### A Way out of the Rut

A COMPANION-PIECE to this newspaper's recent story of a Floyd county farmer's success in growing alfalfa is the Page One story this week telling of F. P. Hall's experiences at Weeksbury as an apple-grower.

These stories are published to point to our farmers a way out of the rut—the corn furrow—they have too long followed, to the detriment of the soil and with little profit to themselves.

Frank Hall's experience as an orchardist is not set down here as the record of a bumper crop year. The story is of growing apples on a Floyd county hillside during a year when corn shriveled,

almost died, under the burning sun of a long and devastating drought. Mr. Hall's net profit on his apple orchard covering ten acres of a so-called nudged Left Beaver Creek slope may exceed for this drought year \$3,000, on \$300 an acre. The same type of land this year has not yielded better than eighteen bushels of corn to the acre, and if the entire corn crop from ten acres of hillside land were sold it could not be expected to accrue to the farmer who "sweated it out" more than \$360—less than a dollar a day for the year.

Those are some of the figures that may be drawn. Add to these the pleasant years of profit-taking from long-range planning for farm life, add that major item, the conservation of the soil—and you have in this orchard venture a clear-cut picture of the need for Floyd county farmers to renounce their allegiance to King Corn.

But this is not to imply that the planting of an orchard is a guarantee of success on the farm. Only those who are willing to make a study of horticulture, to plan scientifically for a productive orchard and to work toward that end should undertake it. Those who cannot or will not do this might fare better never to undertake any but the most rudimentary phases of farming. As in every field of endeavor, there is no magic "Open Sesame" to success.

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### Wheelwright Soldier Commended in Italy

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY—Private Leon E. Porter, of Wheelwright, Ky., has been commended for exceptionally meritorious conduct while serving with the 34th "Red Bull" Division on the Fifth Army front in Italy.

With his battalion's advance being held up by a very hard enemy artillery fire, Porter exposed himself to the enemy fire and strung communication wire to a forward observation post. With communication thus re-established, counterbattery fire was brought to bear on enemy guns, knocking them out and enabling the American advance to continue.

"Private Porter's courageous action reflects credit on himself and the armed forces of the United States," the citation said.

Pvt. John H. Hatcher, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. J. Hatcher, Prestonsburg, recently completed an intensive course in radio-operator-mechanics at the technical school, army air force training command, Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

He is now prepared to join the crew of a bomber, or to take up any other radio duties to which the AAF training command may assign him.

Pfc. Archie A. Zamozino, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nick Zamozino, of Wayland, was graduated last week from the army air force flexible gunnery school, Laredo Army Air Field, Laredo, Texas, a member of the AAF training command. He is now qualified to take his place as a member of a bomber combat crew.

Along with his diploma, he received his aerial gunner's "Wings" and a promotion in grade at brief graduation exercises. He was prepared for his place in America's stepped-up air offensive by a comprehensive six-weeks course in every phase of aerial gunnery warfare. Besides learning to fire every type weapon from cannon to the deadly caliber .50 Brownings, he studied turret manipulation, aircraft identification, stripping and reassembling of machine guns while blindfolded. He climaxed the course by air firing on towed targets.

### THE WEEK IN OPA

**New Shoe Stamp Due Nov. 1**  
Another shoe due stamp will become valid November 1, the OPA has announced. In addition, both of the current shoe coupons—Airplane Stamps 1 and 2 in Ration Book Three—will overlap the new stamp and will continue to be good indefinitely.

Decision as to which new stamp will be used for shoes has not yet been reached, OPA said.

#### "B-3" and "C-3" Coupons To Expire

"B-3" and "C-3" gasoline ration coupons became invalid for motorists after September 30, the OPA announced last week.

At the same time "T" coupons marked "Red" expired for filling motor vehicle operators. Fueling station operators will have 10 days, or through October 10, to turn them in to their supplier for gasoline or exchange them at their local War Price and Rationing Board for ration checks. Distributors have until October 20 to deposit these coupons in their ration bank account.

Holders of invalidated "B-3" and "C-3" coupons which were issued for use beyond September 30 may exchange them for valid coupons at their local board.

The board may either issue new coupons equal to the amount of gasoline still outstanding on the old ration, or may evaluate the applicant's mileage needs and issue coupons sufficient for the remainder of the ration period, but not in excess of the coupons surrendered.

#### Price Posting Requirements

New requirements to be met by retail food stores in multiple, visible posting of dollar-and-cent ceiling price lists for dry groceries and such other foods as butter, eggs, poultry, fish and fresh fruits and vegetables were established this week by OPA.

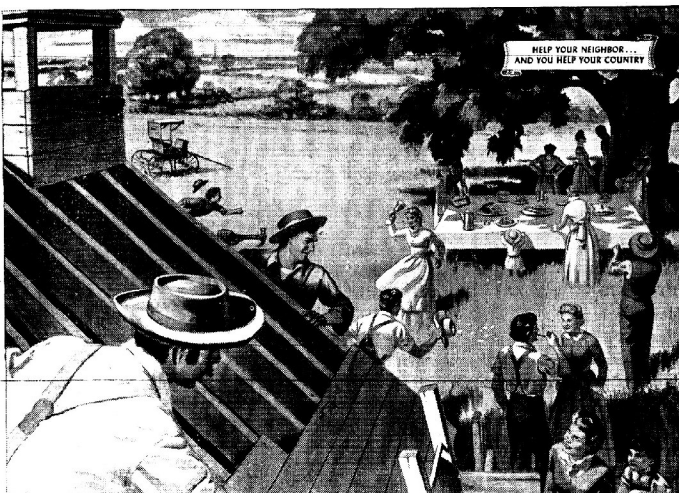
