SUITS CLAIM CHURCH MUSIC CAUSED SPLIT

Two Congregations Seeking To Recover Places of Worship

Friction between divergent groups of the Church of Christ or Christian Church in this county over the use of instrumental music in worship resulted last week in the filing of two civil suits in the Floyd circuit court by original trustees of two churches who seek to regain use of buildings they claim to have built with the aid of members of the original church congregations.

The churches involved are those at Dwaile and Laynesville. In the first case James Damon, J. K. Bohm and M. P. Farley sue for the use of a building of the Church of Christ at Dwaile, naming Willie Clifton, Raymond Cooley, James Rowe and Alex L. Clark as defendants.

The suits parallel the action of members of the original congregation at Martin who won in the Court of Appeals possession of the church building, has been torn down and removed from its original site by another lot nearby and converted to the use and benefit of the defendants.

All this followed the petition receding, the appearance in the county in the fall of 1942 of Harper, Hall and others who preached against the instrumental music of the original congregation and in 1943 organized a new church, the Laynesville Christian Church, which has since succeeded in undermining the membership of the original church and caused the church under their leadership, leaving the faithful few members of the original congregation who were locked out, the Sunday school literature was destroyed, and church property was sold and partly held by the defendants, it is alleged.

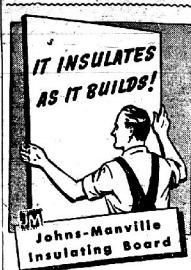

### Says Radar Provides Field for Young Men

Radar, the navy's most closely guarded secret, provides a field for young men interested in fighting the war with one of science's greatest weapons and provides a post-war future at the same time, according to Dr. R. R. Finn, recruiter in charge of the advanced navy recruiting station.

Pfc. Cantee, who has been awarded the Purple Heart, has shown steady progress since his arrival at this hospital, and will soon be able to return to duty.

Pfc. Cantee's wife lives in Wheelwright, Ky., and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Cantee, reside at the Joseph's avenue address in Wheelington, W. Va. He has been in service since Nov., 1942, and in civil life managed Cantee's Department Store in Wheelington.

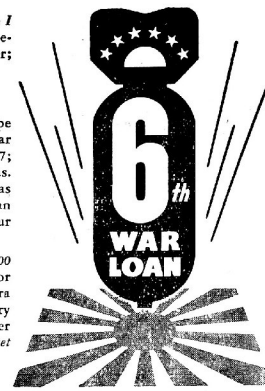

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### Absent Voters Become Permanently Registered

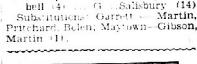

### Collection Drive On Income Taxes Began, Moore Says

A campaign to collect delinquent income taxes from those who have failed to file returns has been started by the State Department of Revenue, Commissioner W. J. Moore pronounced recently.

"The department has had many complaints as to those who have failed to file and pay the tax," Moore stated. "We have information from various sources indicating a large number of delinquents."

"Many persons, he said, have failed to file for the reason they did not know returns were due, but others have neglected to comply with the law. He urged delinquents to contact one of the local revenue offices at Louisville, Lexington, Covington or Paducah in an effort to get their affairs straightened out.

"Delinquents are liable for a 10 per cent penalty, a minimum of \$10 for failure to file returns. For failure to pay, the penalty is 5 per cent of the tax liability plus 1 per cent per month from the time the tax payment is due. Any person making a fraudulent return or attempting to evade the tax may upon conviction be imprisoned from one to five years."

The suit sets forth that re-organization of the church was effected by a vote "when they believed they had a majority" and "they simply said, 'Now all who wish to follow Christ, stand up.'"—a proposition on which every Christian would stand, the plaintiffs state.

The Dwalie plaintiffs ask to recover \$1,000 and a lien on the property of the new group to secure payment of that amount, on the right to tear down and remove the church building or to remove it, if possible, without wrecking it.

The Laynesville plaintiffs' action parallels on the whole, the Dwalie suit, alleging that the same ministers created confusion, conducted the vote on re-organization in the same manner as at Dwalie, tore from the church books, destroyed Sunday School literature and that the church property is held illegally, preventing the "old" congregation from worshipping there. They ask that they be adjudged the owners of the church property, that the defendants be enjoined from entering the property and from prohibiting the plaintiffs from its use and occupancy, and that the defendants be required to surrender the church books.
