PORTER BEGINS WORK ON WATER SYSTEM
Early Plant Operation At Allen Seel; Reservoir To Be Built Next Year

Installation of a modern water system of 30-gallons-a-minute capacity has been begun at Allen by Herman Porter, Allen business man. Construction of a reservoir and addition of equipment next year were not included in the \$30,000 estimated cost of the plant. Installation of a filtering system and a chlorinating tank to purify water going into approximately 50 Allen residences is well under way. One 400-gallon tank is in, with others to be installed. A pressure tank will be used temporarily in lieu of a reservoir which will be constructed next year, Mr. Porter said. The town already has a sewer system.

U.S.E.S. Central Office To Be Located Here

AREA OFFICE CHANGE SEEN IN FEW WEEKS

Central office of the United States Employment Service for this area of seven counties with a population of 235,000 will, within the next few weeks, be established in Prestonsburg, it was announced here Wednesday by R. F. Fields, Louisville, field supervisor, and C. W. Sealing, manager of the Pikeville USIES office. The announcement is being hailed as a victory for officials and citizens who have long contended that Prestonsburg, the geographical center of the district, should be the location of the main office of this government agency. Mr. Sealing, who will be USIES manager here, said the office will be opened as soon as necessary improvements and refurbishing can be completed by A. G. Barton, of the First avenue building the office will occupy. Glazer's store, present occupants of the Harlowe building, has leased the Austin hotel annex for a store room and will shortly move there, it was said. The USIES office here will employ approximately 10 persons, all of whom are already in the agency's employ.

LACKEY MINE STRIKE ENDS

Supervisory Workers Demand Recognition, 14,000 Are Striking

While approximately 14,000 Kentucky and West Virginia miners were out on strike, Floyd county's only mine at which a work-stoppage had occurred during these latest labor disturbances—the Central Elkhorn No. 3 at Lackey, resumed work Monday morning after a 10-day strike. A company official said the strike called after a long war, had been laid off. Approximately 90 workmen in the Lackey operation were involved. The official characterized the walk-out as a "wildcat" strike and added that union officials asked the men to return to work. The point of contention will be submitted to arbitration. It was said. Strikes of supervisory workers demanding recognition of their union closed most of the West Virginia and Kentucky mines. President Roosevelt Tuesday night ordered 12 more mines seized and operated by the government, bringing to 48 the total number of mines operating under his directives. Four Floyd county mines in Pike county are on strike. It was reported here.

BOARDS GET NEW RULING

Draft Order Voids Blanket Deferment For Those Over 26

Floyd county draft boards this week received instructions from state selective service headquarters which cancel blanket deferments of draft registrants over 26 years of age. This cancellation of deferment because of the over-26 ruling made last April means, in effect, that if the registrant is not given a deferred classification by reason of employment in a vital industry, he is subject to call at any time, up to 38, inclusive, if demands for manpower in the armed forces become heavy enough. Younger men, 18 to 25, are more desirable for service, but older unmarried men not vitally employed will be called by order number along with men in that age group unless the number of volunteers is sufficient to fill coming quotas.

Floyd County Shows Its Hand

FLOYD COUNTY'S record in seeking the location within its borders of the proposed tuberculosis hospital for this district is heart-warming.

It has not lagged behind other counties in making its bid. It was the second county in the state, the first in the district. Apparently, it has gone as far as any county can go in the matter.

Nobody expects a mere hospital to bring to any individual or any county great wealth. The desire for location of

the institution should be, and we believe is, a matter of pride in a great undertaking and a desire to have the county the focal point of interest in a noble work.

Above all, credit is due those two landowners—Bob Kramer, of Hippo, and Miles Gibson, of Langley—who have offered, free of cost, tracts of land for the hospital site. This land cost them money that did not come easy. The land they offer so freely is a part of the heritage they expected to leave their families. Such proffered contributions, whether accepted or no, are shining proof that all is not greed in a workaday world.

And not to be forgotten is the prompt action of the Floyd fiscal court on the suggestion of County Judge Hill and County Attorney Burchett that the court buy a tract of land here and donate it to the Tuberculosis Commission for hospital. No taxpayer surely is so niggardly that he would protest such use of public funds.

All these things speak well of the heart of Floyd county. And that is what counts. Win or lose in the hospital matter, we have shown our hand—the helping hand.

Floyd County Goes To War

All Not Always Quiet Around Hospital Site, Hand Writes Father

News dispatches from the Pacific so consistently tell the story of American advances and Yank bombing of the Japs that it is almost back home forget that the boys sometimes undergo a bit of bombing from the Japs themselves.

