Catechism for the Folks at Home

It is difficult for you to revive the old enthusiasm this time for the War Bond drive? Are you growing a bit tired of it all?

A soldier writes, "The worst thing is the long, horse-meat grind... the waiting, the foot-slogging, the never getting anywhere..."

Do you think you're being asked to give too much (even if you aren't asked to give a cent, only to loan it)?

Read the casualty list in this newspaper this week—see for yourself that some of our boys, only a few short days ago, really did give... without interest, with no hope of collecting.

Do you think the war is almost over and your help is no longer needed?

The boys in Italy and France don't think so. Take a glance at the map and see how far it is to Tokyo.

Are you tired of the war (as who isn't)?

"My feet haven't been dry in a month... this endless hell all around and paradise so far away"—that from a soldier on the perilous edge of Germany.

To this desk come letters from every battlefield. They speak, as the censor permits, of life there, of the boys' hopes and fears, of their dreams of home and their homesickness. Some of them speak

bitterly of things back home; some feel that they are being let down, that they have been delegated to do more than their share.

But every one of these boys will tell you he has a job to do, that he is doing it, and that we all have a job to do... we will conclude with this sound and patriotic advice—"BUY WAR BONDS!"

Then don't you think we should give into this Sixth War Loan drive with all the old spirit, buy Bonds as we never bought before, and, besides helping win the war with our money, thus send a word of encouragement to the fellows Over There?

The Aged, Blind and Needy Young Should Not Suffer

GOVERNOR WILLIS should charge off his mistake in estimating the amount of money needed to hold benefits to the aged, the needy blind and indigent children to inexperience and an amateurish zeal for economy in government; and, that done, should then immediately call the legislature into extraordinary session so that an additional appropriation may be made for these purposes.

Certainly, the aged, the helpless young, and the blind should not have to suffer for his mistake. At the present level of benefits, Kentucky is far behind many states in the matter of public assistance to these groups whose need is greatest.

To permit, as has been indicated, a cut in old-age assistance payments from the now-meagre 70 per cent to 43 per cent, would be the rankest sort of failure chargeable to the Willis administration.

State tax collections, we are told, broke all records last week. Prospects for collections in the future are by no means dreary. Kentucky's fiscal affairs are in good order. And so old-age pensions, reduced to token-pittance, is, in the face of these facts, ridiculous.

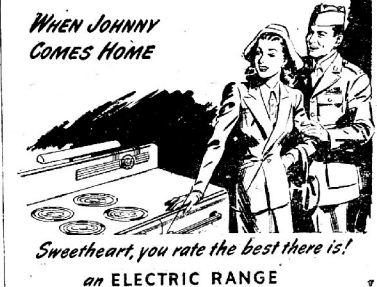
