, wretched lives, prostitution in mass formation show any 'friendliness' existing between a saloon and a church? What is there in common between the two? Oh, the great gulf that exists between the two, the church and the saloon, between the advocates of the church and the saloon." The advocates of liquor have no warm interest in the church's attitude from social, political and pecuniary interests.

"Another timely excuse for granting the license was . . . but in the rush of business the license for retail package liquor store was issued. This quotation is taken from the written opinion of Mr. Whittle. The State Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission was created for the purpose of controlling the liquor traffic according to law. However, there are some who think that it is better to let the liquor crowd and their opponents arbitrate their differences while the Control Commission says: 'In considering this question the Board recognizes that it is very undesirable for a liquor store to be so near a place of worship, and it is to be hoped that, within the near future, this situation will be remedied by the church leaders and Mr. Carlow working in harmony with each other.' Yes, the Control Commission pleads 'friendliness' and 'hopefulness' as they circumvent the law."
