### Why Publish Illegal Audits?

If the law means anything, few of the annual audits submitted for publication in this newspaper at the close of the fiscal year are legal. The Floyd County Board of Education audit is a model of compliance with the law. Condensed statements of incorporated towns are the opposite.

The law requiring publication of such financial reports points out in language so plain that he who runs may read that such statements must be itemized so as to show to whom, when, for what and how much was paid in each disbursement.

What would it avail your partner in business if you were to report to him at year's end that you received so much money and spent a certain amount—just that, no more, telling him nothing of the why or wherefore? Well, the taxpayer is the public official's partner in this audit statement matter, and he is entitled to know, if anything, all about how his money and yours was handled.

Some officials have complained that the expense of publishing such statements is a drain on their particular department's resources. To which they are cited to the unfuted truth that no governmental division publishing complete legal audits over the last few years has wound up in worse financial condition than when it began this matter of taking the public into its confidence. And that is more than can be said of many before audit publication was begun.

### NOT "OVERMUCH"

THE TIMES has been reminded that it views with overmuch alarm the post-war problem of employment in Floyd county.

We are reminded that a huge road-building program awaits war's end, that the Big Sandy river is to be locked and dammed, that the Johns Creek dam is to be built.

Some of these things, possibly all, will be done and will furnish employment to many residents of the county. But for how long? What is there of permanence to look forward to about the construction of a dam, the building of a road?

And what of individual initiative is there about such undertakings? These are public projects, financed by state and national governments; and, whether done under direct government management or by contractors paid by the government, are closely akin to the WPA so many projects to despise.

What THE TIMES is concerned about is the apathy of business men and civic leaders toward the only real business life the section may possess, once the war is over. That is to say, it is concerned about individual businesses, in which one individual or a group of individuals have an idea, are willing to back that idea with their financial resources, pay men for working and producing the things other men need. The creation of a great dam or the building of a splendid highway is something that is, more or less, self-perpetuating and does not require energy and constant planning and working to be of service.

Already those who have been away at war work are beginning to come home. Five thousand or more young men will be coming back, some day, from army camps and battlefronts. Do you think these will be content with a county depending upon public money to provide employment?

It is at least worth the effort for civic groups and public officials to contact the Smaller War Plants Corporation which has already brought into some communities of the state new businesses which are now providing employment and giving promise of employment for home folks after the war when, sooner or later, hundreds of workers in this one county will be as the friend in need.

**Processed Foods**  
Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through F5 in War Ration Book F5 good now for 10 points each indefinitely.

**Meats and Fats**  
Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through C8 in Book Four good for 10 points indefinitely.

**Sugar**  
Stamps 30, 31 and 32 in Book Four now good for 5 pounds each indefinitely. Stamp 23 valid Sept. 1. Stamp 40 in Book Four good for 5 pounds of cooking sugar through February 28, 1945. Also, application may be made to local board for additional allotment upon presentation of spare stamp 37.

**Shoes**  
Alpshane stamps 1 and 2 in Ration Book Three each good for one pair of shoes.

**Gasoline**  
Stamps A-12 good for 3 gallons through Sept. 21. B-3, C-3, B-4 and C-4 stamps good for 5 gallons until used. State and license number must be written on face of each coupon immediately upon receipt of book. Make applications for B or C renewals at least 10 days before rations are exhausted.

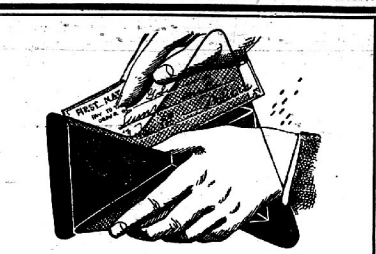

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War Victim Write Parents Day Prior To Death in France



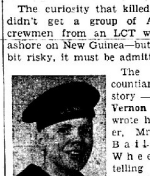

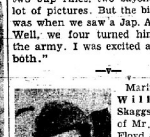

The curiosity that killed the cat didn't get a group of American crewmen from an LCT who went ashore on New Guinea—but it was a big risk, it must be admitted. The Floyd countian in the story—Seaman Vernon Bailey—wrote his mother, Mrs. Mary Bailey, at Wheelwright, telling of the escape which took place on July 6. He wrote, in part: "Well, today has been an exciting day. I went ashore to look for Jap survivors and, believe me, I really found a good one. Four of us went back in the hills to some Jap caves. When we got there the soldiers were parading the captives to the Japs. Earlier today they killed one Jap and captured another. I saw them both. They were trying to smoke them out of the caves. "Well, we knew there were plenty of survivors in the caves, so naturally we had to have some. The soldiers covered us with machine guns and we took a couple of machine guns and went into the cave (crazy, isn't it?). We found five Jap flags, two Jap rifles, two bayonets and a lot of pictures. But the big surprise was when we saw a Jap. A live one. Well, we four turned him over to the army. I was excited and scared both."



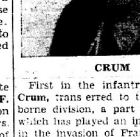

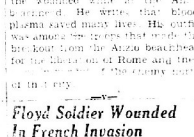

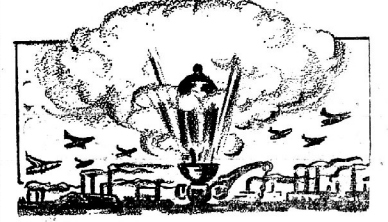

Leitature: "Be it further enacted that the county line between Floyd and Pike counties be so changed on Mare Creek as to include the farm of Randy Strickon on said creek in Floyd county." And that was that. For 100 years now "Little Floyd" has existed, suffering patiently from double taxation in some instances and from lack of a road because of its peculiar situation. Pike county has not built a road to serve these folk who claim to be of Floyd county, and Floyd has not built a road through a part of Pike to get to its stranded people.

Yet this week County Judge E. P. Hill said Floyd county hopes eventually to be able to do something for "Little Floyd" in the matter of a road. Later some legal harp-splaining may be done to determine if this "Little Floyd" or merely a part of his Pike.

Officials here expressed appreciation of the Commissioner's willingness to co-operate and immediately amended the original agreement signed by the fiscal court and the Department of Highways.

The amended agreement provides that money remaining in the rural highway fund and allotted to Floyd county for this year be spent for the following purposes:

First of all, maintenance of previously improved roads totaling approximately 83 miles as listed in the original contract, but excepting Project 1300 which embraces approximately 50 miles of rural "dirt" roads.

To spend not more than \$500 on routine patrolling of unimproved roads listed as Project 1300.

To spend not more than \$1500 for grading and placing creek gravel on Projects 1002 and 1025 (Clear Creek and Melvin-Weeksburg roads).

To spend not more than \$2500 for improving a two-mile extension of the Mud Creek road (Project 1001).

To spend not more than \$500 for improving an extension of approximately three miles on the Bull Creek road.

Improvement of approximately three miles of the Arkansas Creek road, not more than \$1,500 to be expended.

Not more than \$1,000 to be expended for improvement of approximately three miles of the Mare Creek road.

The expenditure of not more than \$5,000 in assisting the county to replace the bridge at Garrett destroyed recently by Knott county road machinery.

The supplemental agreement also provided that the Department of Highways is not to be held responsible or liable for any of this work in case of inability to procure equipment or equipment supplies or labor or for any other cause beyond the department's control.
