The Houston Plan and WPA

WHETHER Franklin D. Roosevelt or Thomas E. Dewey is elected Presi-dent at the November election, the people of this country can expect, soon-er or later, a huge public works program to take up the post-war employment slack.

Even though Mr. Dewey holds to the Even though Mr. Dewey holds to the theory that private enterprise can be maintained at such a peak that it can meet all employment needs, many cities over the country are now planning post-war improvement programs which will serve two purposes—provide work for their residents and improve their com-munities.

war improvement programs which will serve two purposes—provide work for their residents and improve their com-munities. The newspapers have recently com-mented at length on the Houston (Texas) plan, a five-year post-war program of improvements—streets, highways, flood control, sewers, airport development, parks and the like—at a total cost of \$31,000.000. Some of these newspapers hail the plan solely because it points a way which may be followed by other municipalities in community improve-ment. Others, more realistic, approve it for that reason and for another—because it might be a part of the post-war plan-ning which would keep men at work. If such plans and measures do main-tain the, employment level, render un-necessary another WPA, what have we accomplished more than was accomplish-ed in the days of deep depression? Is not work done at the public ex-pense a part, warp and woof, of the same e conomic principle as WPA? WPA, with all its faults, was a public works undertaking national in scope, de-signed to furnish employment for unem-tion on improvements. The Houston Plan, or any other plan envisioning the expenditure of public money on improvements, may sound more grandly mellifluous, may not be so loudly condemned by the "Haves"— but, after all, it will be a local WPA