Darwin Hunt, of the new evacuation hospital, concurred in the southwest Pacific, recently gave his father, R. T. Hunt, well-known Floyd county teacher a hint that he also is not best and skittles for our side, even if we are winning the war. He wrote, in part:

"I found out that we can tell a little more of our experiences than I've been telling . . . We have a hammock with a waterproof cover . . . I had this contraption fixed on the side of the tent so that it swung too much tied to trees. We had had several air raid alerts during the night. Just before daybreak, we had an alert and I heard the droning of planes. I began seeking my foxhole pretty fast, but gradually the droning faded away and I went back to bed. . . . We had another next full thing really started happening. In a short time, the All Clear was sounded. In about 20 minutes after that we had another alert. Again I could hear the planes but I lay on, peeping out the side of my hammock, feeling too drowsy to be interested. . . ."

"Then something happened that really made me move. Suddenly as I was coming to a single light in the anti-aircraft firework opened up. I could never have imagined there were so many around. The air was literally a sheet of flame from tracer bullets. . . . Once some Jap planes slipped in low over the hill and dropped a few eggs but didn't do too much damage. Another time, a Jap ammunition dump accidentally caught fire and it was close enough to our hospital to make us plenty uncomfortable. The fire rained around pretty thick. The concussion would almost bounce you off the ground at times. And we always hit the ground falling behind whatever was at hand when a few seconds we could usually hear the hum of transport. . . ."

"Everything here is as quiet and peaceful as we could hope for now." Cpl. Roscoe C. Hayes, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Rebecca Hayes of Haying, Alphoneta, is now stationed somewhere in England with the Second Air Force. Cpl. Hayes entered the army air forces Sept. 15, 1943. He had previously been employed as a machinist at Unionville, Conn. He was graduated from the flexible gunnery school at Las Vegas, Nev., received his silver wings and was transferred to Sioux City, Iowa, where he was assigned as a bombardier on the Flying Fortress, completing his flight training there. His crew was sent to Kearney, Nebraska, was given a new plane for combat duty and flew to England.

Pvt. Damon Chaffins, husband of Mrs. Myrtle Chaffins, of Garrett, has won the right to wear Wings and Hoops of the army paratroopers. He has completed four weeks of jump training at Ft. employer. It was indicated that branch offices at Pikeville, Paintsville, South Williamson and Whitesburg will continue to function. The office here will be the center of interest for employers and employees, and will serve Floyd, Pike, Johnson, Martin, Maconfin, Morgan and Letcher counties. Completion of the Prestonsburg-Silverville highway was pointed out as a transportation feature more strongly fixing Prestonsburg as the most easily accessible point for the area as a whole.

"Prestonsburg," Mr. Saline said, "is not only centrally located geographically but also industrially and in the matter of population." The U. S. Employment Service operates under the War Manpower Commission and it is now engaged in recruiting workers for all types of essential industries over the nation, handling the labor allocation program by not only supplying labor but also by keeping working forces in vital industries intact and in place in employment and retraining returned war veterans.

The Pikeville office, which has always been the central area headquarters, has for the past year, Mr. Saline said, handled an average of 100 employe visits daily with the number shooting up to near 200 on a few days. For the month of July the Paintsville and Pikeville offices were visited by approximately 5,000 workers seeking jobs or job transfers.

David, who was given a two-year sentence Wednesday afternoon for the killing of Crow Nelson.

Burchfield based his defense on the claim that the shooting of Miller was accidental, that his revolver discharged as he was handing it to Miller. Miller's "death-bed" statement to the jury that Burchfield shot him without provocation was admitted as evidence, however, and it was pointed out that Burchfield's conviction. A previous trial resulted in a hung jury.

Mostly claimed Howell was shot accidentally as a revolver was discharged while the defendant and Barti Gensher, tussled for its possession. Gensher testified that Howell fired shot him through the arm, then turned the weapon on Howell. Confusion of evidence showed the killing took place during a drunken row.

Slope contended that he shot Nelson in self-defense while Nelson tried to shoot him. The defense produced testimony claiming that Nelson was drunk when he came to the scene of work where Slope was mixing a man and that he argued with Slope when the latter threatened to call "the law." Commonwealth testimony, however, contended Nelson was using his left hand in the tussle with Slope and that the night watchman was not in danger of his life. One Commonwealth witness testified Slope had said he would shoot Nelson before he would lose his job.

T. H. of John Gray, named in a robbery and wounding charge, was sentenced 181 January 5. Minor convictions obtained during the week: Ellis Young, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, \$100 fine; George King, same, \$20 fine; Charles Latham, cutting and wounding, \$50; Charles Brannan and Bill Tackett, same, \$20 each.
